ADMITTS A MURDER CHARGE TO CONVICT

Burglar Confesses Crime for Which Man is Serving Life Sentence.

Letter Takes News Calmly—Wife Worked as Waitress by Day and Laundress by Night to Clear Her Husband.

Columbus, O., Feb. 24.—Clarence Leroy McKinney, known as "Slim," behind the gray walls of the Ohio Penitentiary, dropped his tools in the looming mill and hurried to Warden Thomas' office in answer to an imperative summons. He found a reporter with the warden.

"You're free," he was told. "The other fellow pleaded guilty." McKinney's face twitched slightly and he said without emotion, "Oh, an'—"

NEW YORK SHIVERS, COAL STOCKS LOW

Fuel Issued Today Only on "Prescription."

The Confiscation of Fuel in Transport Prohibited—9,000 Tons Go to Bottom of Hudson—New England Situation Relieved.

New York, Feb. 24.—New York today shiveringly faced a biting north-wind and the mercury showed a temperature of the winter with coal bins almost empty. The temperature early today was less than ten above zero, and the weather bureau officials declared it was due to go lower.

FRENCH STEAMER CAUGHT IN ICE

900 EMIGRANTS SAIL FOR CANADA

London, Feb. 24.—(Canadian Press.)—The steamship Montcalm carried 900 emigrants for Canada on her latest voyage from Liverpool, this being the largest number of emigrants to leave that port this year. The majority of them were third class passengers. They included many agricultural workers and men who are going to work in the mines.

ASKS EXCLUSION OF LITHUANIA

Poland Would Have Her Dropped from Nations' League as Punishment for Her Aggressions—Reports from Neutral Zone Reassuring.

Warsaw, Feb. 24.—A demand that the League of Nations apply all possible penalties to Lithuania, including exclusion from the league for her alleged aggressions in the neutral district of Vilna, is made by Poland in a note forwarded to the league's headquarters. The note points out that the alleged aggressions took place while Poland was occupying the district in compliance with the orders of the council.

FIFTEEN MINUTES OF RADIO EACH DAY

POINTS TO REMEMBER.

REMEMBER THAT:

In order to obtain the best results in the use of galena as a crystal detector, it is advisable to secure a large piece of galena and break it up into smaller pieces. Each of these pieces should be tested and the one which operates most satisfactorily may be used as a standard and the sensitivity of other pieces compared with it. It is advisable to select a single transmitting station, to be used as a basis of signal strength, in order to obtain a fair comparison of the various pieces of crystal. In handling crystals, a small pair of pliers should be used to place the crystal in position, as contact with the fingers is liable to impair the sensitivity. The test buzzer, used as a means of locating the sensitive points on the crystal, is easily arranged and is an important feature of a crystal receiver, as the range over which the set will operate depends in a great measure on the adjustment of the crystal.

Regenerative receivers are super-sensitive to various forms of external electrical vibrations, in addition to those which are normally intercepted by the antenna and impressed upon the receiving set. These electrical disturbances may be due to static, to the alternating magnetic field of nearby power lines or capacity effects due to the close proximity of the hand or the body. In order to prevent these vibrations from inducing interfering currents in the receiver, the interior of the cabinet enclosing the apparatus should have a metallic lining such as copper foil or fine copper mesh. In addition, the individual circuits should be separated by a metallic surface so as to prevent inter-action between the various elements of the receiver. All sections of this metallic lining should be carefully soldered together so as to have a good electrical connection and should be grounded. This process is known as "shielding" and if properly carried out will reduce to a minimum the interference resulting from electrical disturbances which would otherwise induce currents in the receiver due to the tendency of the coils, themselves, to act as an antenna.

In radio receiving sets employing the vacuum tube, the addition of one stage of audio-frequency amplification has the effect of increasing the intensity of sounds approximately four to five times their normal strength with the detector tube alone. Two stages of audio-frequency amplification produce an increase in sound intensity from sixteen to twenty-five times their normal strength. Providing that a radio signal possesses sufficient strength to operate the detector and secure proper rectification, the employment of audio-frequency amplification will increase the range of the set by rendering extremely faint signals, clearly audible. It, however, the feeble impulses of the radiated signals lack sufficient power to actuate the detector, the use of audio-frequency amplification will produce no result.

