Latest War News

Close Quarters
London, July 11.—After last night's assault the British remain in possession of Contalmaison, holding it against German counter-attacks and shell fighting. The British, bombing their way forward, gained considerably in Mamez Wood. The infantry is at such close quarters in the woods that guns on either side are not firing at the first line for fear of hitting their own men. Overhead shells are seen to fall into the reserves to the rear.

Casualty List Heavy
London, July 11.—To day's casualty list of British officers is the largest issued since the beginning of the offensive. It contains the names of 73 officers, many of whom belonged to the Newfoundland Contingent.

British Successes
London, July 12.—After ten days and nights of continuous fighting, our troops have completed the methodical capture of the whole of the enemy's first system of defences on a front of 14,000 yards. The system of defence consisted of numerous continuous lines of fire trenches. The German success in the recapture of Trones Wood after costly casualties was of short duration. To day we recaptured nearly the whole of the wood, and all but the northernmost end is again in our hands. Apart from the number of guns hidden in houses, we have in the course of these operations brought in 26 field guns, one naval gun one anti-air craft gun and one heavy howitzer, while the number of German prisoners exceeds 7,500.

Russian Prisoners
London, July 12.—The official figures for the Russian General Brusiloff's drive on the tenth of July are 271,630 prisoners, 312 guns and 866 machine guns.



POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word.

A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 35 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass with in the radiu of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

The Caribou Newfoundlanders At The Front

British Headquarters, France.

"What has most impressed me out here," said the distinguished neutral visitor, "is the wonderful rally of men from every corner of your world empire to fight in the cause of the Mother Country. Canadians, New Zealanders, Australians, West Indians, Indians"—he paused and then added, "And how many others."

"Newfoundlanders," I said, and that show it came about that I realized that there are actually imperial troops in France of whom countless people at home have probably not even yet heard. So yesterday I took the opportunity of paying a visit to the Newfoundland battalion in their rest billets somewhere in Artois.

They are a magnificent body of men, as one might indeed expect to find after reading Rudyard Kipling's "Campfire Courageous," although the class herein enlisted have mainly entered the Imperial Navy; over 2000 of them at present serving in the Royal Naval Reserve. The regiment since its arrival in France has taken its full share in trench warfare, and there is little doubt has left the mark of its quality upon the enemy, who are said to have dubbed them "The White Indians."

I gathered from a high-placed officer who is in a position to speak from personal experience that the great value of the "Caribou's," as he called them, lies in their wonderful adaptability to all conditions of fighting. For instance, they have developed a batch of snipers as good as any to be found along the entire front. As I believe the story of this gallant battalion has yet to be recorded, I cleared some particulars which should prove of interest.

The "tenth greatest island," which, being Britain's oldest colony, does not object to being styled such, offered on the outbreak of war to provide and maintain 500 men, fully equipped. It was later agreed that, if the War Office would undertake the equipment, the number could be considerably increased. One point upon which the corps dwells with a very justifiable delight is that 90 per cent. of its strength consists of bona fide Newfoundlanders.

When the battalion first arrived in Britain it was sent to Salisbury Plain to train with the Canadians. After this they were removed to Ayr, a change which was very welcome, owing to the traditional animosity between the hardy islanders and the Scotch. In September the battalion was sent to Gallipoli, arriving at Sulva about six weeks after the original landing in that zone. The Newfoundlanders were pushed up to the extreme left of the British front, occupying a spot which they named Caribon Hill, and it is their pride that they were actually nearer to Constantinople than any other troops in the Dardanelles Expeditionary Force.

During the torrential rains which lasted from November 17 to the 27th, when whole batches of men were washed out of their trenches and drowned, the Newfoundlanders managed to cling to their flood-swept positions with wonderful endurance and courage.

On the evacuation of Sulva the battalion went to Helles, where it was employed in preparing the ground for the final withdrawal from the peninsula. Thus the Newfoundlanders faced all the perils of the double withdrawal. A spell of recuperation in Egypt followed before the regiment came to France. I found opinion somewhat mixed upon the question whether they prefer life in France to the conditions upon the peninsula, although the preponderance is certainly in favour of the former.

Doubtless the outrageous weather of the past few days has had depressing effect upon the spirits of the men, notwithstanding that, as one of them remarked to me, "There is something homely about it after all."

The organization of the Newfoundland battalion is truly democratic, every officer having entered through

the ranks. Their chief source of complaint at present seems to be that, although they have been into the trenches and killed Boches, they have not had the real chance they are yearning for. "But when we do," said a six-foot-three giant, scowling and significantly tapping the bayonet at his side, "some and see us again directly after, and we'll give you something to write about." And I readily believe they will.—(P.A.)

