SYNOPSIS OF MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION.

The annual meeting of the congregation was held on the evening of January 13, and was largely attended.

Before commencing the business devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Dr. McTavish, who then announced his intention of vacating the chair, upon which Mr. R. Donald was requested to preside, and the Secretary of the Managers was appointed Secretary for the evening.

The report of the Session for the past year was then presented by Dr. McTavish, and the Session Treasurer's statement was also submitted.

Abstracts of the results of the work carried on during the year by the various organizations connected with the church were read by the several secretaries.

The adoption of the annual report of the Managers was moved by Mr. Donald, seconded by Mr. Petry and carried.

It was ordered that the reports which have just been presented be printed and distributed as usual.

The following gentlemen were elected to act on the Board of Managers during the next two years, viz., Messrs. R. Donald, Wm. Campbell, A. R. Creelman, R. G. A. Paton, R. W. Spence, Dr. Wishart, S. B. Windrum, and A. D. Crooks; and Mr. J. S. Anderson was elected for one year.

Votes of thanks to the Board of Managers for the efficient manner in which they have conducted the financial affairs of the congregation; to the members of the choir and auditors for valuable services rendered during the year, and to the ladies of the church for providing the excellent entertainment which preceded the meeting this evening, were unanimously passed.

A motion was made by Mr. Jas. P. Donald and seconded by Mr. Crombie to the effect that the amounts contributed by the members and adherents of the church to all congregational purposes be published opposite their respective names in the annual general report, but that any who object to having their contributions appear in this way are at liberty to have them entered anonymously. After a full discussion of the matter and the disposition of two amendments to the motion the latter was finally carried.

Messrs. Theron Gibson and Peter McCulloch were appointed Auditors for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF THE SESSION FOR 1889.

In presenting this Annual Report the Session desire to express their gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for many tokens of blessing attending the work of the congregation during the year. The various societies and organizations for the furtherance of Christian work have given, in their monthly reports to the Session, encouraging accounts of the work done and of the results realized. A goodly number has been added to the membership of the Church, many have expressed gratitude at receiving personal spiritual blessings during the year, and what is most encouraging of all, a large number seem to be looking and praying definitely for a very manifest outpouring of the Holy Spirit. Perhaps the most significant earnest of future blessing is to be seen in the interest taken by a large number of the young people in direct Christian work and purely devotional meetings. The eager question of many of them is, "Lord, what would'st thou have us to do?" The regular Sabbath services appear to be growing in attendance and interest, and while there is still a little indifference on the part of some of the members in regard to the evening services, the Session is pleased to note an increasing attendance of strangers.

The Wednesday evening prayer meeting is growing in numbers, and we trust, also, in spiritual power, and is another token of blessing in store for the congregation. Pastoral visitation has been carried on regularly, and, on the whole, with great satisfaction during the year. We believe that in a majority of our homes family worship is observed, and the children are taught the Word of God with commendable faithfulness, and yet it is painful to have to record such a considerable number of exceptions. We trust that ere long *all* our members will recognize their responsibility and privilege in regard to this matter of vital importance.

The Session are sensible of the important and valuable service rendered by the choir and its efficient leaders, in that they have ably and faithfully conducted the service of praise, not only on the Lord's Day, but have, also, volunteered their service as a choir at the weekly prayer meet-

ing, to add to its interest, as well as to improve the congregational singing.

The work of the Elizabeth Street Mission, which was carried on with the faithful assistance of Mr. Ross during the summer months, has since been conducted very efficiently by voluntary service from elders, students, and others. The Sabbath School and other departments of the work there are being carried on with the usual ability and success.

The Sabbath School and Bible Class work of the Church is in a prosperous condition, and during the last few months has had the largest attendance in the history of the congregation. From the Sabbath School and Bible Classes, seventeen have become members in full communion on profession of faith during the year.

Two members of the congregation have during the past year gone to the Foreign Mission field: Miss Maggie McIntosh has been sent as a trained nurse to the Honan Mission in connection with our own Foreign Mission Board, and Mr. Malcolm Fenwick is now in Corea as co-labourer with Mr. Gale. A third member of the congregation, Miss Bella Ross, is now leaving for China in connection with the China Inland Mission. We rejoice in the spiritual interest of which this missionary self-sacrifice is an indication.

The number of members received into the fellowship of the Church during the year is 85. Of these, 30 were received on profession of faith, and the remainder by certificate. The removals have not been nearly so large as last year, only 14 having been certified, and 23 others removed from the roll for various reasons, thus leaving the net increase 48, and the present membership 480.