The efficiency of a standard type of "half-wave" rectifier used for converting alternating current to direct current for charging storage batteries, is approximately 75 per cent. This is due to the fact that during the half-cycle when no current is flowing through the rectifier tube, only a small amount of energy sufficient for heating the filament and exciting the transformer, is drawn from the power supply.

In a regenerative receiver the production of oscillations by the tube may be detected by placing the finger on the grid terminal of the tube. A dull thud will be heard in the receiving telephones when the finger touches the terminal or when it is withdrawn. The oscillating point of the tube may also be determined by increasing the regenerative coupling to the point where a sudden hissing or rushing noise is heard in the receiving telephones. 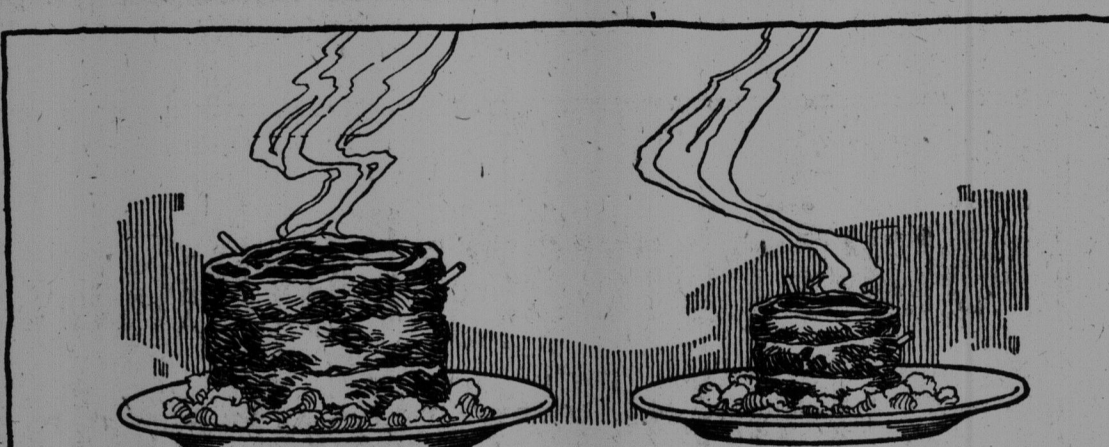
The Prince "Counted Out"

What Retards Trade?

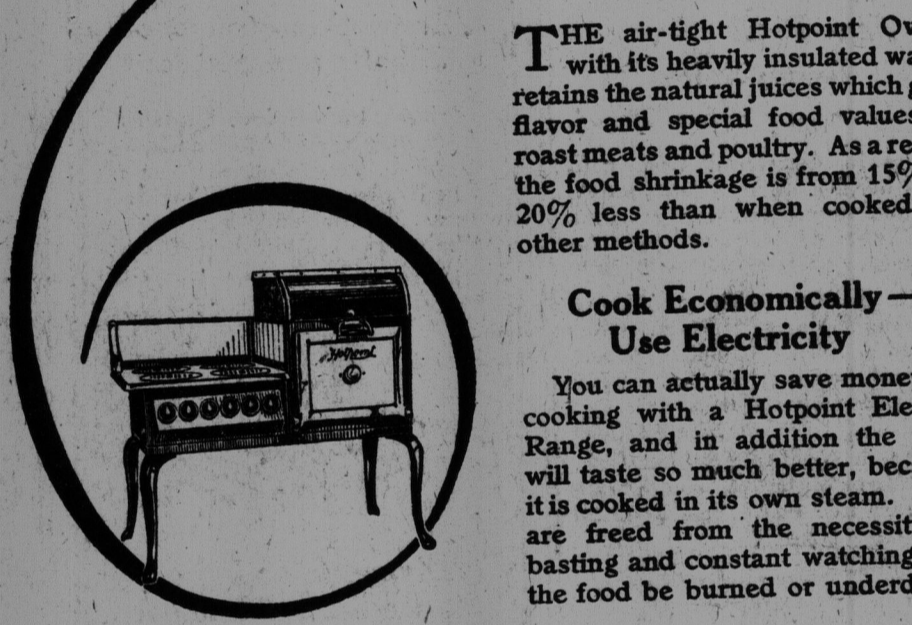
Everybody has been more or less on edge for the promised trade revival, the slow coming of which causes much disappointment, on all sides. One explanation of the way things still seem to hang fire, in spite of certain encouraging signs, is the arrival of debts that embarrass most retailers. But the moment trade revives and business shows signs of becoming brisk again, all these people are pressed for payment. The result is that they must clear their feet of debts before making any real reciprocal response to the reviving industrial market. Instead of a prompt placing of big orders, therefore, which would feed the revival with mutual reactions, there is still a hand-to-mouth system. Commercial travelers are confident, however, that in a little while things will hum.

