KING'S COLLEGE LAW SCHOOL IS OPENED WITH RECORD CLASS

In the Equity court chambers yesterday afternoon the annual opening of King's College Law School took place, Dr. Silas Alward, K.C., the dean of the faculty, delivered an interesting and inspiring lecture on "Coke, the Oracle of Common Law," before the largest freshman class in the history of the school, and with many others, as well in attendance.

Dr. Alward dealt with the early life of the famous lawyer, his training, perseverance in his studies, his rapid forgoing to the front and his ultimately being made chief justice of England. He showed how kings at different times had tried to intimidate Coke, and how pressure had been brought to bear upon him in various ways, but he always withstood temptation and had triumphed. He had persevered the dignity and integrity in every office he had held. He had been elected to parliament on several occasions and had been responsible for the introduction of many measures, famous in after years, the best known of which was the "Petition of Rights."

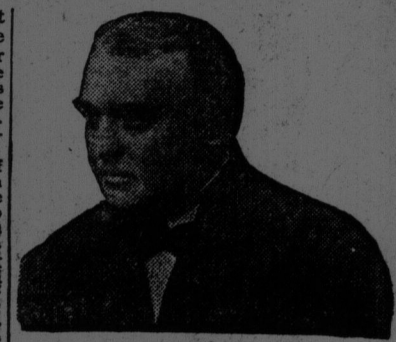

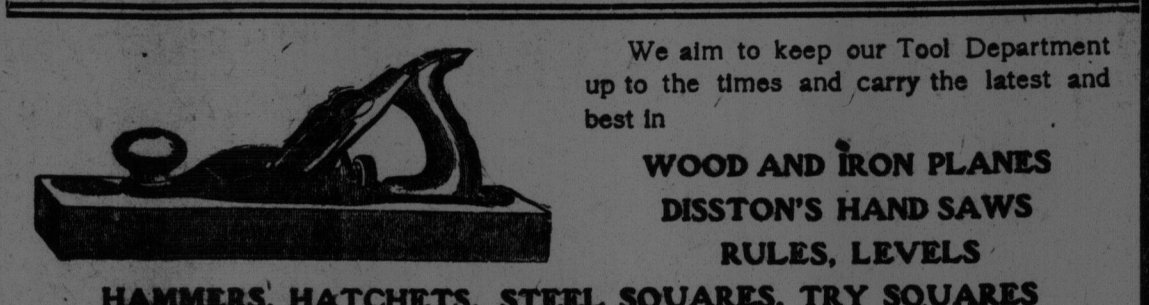

WHAT LED TO RECENT WORTH SHORE MURDER

Further Particulars of Tragedy In Which Two Died

GLOVER CLEARING LAND

Was in His Right Under Law as He Was Carrying Out Provisions of the Settlement Act for Richards Manufacturing Co.

In addition to particulars already published here, the Campbellton Graphic has the following on the murder of Elvin Annett, a lumber foreman, the shooting and wounding of John Glover, a lumber jobber, and the suicide of the murderer, Peter Rioux in the woods near Anderson in Restigouche county, on the intercolonial Railway:—

Sydney Sime, a native of Gaspé, a cook, tells the following story.

After the other men had left the camp which was before daylight he saw Peter Rioux leave his camp. He was only about six feet from the lumbermen's camp. He had his rifle with him and went in the direction taken by Annett. Some time later he saw Rioux return but without his rifle, enter the camp, and leave again with a small pack or harness on his back. He went into the woods in the opposite direction this time and a few minutes later he heard a shot.

Some time after, Arthur Peterson came into camp and told him Glover was shot. He went with him and the others and carried the wounded man to camp, and later to Anderson.

The Shooting of Glover
Arthur Peterson, Glover, Joseph Ammann, Anthony Ammann and Edwin Campbell left the camp before daylight and went to the scene of their operations on the Rioux grant. They were engaged skidding up logs. They had been working some little time when they were startled by the report of a gun. Glover, who was upon a log with an axe trimming off the limbs and was thus in a stooping position, fell over among the trees in a little hollow under the log, and a moment or so later called for help. Peterson who looked round in the direction of the sound, saw the smoke of the rifle shot.

Ammann and Campbell went to Glover's assistance, while Peterson was hurried off for the assistance of the cook. This was about 7:30 in the morning. Together they carried the injured man to the camp which was close by. There they made an examination of the wound and found it up as well as they could. Glover was conscious all the time and talked with the men. They then made a stretcher of blankets, rolled Glover up warmly and started for Anderson, which was about two miles distant, over a road in which the men with their burdens frequently went to their knees in mud.

Arriving in Anderson, Glover was made as comfortable as possible until the arrival of the express from Campbellton. On this train he was taken to St. Leonard, but as Glover would not be taken back to Campbellton a doctor dressed his wounds on the train. Arthur Peterson and Joseph Ammann stayed with the injured man until relieved by Dr. Lunan at Richford.

These two men both say that they saw Rioux talking with Annett and Glover several times recently and understood that he had threatened to shoot if they cut the lumber on his lot, but he was not taken seriously. There had never been any very angry words.