Canadian Industry, Commerce And Finance

Canadian business men, and those in other countries doing business, or prepared to do business in Canada, have felt the need of a concise and accurate source of information concerning Canadian industry, commerce and finance. The first chapter on industry deals with each of the various branches of Canada's industrial development, in point of extent, production and possibilities. In his treatise on commerce the author treats the subject in all its phases, foreign commerce, domestic commerce, ocean transportation, inland water transportation, railroads, etc., are taken up in turn and the methods and terms explained.

The various markets of the world are described, and a section is devoted to weights and measures in use the world over. The chapter of finance deals with a wide array of subjects. The author first describes the development of banking and instruments of credit, and then deals with all methods in present use describing each separately, foreign exchange, bills of lading and shipping receipts, etc., mortgages, liens, deeds, stocks, bonds and all classes of insurance are given attention in this chapter.

Another useful and principal feature of the volume is the trade index or directory of all marketable commodities and Canadian producers. This list embodies a description of most commodities and accurate lists of the Canadian producers of each, with addresses.

The book is published by the Industrial and Educational Press, Limited to the Journal of Commerce, of which the Hon. W. E. Fielding is President and Editor-in-chief.

WAR NEWS

A Hun Admission

Berlin, July 9.--The British artillery has a devastating effect.

Important Points Taken

London, July 9.--The British in conjunction with the French, have advanced over half a mile to-day, taking important points prisoners and munitions. The Russians have also made marked progress, and capture over 12,000 prisoners.

Italians Consolidate Positions

Rome, July 9.--Notable artillery activity along the Trentino front is reported by the War Office in today's official statement. The positions recently won by the Italians, up the Asiago basin, were consolidated.

Russian Progress

Petrograd, July 10.--Important gains were made by the Russians in Southern Galicia. The railway town of Delatyn has been captured. On the lower Stokhod River the Austrians and Germans are retiring in great disorder.

German Losses

London, July 10.--German casualties from the beginning of the war to the end of June, computed from the official German list, is given at 3,013, 637 in an official statement.

French Make New Attack

Paris, July 10.--A new attack was launched in the Champagne by the French last night. The War Office announced the capture of trenches over a front of five hundred metres on the Somme front. The French took a line of German positions in the neighborhood of Barleux. In this section 950 Germans were captured yesterday and last night.

A Mile From Peronne

Paris, July 10th.--The French advanced three lines south of the Somme on Sunday for a mile and a half, capturing the German third positions along a length of three and one half miles. They are now within a mile of Peronne. French critics believe that the capture of Peronne now is a question almost of hours.

Steady British Advance

London, July 10.--The hostile artillery was more active to-day in the neighborhood of Ovillers, a mass of ruined cessant fighting is a sign of the progress of mud. We again made steady advance. In an attempt to retrieve to some extent the loss of the past week, the enemy this morning launched two violent attacks against our positions near Trones Wood. As in the case of his previous fruitless efforts, yesterday both attacks broke down before our guns. On the rest of the front there was nothing of importance.

Russians Pressing Upon Kovel

London, July 10.--A Reuter dispatch from Petrograd says the Russians are masters of the whole triangle comprising Rafalovka, Manevitchi and Kolk. The capture of enemy positions northwards and southwards at Sarney on the Kovel railway permitted the cavalry to rush the centre, resulting in the occupation of the station at Manevitchi, half way between the Sty and Stokhod Rivers. The infantry marched hard on the heels of the cavalry and are now in firm possession of the Manevitchi positions astride the Pinsk Kolk high road. Thus the enemy's attempt to turn the right flank of the Russian army which is thrust into the Lutsk salient has completely failed.

The continuance of the Russian advance in the region of the railway west of Kolk compels the Germans to fall further back from the Sty to the Stokhod. There is particular satisfaction over the capture of Gruzistyy west of Kolk which for days has been the arena of sanguinary fighting. It is stated that Austro-Germans amounting to five corps, or 200,000 men, have been entrusted with the defence of the approaches to Kovel. The Austrians have been strengthened by German reinforcements between Kovel and Rafalovka.



About Fish

We learn from the Trade Review that the only sales of fish last week were those made from merchant to merchant, to complete cargoes for export, and that the last lots were sold at \$6.70 per qt. for the quality known as "good Brazil." This, in our opinion, tends to prove that the price will remain firm.

Only very small quantities of new fish have as yet come in. This is probably owing to the prevalence of bad weather for curing the product. It was of a very small size, not much better than tomcods, but it realized \$6.50 per quintal.

