His first visit was shortly after the close of the war when he landed in Saint John, N. B. and traveled from coast to coast, receiving remarkable demonstrations of acclaim everywhere he went.

Quite recently, the Prince completed tour to South Africa and South A merica in the battle cruiser, Renown. Frobably, his most recent act in touch with Canadian affairs was the opening of the Canadian hostel for Canadian university students at Paris, France.

A BRIGHTER OUTLOOK

THE Lord Mayor's banquet in London has long been marked by an address of outstanding interest by the British Prime Minister. Premier Baldwin ast night was able to make a striking contrast between conditions in Europe today and those of three years ago, when the Imperial Conference last met in London. Europe then, he pointed out, was on the brink of disaster. There was much unrest, and the outlook discouraging. Last night Premier Baldwin was able to say that with Germany in the League of Nations and France and Germany endeavoring to compose their differences, the foreign situation is more satisfactory than at any time since the War. There is a cloud in the sky over China and the far East, but the situation in India is more satisfactory than for years past.

Looking abroad, conditions are found to be distinctly improved, but at home the shadow of the coal strike still looms, although there does seem at present some prospect of a settlement. City Manager Plan Success In Brandon

THE following on the operation of the city manager plan of civic government is taken from a recent issue of The Canadian Engineer: Advices from Brandon, Man., indicate that the city manager plan for civic government is a decided success and that there has been a decrease in the mill rate as well as the assessment. . A. W. Ellson Fawkes, who is a civil engineer,

combines the office of city manager and city engi-neer. In his first year, Mr. Fawkes saved the citizens \$105,000, while in 1925 he saved \$50,000. Under the city manager form of government he has reduced the mill rate from 40 to 88 mills on the dollar, the reduction being one mill each year to date. In 1923 the assessment stood at \$14,101,660. In 1924, it was reduced to \$13,943,460; 1925, \$13,575,365; 1925, \$13,467,000. The overdraft at the bank has also been reduced to the extent of \$100,000 during the three years of city managership.

Expenditures have been steadily reduced without any impairment of the confidence of the public in the financial stability of the city. Mr. Fawkes has not reduced salaries of civic employes but he has raised some. Asked to account for the success of the city manager form of administration, Mr. Fawkes declared it was due to "the application of business methods to municipal administration." All sinking funds have been brought up to date with the exception of the waterworks where the sinking fund is \$10,000 in arrears. The city has also paid off \$24,000 indebtedness to the public school board in three years. Approximately \$75,000 worth of property was subject to tax sale this year, but to date the amount has been reduced to below \$10,000. Current taxes came in well this year, the city manager applying the human touch to the business of tax collection by sending out a personal letter on the back of the tax notices received by each taxpayer. The general public is kept well informed as to the progress being made under the city manager form of government and the citizens are not kept in the dark as to any project for its better-ment that may be in the mind of the city manager. 





POLITICS AND EDUCATION

HOW private interests, the governorship, state legislative politics and education can become involved in a turbulent and undignified brawl is exemplified in the state of Washington. We may congratulate ourselves that we have no like conflict, but it is of interest to see what has happened on the other side of the continent, and on the other side of the international boundary, that we may avoid the trouble were anything similar to show signs of development.

According to an American publication, this is how it happens: The State of Washington has for its governor one Roland H.