Glover There by Night

The Graphic gives an account of the finding of the body of Rioux, who had ended his life with his rifle, and says:—
"The primary cause of the murder was undoubtedly the fact that Glover was cutting lumber and this off the lot of 100 acres which Rioux had made application for and had been approved by notice published in the Royal Gazette, dated November 12, 1912."

"According to an act passed in 1875 any British subject over eighteen years of age who owns no other property in the province can apply for a grant to 100 acres for settlement purposes only, and upon approval a permit is issued, which calls for certain obligations which include the clearing of ten acres of the trees and real estate. By this act, if the lot so granted is leased timber limits, the leasee of said limits has until the first August to cut off the lumber on this granted land."

"In this present case the lessee of the timber limits were the Richards Manufacturing Company and they had given the ground in the vicinity including the Rioux lot to the jobber, John B. Glover with instructions to cut over the Rioux lot at once. The men were following these instructions when shot."

TO HELP FIND THE DROWNED

Murky Depths of Chicago River Are To Be Illuminated

The submarine light has long been a practical reality, but its use as a means to help the police in their ordinary routine was left to the Chicago Police Department. The submarine light will be part of the equipment of a new motor boat that was recently launched on the Chicago River, and will be used to illuminate the work of recovering the bodies of the drowned.

This will largely do away with the slow dragging method now in vogue, where searchers must run back and forth over the river bottom with cumbersome and inefficient grappling hooks. It will also be of great assistance, says Popular Mechanics, to divers when they are working under water.

This particular light consists of a cylindrical tungsten bulb of high power, whose rays are refracted through a heavy triangular prism of glass so as to light a large area on the bottom of the stream. The light is said to be much intensity that at depths of 18 to 20 feet, and will be partially illuminated at depths ranging from 20 to 30 feet.

The light is of special value in Chicago because of the large number of accidents that occur in the Chicago River, where the water is very dirty. The boat which carries the light is 38 feet long and 10 feet wide and is supplied with a 40-horsepower four cylinder motor capable of driving it at a speed of fifteen miles an hour.

Two police crews of four men each working on twelve-hour shifts will man the little motor craft. Day and night they will patrol forty-seven miles of river and twenty-seven miles of lake frontage.

The boat is not only intended to facilitate the recovery of dead bodies; it is equipped for rescue and resuscitation work as well. In the little cabin is a hospital cot which can be drawn out from a slide in the stern. Then the seats are folded back and there is ample room to work over an exhausted person. A first aid set is in a cabinet at one side of the cot.

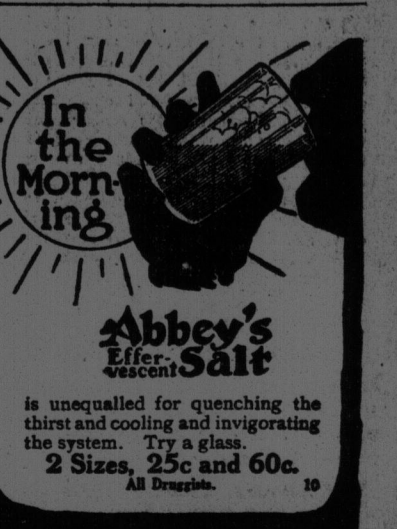

TEN THOUSAND A YEAR FOR THE ASTOR BABY

New York, Nov. 12—Surrogate Fowler has appointed Madeline Talmage, former Astor, widow of John Jacob Astor, general guardian of her infant son, John Jacob Astor. The surrogate fixed the allowance of the boy at \$10,000 a year for the next three years.

Colonel John Jacob Astor provided a fund of \$3,000,000 for this posthumous child. It is estimated that if the boy continues to draw only \$10,000 a year from this fund it will have increased to \$9,375,000 by the time he is of age.

Mrs. Astor's son was born on August 14 last. Under the law Mrs. Astor will act as his guardian in surrogate's court proceedings until he is fourteen years old. In her petition for appointment she informed the court she wishes her son's inheritance to increase in value until he is twenty-one. Until that time she intends to support and educate him. She desires the \$10,000 a year from the boy's money to help defray expenses.

Regerton L. Whitthrop, Jr., special guardian of the baby, recently reported that he had no objection to the probating of the will. In the will Mrs. Astor, the mother of the baby, was left \$5,000,000 in trust, to draw the income as long as she remains the widow of Mr. Astor. Mrs. Alice Muriel Astor, a daughter by the first wife, was left the income on \$5,000,000. Vincent Astor was bequeathed the bulk of the property.

SUSSEX MEN LIFT MILK PRICE

Sussex, Nov. 12—The farmers of Sussex and adjacent districts feel strongly that during the last ten years the advance in the price of milk has not been in proportion to the increase in the cost of production. Wages, they claim, have advanced enormously and the price of feed has doubled, but the price paid for milk has remained almost stationary.

