To Can Strawberies by the Cold Pack Method

Pack perfect, well washed berries in sterilized cans, adjust tested rubbers and pour over medium syrup to cover and pour over medium syrup to cover fruit. Half seal cans and put in hot water bath. The water must cover the jars by at least an inch. When the water begins to bubble begin to count the time for sterilization and sterilize quart jars 16 minutes. Re-move from boiler, tighten covers and turn cans upside down where they will cool quickly but not be in a draught. If a draught of cold air strikes a boiling hot cam breakage may occur. When cold, store in a dark, cool, dry place. Pack the fruit closely but do not mash or crush.