State Visits Abroad

Each recurring season produces its crop of rumors regarding royal state visits to one or other of the Allies of the great war. This year is no exception. It is said that there is every

probability that Their Majesties may make such a trip to the continent during the year. There are several outstanding invitations which for various reasons have had to be deferred. Disputes Claim of Power Company That City Does Not Own North End Poles

RADIO SET FOR COUNTY HOSPITAL PYTHIAN GIFT

Building to be Wired So That All Can Enjoy It.

Forty to Fifty Head Sets Planned as Well as Loud Speaking Sets in Wards—Four Lodges Unite in Carrying Out Scheme.

The St. John County Hospital will be the first institution in this part of the country to be thoroughly equipped with radio apparatus when the plan decided on by the local lodges of the Knights of Pythias at meetings this week, is fulfilled. The members are enthusiastic over the proposal and the work is going ahead with all possible speed. It is planned to install a fully complete set and the necessary funds will be raised by voluntary subscription.

The idea first took root in the minds of members of the order while they were making their regular visits to sick Pythians. The suggestion then was to have a loud-speaking set in the reception room and to have the patients gather there for its use. It was later discovered, however, that only a small portion of these in the hospital would benefit from this plan as most could not leave their beds so it was decided to go ahead on a more extensive scale. Lodges endorse plan.

At meetings of the four lodges, Union, New Brunswick, St. John and Carleton Tower, the plan was endorsed and committees were appointed to look after the work of collecting the apparatus and looking after its installation. It was decided to raise the funds necessary for the proposal by voluntary subscription among the members of the order.

Another plan to install loud speaking sets in the different wards was modified when it was learned that the patients were in different conditions of health and, while some might wish to listen to the concerts, others would be too weak to do so. It was finally decided to install a high power receiving set, with a few low power sets for individual patients. This will be possible for a comparatively well patient to enjoy all the concerts without disturbing those in need of more rest and sleep. Some forty or fifty of these head sets will be included in the apparatus supplied.

In addition to picking up outside concerts, the set will enable the entertainments given at various times by city organizations in the building's auditorium to be broadcasted through the hospital to those unable to attend and will provide the possibility of gramophone playing in the reception room sent all over the building.

The committees are now examining sets. The engineer of one radio concern has been over the hospital and has been of inestimable help to the committee men in suggesting changes which will work for the best interests of the scheme. Other companies will be approached and the best possible apparatus will be used. This plan, when it is fulfilled, should prove a boon to those whose hands time hangs heavy and those who are unable to attend the entertainments given from time to time by well-wishers. Thus the visiting of fellow members in sickness, one of the main principles of the Pythian creed, may turn out a help to many afflicted with that dread disease, tuberculosis, and may aid them in keeping that contented feeling acknowledged to be vitally necessary in the cure of the disease.

