King George, it is asserted on excellent authority, has resolved to revert to this rule, which will prove a source of satisfaction to the vast majority of Great Britain's hereditary legislators; for when the sovereign calls a peerage out of abey-ance in favor of any claimant, the latter becomes invested with precedence determ-ined by the date of the original creation of the dignity, and takes the "pas" of all the peers of his grade, whose honors are





SHOULD BRITAIN EVER ALTER HER FISCAL POLICY

German Publicist Sees Marked Effect on Fatherland In Such Case

FAR WORSE THAN WAR

Movement to Keep up Connection Between Homeland and Germans in Canada and the States -They Start Paper in Van-

(Times' Special Correspondence) Berlin, Sept. 16-Herr Hermann vom Rath, a well-known publicist and a member of the Prussian Diet, contributes an article to the "Tag" entitled "Germany's Economic Life Threatened," in which he draws attention to the danger which, he declares, hangs over his country should Great Britain alter her fiscal policy in favor of an even modified form of protection. In Herr vom Rath's opinion the days of the Liberal British Administration are numbered. Mr. Asquith's government he believes, is dying, and there can be litthe doubt that the Conservative idea in England at the present time is stronger than any other. No doubt is entertained by the writer that tariff reform will be the first object which the next conservative government will place before parliament, and it is the certainty of this which constitutes the danger to Germany's econber of the Prussian Diet, contributes an constitutes the danger to Germany's economic life. Protection, says Herr vom

Rath, has recently made enormous progress in England, and even Manchester, he adds, is beginning to attach itself to this view.

In the writer's opinion the present sources of revenue are insufficient for the enormous and increasing drain of expenditure, and fresh mines must be worked. These can be found only in some system of protection, and as England and Germany are the two countries which have the most extensive exchange of wares British protective tariffs would first strike Germany, and strike, her heavily. As matters are at present England is able to impose a duty on important imports from Germany without losing her "most-favored-nation" treatment from Germany.

The injury which would thereby be inflicted on German trade, and industry would be enormous. If the British patent laws compelled German manufacturers to establish branch factories in England, to a still greater extent would this be the case under protection. The injury which would follow to the German workman and the advantage which would follow for the British workman are evident. For Germans, says Herr vom Rath, the matter is peculiarly disagreeable when it is remembered that it is the naval competition between the two countries which is forcing England to adopt another fiscal system. Not only will Germany in future have to bear her own increased expenditure on the navy, but she will also, owing to the British protective tariffs, be obliged to bear a considerable portion of her rival's expenditure.

Herr vom Rath reminds his readers that this is not the first time he has raised a warning voice. It was all very well so long as the battle was confined to maritime matters, but infinitely more serious will be the struggle for Germany when it touches her economic life. The introduction of protection in Great Britain will, he maintains, be such a blow for Germany that even the possibility of a British attack fades into comparative insignificance, and it may, when too late probably, dawn on the short-sighted naval agitators in Germany that in striving