The Sacrament of Baptism has been administered to 16 children and 2 adults, and the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed six times, four times in the morning, and twice in the evening. The attendance and interest at these communion seasons were very gratifying to the Session.

Death has not passed us by, and among those taken away we have to mourn the loss of several who have occupied a prominent place in the history and work of the congregation.

The Session would urge upon parents the need of increased diligence in the home religious training of their children, and ask them to co-operate heartily with the Sabbath School in the furtherance of that object. It is, also, our hope that all the members may be earnest and importunate in prayer for a great and manifest work of the Spirit in the congregation during the year on which we have entered.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MANAGERS
FOR 1889.

In presenting their annual report for the year 1889, the Managers have pleasure in stating that the financial affairs of the congregation are in a satisfactory position, all obligations having been promptly met from the ordinary congregational receipts.

As will be seen from the statement, the year 1889 was a year of increase and closed with a surplus of £250 and 10s. 6d.

It will be seen from the statement of the congregation for the year 1889, that a plan for the year 1890 has been adopted upon the basis of the proposal they submitted over a period of six months. The surplus of the year 1889, amounting to £250 and 10s. 6d., has been carried over to the year 1890, and will be received by the congregation for the year, amounting to £250 and 10s. 6d. The debt from the year 1889, amounting to \$76.66, has been carried over to the year 1890.

As there is a surplus of £5,000, and the amount of the debt is £33.46, the payment of the debt will be made out of the surplus. The amount of the surplus will be £4,666.54.

The estimate for the year 1890, which is now before the congregation, is for the year 1890, and will be received by the congregation for the year 1890.

The session may agree to the estimate, which will be received by the congregation for the year 1890.

Upon receiving the report of the choir, it was found that the choir had received the amount of £100 for the year 1889, and the amount of £100 for the year 1890.

As will be seen from the appended Treasurer's Statement, the year opened with a balance of \$29.06 on hand, and closed with \$28.85 on hand.

It will be remembered that at the last annual meeting of the congregation the Managers were requested to devise a plan for the gradual liquidation of the mortgage debt upon the church, and at a subsequent meeting the proposal they submitted of asking for subscriptions extending over a period of five years was approved. A personal canvass of the members of the congregation was accordingly made with a highly gratifying result: the sum of \$19.50, received by the Board as a legacy from the Ladies' Aid Society, formed the nucleus of a fund which, during the year, amounted to \$1,780, and from which payments of £250 and £100 sterling have been made, reducing the debt from £5,000 to £4,650, and leaving a balance of \$76.66 carried over to 1890.

As there will be a saving effected from year to year in the payment of interest on the mortgage debt, the Managers have decided to adopt the principle of charging, as part of the congregational expenses, the full interest on £5,000, and to add the sum saved each year to the amounts contributed in liquidation of the debt. The saving effected in this way during the past year, as will be seen from the Treasurer's Statement, amounted to \$33.46.

The estimated expenditure for the ensuing year to maintain the Sabbath School and Elizabeth Street Mission may again be placed at about \$400, and the Board would recommend the continuance of the system by which their requirements are defrayed out of ordinary revenue account.

The session decided in March last, under discretion given at the annual meeting of the congregation, to engage a gentleman to take charge of the Mission during the summer months. This was accordingly done, and the funds necessary for his remuneration were received through a special collection.

Upon representations made by the members of the choir it was deemed expedient to purchase a piano for use at the choir practices, Sabbath school and prayer meeting services. This has been done at a cost of \$300, to be paid within two years.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

The Superintendent, Officers and Teachers, have pleasure in presenting the Fifteenth Annual Report of the Sabbath School.

The work is being carried on as vigorously, and we trust as efficiently as in past years.

The average attendance for the year is 169, being a slight increase over last year. During the month of August, owing to the absence of many of the teachers and scholars, it was deemed advisable to close the school, so that the average has been taken for the eleven teaching months.

The managers kindly provide for the maintenance of the school, and we are thus enabled to apply all the contributions of the scholars for mission purposes.

The collections for the year are \$201.62; Special collections for Tarsus, \$55.55; Total, \$257.17. Which have been allocated as follows: Home Missions, \$75; Foreign Missions, \$75; French Evangelization, \$25; Jewish Missions, \$20; St. Paul's Institute, Tarsus, \$50; Tract Society, \$6.62; Balance forward to 1890, \$5.55; Total, \$257.17.