On Saturday evening, Nov. 2, the farmers held a meeting to discuss the situation and to take action in the matter. The outcome was the formation of a Milk Shippers Association and at its meeting on Nov. 8 it was the unanimous decision of the association to demand an advance of five cents per can (eight quarts) on milk at twenty-five cents per can on cream. This advance in price to hold until Sept. 1, 1913.

TOO LIBERAL

It reads: (1)—What portions of Canada are solely under federal control and jurisdiction? (2)—What are the laws in respect to marriage in these districts? Nothing has been learned from E. A. Lancaster, M. P., father of the Lancaster bill, to indicate that he will reintroduce the subject this session.

GOES BACK TO PRISON AT SEVENTY TO DIE

Old Man Had Been Thirty Years Behind Bars—Career a Warning

New York, Nov. 12—Destined probably to end his days as a prisoner in Sing Sing prison, and earnestly hoping that he will never again be set at liberty, Henry H. Hudson, seventy years old, who has passed nearly one-half his life behind prison bars, was held up by Judge Foster, in Court of General Sessions, as an example to more youthful criminals and then sentenced to serve five more years in prison.

Green old and gray in the workshop and cells of penitentiaries and prisons, a method, even if he wanted to do so, freed from Dartmouth prison less than a month ago, Hudson deliberately solved the problem of obtaining a livelihood by stealing a horse and wagon belonging to Dr. Cyrus H. Dabois, arrested and hoping that he would be arrested and sent back to prison to end his life there. He was promptly arrested and again convicted of grand larceny.

A score of other prisoners were in the pen in the Court of General Sessions when the aged criminal was brought in to await his fate to be sentenced. They whistled away the minutes by teasing him. "Back to dear old Sing Sing for you, Grandpa," said one of the youths. "You'll be in the freshman class."

The old man turned on his tormentors and read them a biting lecture. "You're on the road, too, my boys," he said. "Keep it up and you'll fetch up where I am when you are seventy. You'll be breaking rocks or making chairs for the city or the state for most half your lives. You'll live high doing it, too, on beans and crackers. You'll see Broadway once in five years, and when you're old you won't have a friend on earth and you'll starve or die in prison. Keep it up, my lads, it's a grand life."

The judge questioned him, and the aged man admitted that he had served about thirty of his seventy years in prison for larceny, forgery and other crimes, and that he never realized enough to pay for his food and clothing when free.

"That ought to be an object lesson to you," said Judge Foster, turning to the younger prisoners. "This man has spent almost half his life in prison and he is penniless. The boys' home is on a ranch some distance from Walla Walla, and lack of funds seriously handicapped them in their ambition to get an education. Business is so good they are considering bringing in some more cows.

GOLDEN WEDDING

Hearty Congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Hawker

MARRIED NOV. 13, 1862

Eight Children With Them Today In Celebration of the Happy Anniversary—Have Good Wishes of Very Many Friends

Just fifty years ago today an interesting wedding was performed in this city by Rev. J. Prince, then pastor of Portland Methodist church, when he united in marriage Miss L. T. Dale and William Hawker, both of whom were then well known among the younger people of their time, and popular with all. Today they are far better known in the city, merited esteem and best wishes of a large circle of friends and enjoy the best of health, and are receiving the hearty congratulations of their many friends upon the happy and memorable event which it is their fortunate lot to observe. They spent the day quietly with their family, and a reunion of the eight surviving children, and their twenty grandchildren taking place at their home in Charlotte street.

Mr. Hawker was born in Little Barrington, Gloucester county, England, and came here in January, 1862, on the Allan liner "Hibernia," with the 16th Foot Regt. at the time of the Trent affair, having charge of the sick. He purchased his discharge from the army a short time later on receiving the appointment to take charge of the hospital which was then being completed. He changed his mind about this position, however, and a little later returned to his home in the Three Lamps. Success greeted his efforts and the business grew rapidly, until a little later in life he removed to the premises occupied at present under the firm name of Wm. Hawker & Sons, in Prince William street, being assisted in the business by some of the boys who had come to the family since.

On November 13, 1862, young Mr. Hawker married the young woman who today is his country, and who had come to this country in 1852 when she was a mere child, aboard the sailing vessel "Commodore," of which the late Captain Pritchard had command. Eleven children blessed their home, eight of whom are still living, and today rejoicing with their parents upon the happy anniversary.

There were six sons and five daughters, of whom the following survive: S. H. and Joseph B. of this city, Wm. C. of Waterville and J. Thomas of Montreal; Mrs. J. B. Thompson of this city, Mrs. E. M. Robson of Digby, N. S., and the Misses Elizabeth and Ethel at home. All are now in the city to unite today with their father and mother in the celebration in honor of their fiftieth anniversary.

The showers wishes of their family and very many friends are that Mr. and Mrs. Hawker will live to enjoy many more years of happy married life with an ever increasing number of good will and esteem than has been their happy possession in the past.

In honor of the anniversary Mr. and Mrs. Hawker received this morning a bunch of fifty red and white roses accompanied by a card bearing the inscription "Hearty congratulations and best wishes from a few friends, members of St. George's Society."