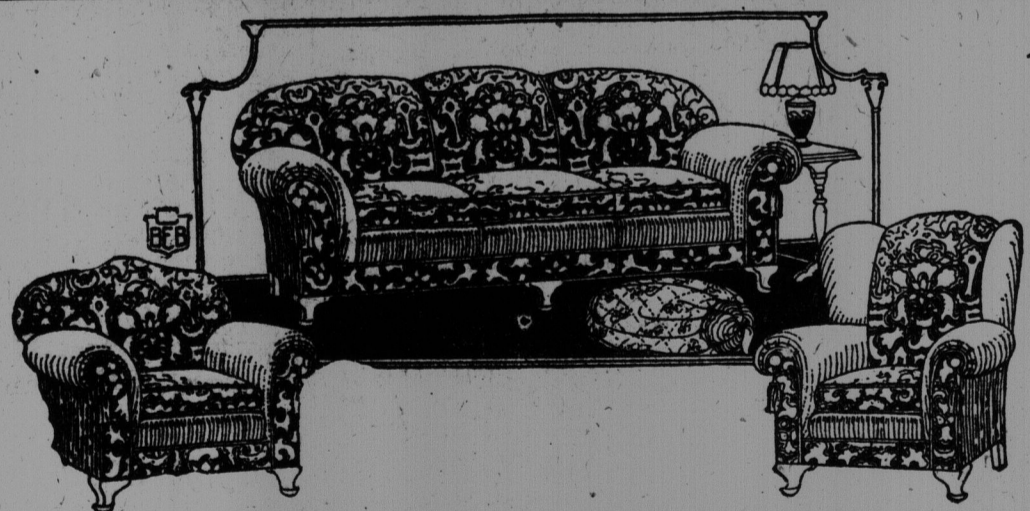

RINGING SPEECH FOR GREAT BRITAIN MADE IN SENATE AT WASHINGTON

SENATOR GLASS IN ELOQUENT ADDRESS SWAYED HOUSE ON DEBT ADJUSTMENT

Fine Sentiment in Speech of Virginian on War Performances and Responsibilities; the British Navy and the "Contemptibles" — Lives Versus Dollars.

(By Canadian Press.) Washington, Feb. 23.—Credit for the comparatively smooth passage of the British debt refunding legislation through the Senate was given to Senator Glass of Virginia, whose vigorous attack upon the opponents of the bill and clear-cut, logical argument in its favor are thought to have swayed the opinions of many of his fellow-members.

Declaring himself among those who thought "the indebtedness of the United States to Great Britain is not as great as Great Britain's indebtedness to the United States," Senator Glass delivered what was regarded to have been the most eloquent address heard in the Senate in years. He held the attention of the Senate for twenty minutes on the final day of the debate. Under the rules which had been adopted, each senator was allowed only ten minutes in which to speak, but so forceful and eloquent were the Virginia Senator's remarks he was allowed a second ten-minute period by consent of the House.

When he sat down, the majority of his associates on both sides of the chamber paid him the unusual tribute of leaving their seats and personally congratulating him. The speech of Senator Glass is still being discussed in Washington as one of the outstanding features of the debt refunding negotiations. It was both thrilling and scholarly, lacking nothing in rhetorical excellence or fervid sincerity. Incidentally, it was a very severe arraignment of those senators who during the debate had indulged in the once-popular but now very unpopular practice of twisting the British lion's tail.

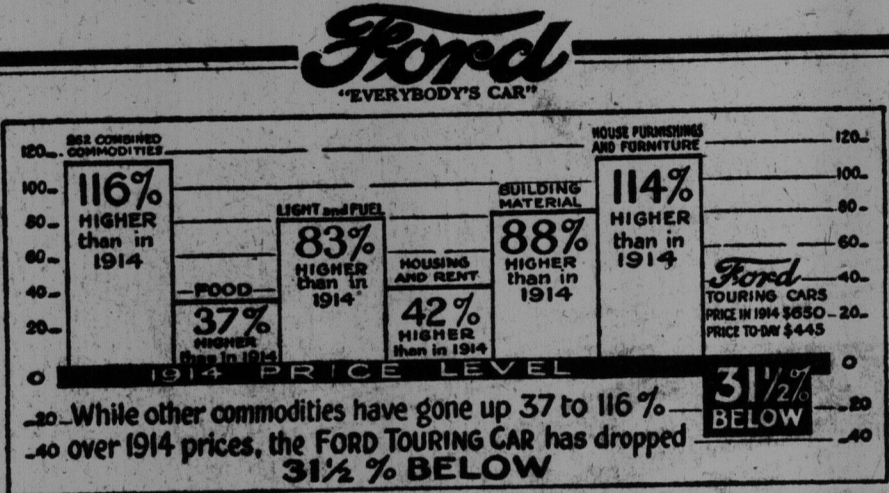

Ingenious Insulation. Rubber garden hose makes an ideal protection for ignition cables. Cut off a piece of rubber hose to the correct length, and run the wires through it and out the holes cut in the sides to conform with the location of the spark plugs.

Worth Remembering. An improvised grease container for filling grease cups can be quickly made by rolling a sheet of stiff wrapping paper into a small cornucopia. Pack the container with grease, tear off the pointed end, and roll the top as you would a tube of tooth paste.

Cleaning Dirty Pipes. A plugged gasoline or oil pipe can be

cleaned out by using the tire pump. A quick, sharp stroke of the pump will force air into the disconnected pipe at considerable pressure and, if not too tightly plugged, will blow it clear. If this fails, of course a wire must be used.