Seventy-five new books have been added to the Library, to replace old books, and a new catalogue has been issued, so that the Library is now in first-class condition.

During the year one of our teachers, Miss Isabella Jeffrey, has been removed by the hand of death. Miss Jeffrey was a very faithful teacher and endeared herself to her fellow workers, and her class. Two of our scholars have also entered into rest, but we will altogether meet by-and-by, at the portals of the sky.

We have again to express our thanks to Mr. Creelman for his usual donation to the Infant Class.

We are grateful to Mr. Cringan, leader, and Miss Donald, pianiste, for conducting the Service of Praise in the school.

The teachers request the prayers and co-operation of the parents in their work, and in no way can the teachers be more encouraged than by the parents assisting their children in the preparation of their lessons at home.

Should we not, then, as a congregation feel a special interest in a work in which so many of ourselves are engaged?

Some of us have thought for some time that it would be a grand thing to have a missionary of our own in the foreign field, and, with this in view an appeal was made by Dr. McTavish from the pulpit with the understanding that any sums given were to be over and above the ordinary missionary contributions. Your Committee feel that we have great cause for thankfulness to God for the liberal response to this appeal. Nearly all the amount required has been now subscribed and there is little fear but that the balance will soon be forthcoming, so that we hope soon to be in a position to send our man out, and we hope to have one who was brought up from childhood in this church, and whose first missionary work was in connection with our own mission when on William street. This is, of course, exclusive of \$302.87 from Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, and \$121.37 from Mission Band.

This amount is apparently smaller than that contributed last year, but it will be noticed that it is in the item of special contributions. In this in 1888 was included the salary of the missionary at Elizabeth Street which this year was paid out of the ordinary church revenue, so that in reality we have raised more for purely missionary objects than in any year heretofore. A deficit having occurred in the Home Mission Funds our church was asked for \$120 special toward it. We are pleased to say that we are able to go beyond this amount and contributed \$150.

It is specially gratifying to note the steady increase of the ordinary collections, notwithstanding the fact that several large amounts contributed by members in former years have not been sent in this year, but which we hope to have before the books of the church are closed in April.

Your Committee would like to impress upon every member the desirability of contributing monthly, as at present we have to keep the books open at the end of the year for those who have not contributed, and in some cases, through absence from the city or other causes, we do not get it. They would also like to see a large increase in the number of contributors this year; let each member give something, however small. It is not the amount given, but the spirit in which it is given.

Your Committee would suggest that the amount available be allocated as set forth in Treasurer's Statement.

REPORT OF LADIES' AID SOCIETY, 1889.

During the year the Ladies' Aid Society has held 17 meetings, with an average attendance of 16. One hundred and eighty-four garments, including six quilts, have been completed, and a great deal of clothing sent to the Elizabeth Street Mission, where as heretofore each article has been sold for a small sum, thus encouraging the people to be independent, and not merely recipients of charity. We have also been able to help a great many needy ones by donations of coal and food, as well as by giving quantities of cast off clothing.

Our "Loan Fund," which was established last year, has been very successful, and those who have benefited by it have expressed themselves as very grateful for its valuable assistance.

In presenting this our ninth Annual Report we would express our thanks to the many kind friends who have aided us by sending liberal contributions to our funds. Special mention must be made of Mr. Spence, who so generously supplies us with material for work, and of Mr. Donald, who presents us with welcome gifts of tea and sugar. We have also a lady friend who contributes a dollar each month for the "Poor Fund." Many others have also kindly donated money and cast-off clothing, and an appeal for a special collection on Thanksgiving Day was liberally responded to.

Though we grieve to record the fact that, during the past few months, several of our number have suffered from severe affliction, we cannot but be thankful to our Heavenly Father for having spared so many of us to take up His work of ministering to the poor.

We go forward hopefully into the New Year trusting to a hearty support as in former years, from those who, though not able to attend our meetings, yet assist us in many ways.

The amounts we had on hand at the end of each year since the opening of the Bank are as follows:—1886, \$374.95; 1887, \$897.36; 1888, \$1,129.35; 1889, \$1,522.21; an increase over 1888 of \$350, and a surplus at the end of last year of \$33.37 over all liability; so it is plainly to be seen that our Bank is in a most prosperous condition. The number of depositors we had on the ledger at the end of last year was 323. We received last year in deposits the sum of \$2,488.10 and paid out in withdrawals \$2,138, which leaves a balance on hand of \$350 for the past year, which, added to the \$1,129.35 we carried forward from December, 1888, leaves a balance on hand due depositors of \$1,522.21.
