THE NAKED FACTS

THE GHOST OF MCKINLEY

Campaigning is assuming a tragic tone in New York state. In Utica last night, President Roosevelt, speaking through his Secretary of State, Mr. Root, called up the ghost of William McKinley to do battle for the Republican hosts against Hearst.

Roosevelt. "Do you believe in President Roosevelt?" he cried. "If you do then help him with your voice. I say to you with his authority that he greatly desires the election of Mr. Hughes as governor of the State of New York; I say to you with his authority that he regards Mr. Hearst as wholly unfit to be governor, as an insincere, self-seeking demagogue who is trying to deceive the working men of New York by false statements and false promises."

Hearst's campaign has been exceedingly crafty in many respects. He has refrained recently from all attacks upon Roosevelt and has sought to give the impression that their public ideas and purposes were identical.

The suits for libel against Wm. R. Hearst are for damages amounting in all to \$2,400,000. Other suits against him or his newspapers raise the total to \$7,500,000.

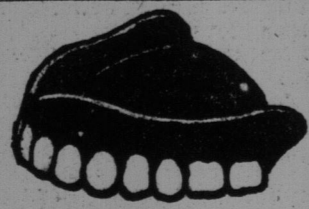
