London, Sept. 26-The British made an attack this morning on a wide front in the Ypres region. Good progress is reported by the war office. The statement follows:

"We attacked on a wide front in the battle sector northeast and east of Ypres at 5.50 this morning. Our troops are reported to be making good progress."

Ottawa, Sept, 26-The first call of men under the military service act is delayed. It cannot now well be issued before the middle of October, although







GUYNEMER SEPARATED FROM PATROL

ate of French Hero of The Air Unknown

Destroyed 78 Machines

His Greatest Record Was Four of Enemy Accounted for in One Day—German Losses in Air Nearly 500

Paris, Sept. 26.—The official communication issued last night announcing that Captain George Guynemer is missing, states that on Sept. 11 while he was reconnoitering in Flanders he found himself, while pursuing the enemy, separ-ated from his comrades of the patrol. The communication concludes as fol-The communication concludes as follows: "Despite that all means of investigation have been tried we have not obtained any further information up to the

Guynemer is credited with having shot down fifty-three German airplanes inside the German lines and with hav-ing destroyed at least twenty-five more that were uncounted. He was one of the youngest men of his rank in the French army, having been promoted by President Poincare in February last at the age of twenty-two.

Captain Guynemer's greatest day's work was on May 17 of this year when he brought down four German machines, two of which he accounted for in the space of two minutes, having attacked a group of four. With only three cart-ridges left, while on his homeward flight he encountered the fourth German and shot him down with one of the three remaining cartridges. The fifty-three German machines officially credited to Captain Guynemer's record were worth something more than 1,500,000 francs. Nearly 500 Destroyed

Grand Headquarters of the French Armies in France, Sept. 25.—(By The Associated Press.)—Up to Sept. 20 thirty-seven living French aviator "aces" had destroyed 393 German airplanes in air combats. Eleven other aces who have been killed, accounted

for ninety-one Germans. The list is headed by Captain Guynemer.

An airman obtains the rank of ace when he has destroyed five enemy machines. The list of German aces numbered fifty-seven, of whom twenty-nine have been killed in the course of fighting on the Franco-British front.





One Hundred U. S. Prisoners In Germany

Washington, Sept. 26.-American prisoners of war being held in German prison camps total 101, according to an official announcement issued today dealing cial announcement issued today dealing with plans for provisioning these men, but which did not give their names. Five of the prisoners are enlisted men of the United States navy who were captured when the steamer Campania was sunk by a German submarine. They and Merchant Captain Oliver of the Campana are being held at the German prison camp at Brandenburg.

On May 26 last, after war had been declared between this country and Germany, the state department issued a

many, the state department issued a statement to the effect that there were then seventy-four American prisoners of war in Germany. They had been taken from merchant vessels, and were all the American war prisoners then known to be in German hands. Sixty-one of be in German hands. Sixty-one of them were at the German camp at Dulmen, seven at the Havelberg camp, five at the Karlsruhe camp and one at the Rastratt camp in Bavaria. The names of these seventy-four American prisoners were made public by the state department on May 29.

the captives:

"American prisoners of war in Germany will be furnished enough food for their subsistence independently of rations provided them by the Germans.