Economy on Wheels. To drive a car economically, the tires must be up to standard pressure, all bearings in good order, properly lubricated, the wheels in alignment, brakes properly adjusted, first-class cylinder oil, not too thick, good gasoline, distilled product preferred to casing-head, ignition system in first-class condition, valves well seated, pistons, rings and cylinders in first-class con-

dition, carburetor adjusted to give a slightly thin mixture, spark properly advanced, gasoline system free from leaks, and everything as nearly right as possible.

A Good Habit to Cultivate. Create a habit of using the emergency brake every day. This will keep you in practice, and you will become accustomed to reaching for it whenever

any emergency arises. It is also well to use this brake often to wear the emergency bands evenly with those on the service brakes.

Importance of the Motor Passport. An operator of a motor vehicle should not forget to carry both certificate of registration and license or operator's card (if any) on his person. In case of a violation, the possession of

these may save humiliation and embarrassment. In some jurisdictions, failure to have them is, in itself, an offense.

Keep a record of all numbers of the car.

Tighten bolts regularly to prevent squeaking.

Never keep an engine running when it is excessively hot.

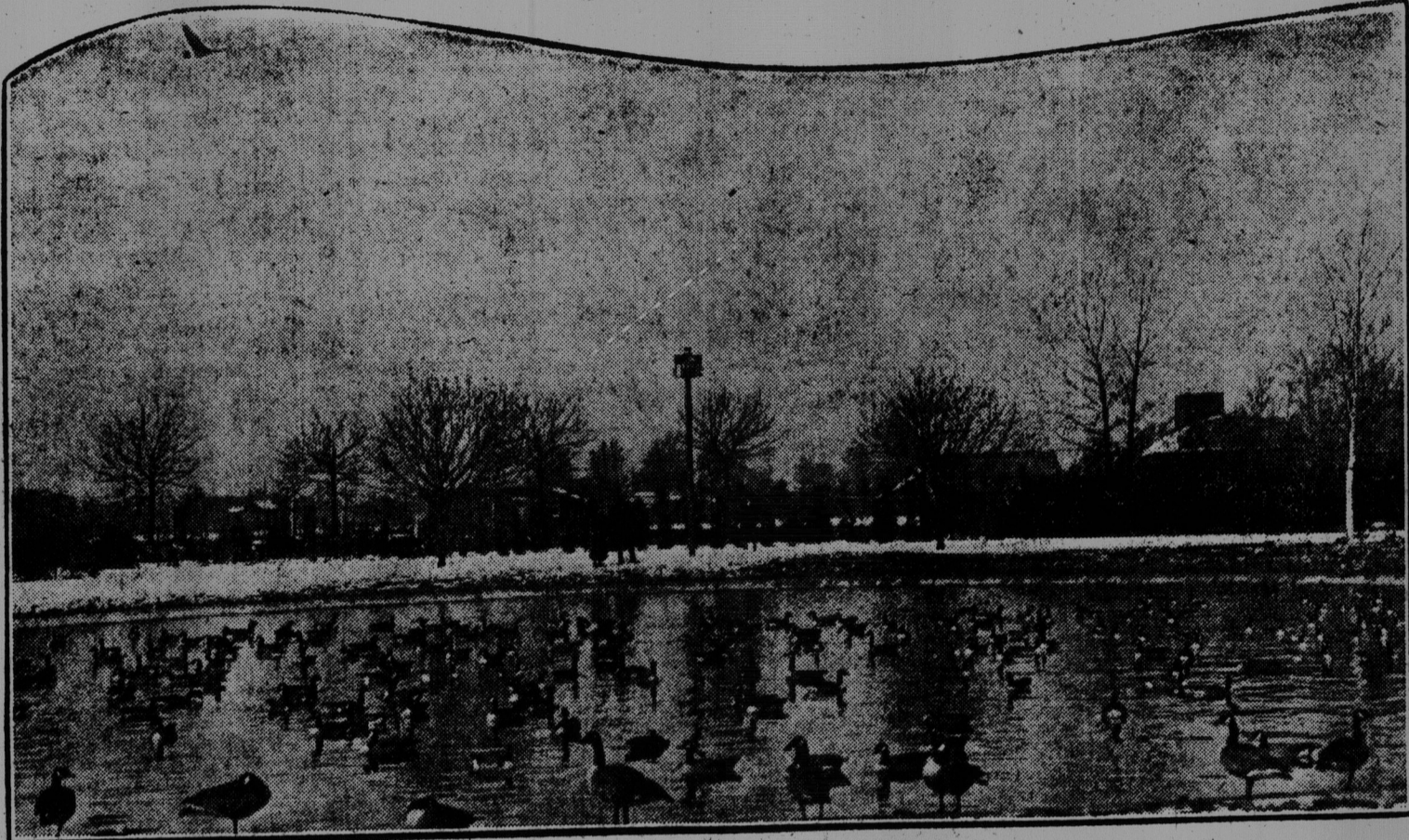

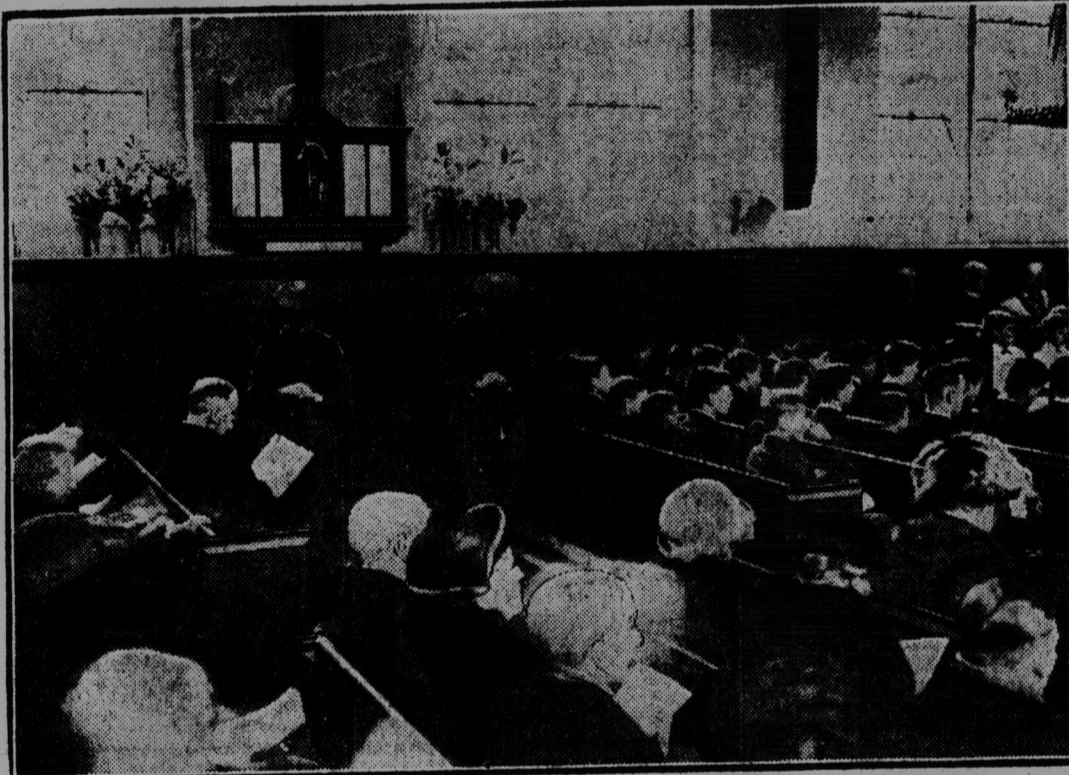

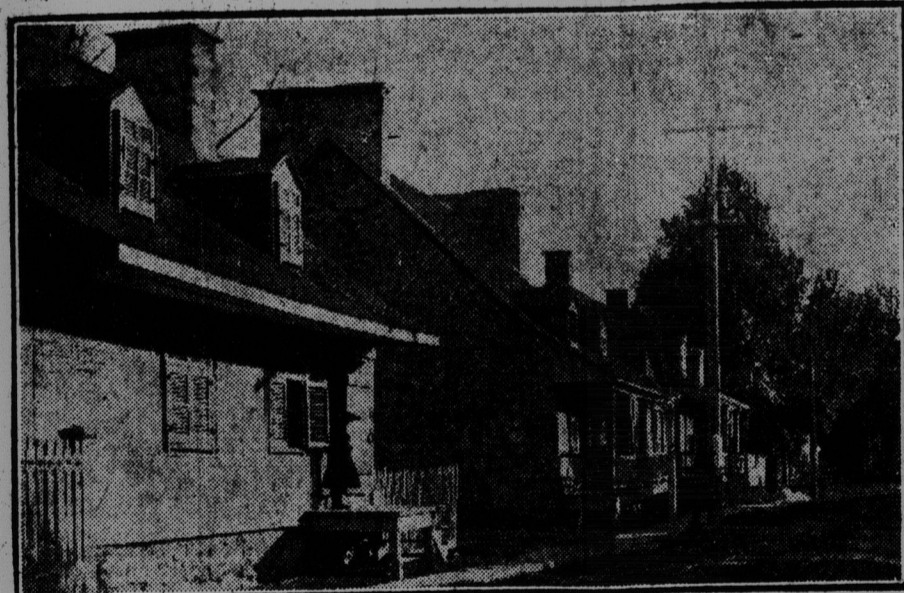

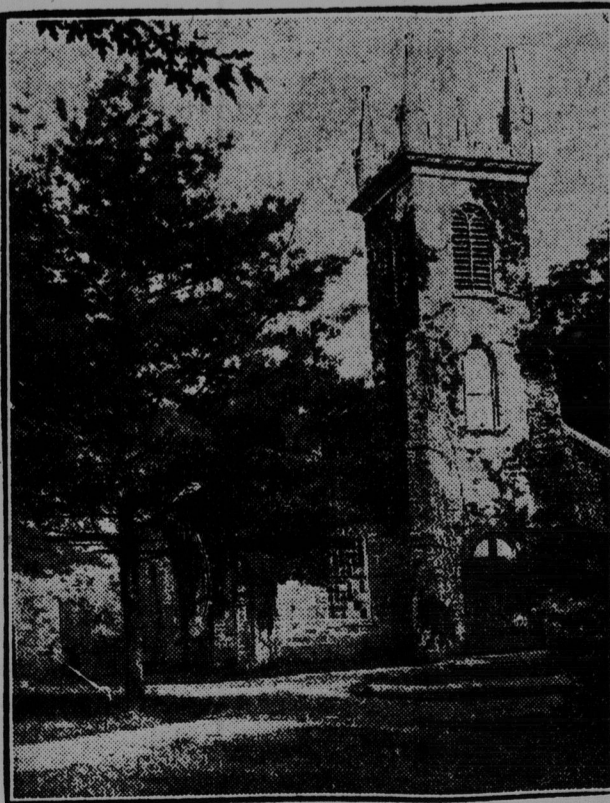

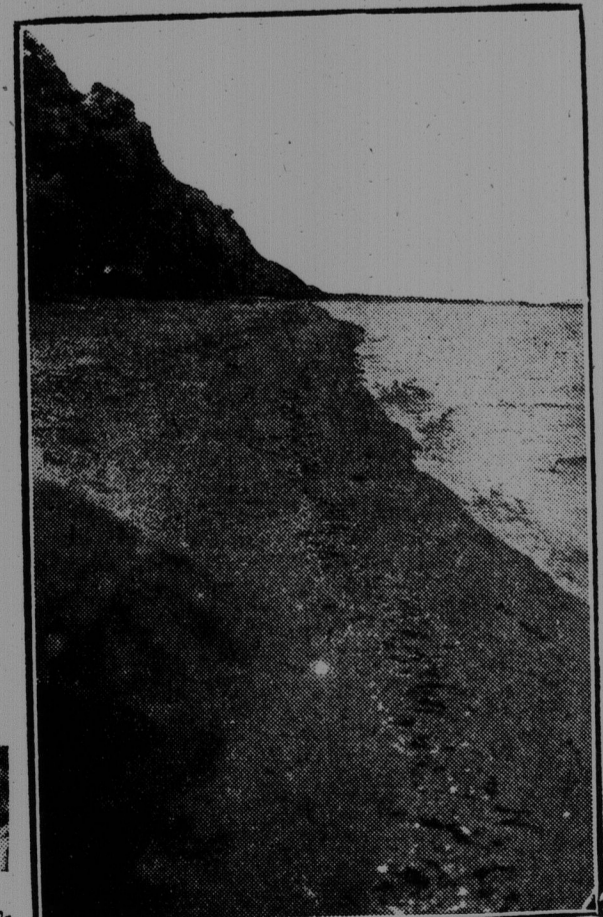