Judging from the foregoing, the price is likely to go up when the first-grade fish begins to come in, and we would impress upon our fishermen the necessity of giving the strictest care and attention to the curing of their fish, and also point out to them the great advantage to be gained by putting the best article possible in the market.

The demand appears to be good. With American and French buyers anxious to secure all the fish they can get, and a short Norwegian catch as well, there seems to be no perceptible reason why our fishermen should not reap a rich harvest from the sea this season.

A good article is never dear. Let one and all, therefore, unite in a determination to excel in producing the best result possible for their labors, and make the article demand the price.

About Codoil

The codoil market seems to be in a very weak and fluctuating condition, and dealers appear to be undecided as to how things are likely to shape themselves.

Common oil, which a few weeks ago sold for \$1.50 per ton, is now quoted at \$142.50 for last year's product, while refined oil has dropped to \$1.75 and \$1.50 per gallon.

Refiners who have forwarded small lots to the St. John's market have, with the exception of those who had contracted for the high prices offered some time ago, found that they could not get more than \$1.75 per gallon for their goods.

Dealers, however, anticipate that the price will improve within a short time, but they do not feel disposed to take chances, and are consequently sitting tight.

We learn that a large percentage of the new oil coming in is of an inferior quality. This is regrettable, as, with codoil, like every other product, it is the quality of the article that counts.

Of course a large number of our people have gone into the oil refining business this year, and while some of them may lack experience, we think that by the exercise of due carefulness and judgment in their refineries they can succeed in turning out a product fully up to the standard.

Over production, or the production of an inferior article tends to depress the market and lower the price. The man who wants to build up a business and make that business pay will take as his motto—Quality not Quantity.

Graham Crosbie Dies of Wounds

"Regret to inform you that Record Office Nfld. Regiment, London, to-day reports that the Tenth General Hospital, Rouen, reports that your son, No. 1449 Private George G. Crosbie, died of wounds out of hospital July 4. J. R. BENNETT, Col. Secy."

The above is a copy of the message received by Mrs. Walter Crosbie on Monday last, informing her of the death of her son, Graham.

Private George Graham Crosbie was the eldest son of Walter and Minnie Crosbie, of Bay Roberts West. He was but 17 years of age when he enlisted, and barely 18 at the time of his death. He was a member of the C. L. B. of this town, and was popular and well-liked.

Leaving St. John's with F. Co. 1st Nfld. Regt., in June, 1915, he was on arrival in France, transferred to D Company, attached to the 29th Division.

No particulars regarding his death have as yet been received, but it is presumed he must have been in the thick of the fight during the great forward movement on July 1st, when our regiment suffered such heavy casualties.

His parents will have, we feel confident, the deepest sympathy of the entire community in their bereavement, and the Guardian joins with them.

At the present critical time, when the eyes of the entire community are fixed on the movements of our regiment at the front, and relatives and friends of the absent ones are anxiously awaiting news, it seems to us that the least we should expect from the Government is a morning and evening message each day.

We learn that some of the neighboring towns are thus favored, in some instances even receiving messages on Sunday, and it would be a matter of much gratification to our citizens if the same privileges were extended to them.

We, therefore, take this opportunity to call the attention of the Postal Telegraph authorities to the matter, and trust that it will not be overlooked.

Sagona's Report

Capt. Parsons of the S.S. Sagona wired the Reid Newfoundland Co. Wednesday night, which message was received yesterday, saying that the Sagona reached Nain on the 9th inst. Going north the weather was thick, with S. E. winds, but returning to Battle Hr. conditions were fine. Capt. Parsons reports a good sign of fish from Paul's Island to Queen's Lakes. From Turnsvic to King's Bay there is a good sign of cod, and the schooners are doing well. From the schooner to Long Island the fishery is poor.

More Cots Needed

The Newfoundland centre of the St. John's Ambulance Association is making a very special appeal for funds for the maintenance of hospital cots in France and England.

The appeal comes to Newfoundlanders very strongly now because of the casualties which have recently taken place in connection with our Regiment.

There is a Newfoundland ward of 30 cots in the St. John Ambulance Brigade Hospital at Etaples, France.

Two of the cots there are named Bay Roberts and Azariah Dawe respectively. These cots were given and are being supported by Mr. Azariah Dawe, of this town.

An impression is abroad that no more are wanted, but this is not the case. Many more are needed. The Royal Stores employees have guaranteed the upkeep of five cots a week during the duration of the war. Each cot costs \$5 per week. The money necessary for the upkeep of those need not be paid right down.

There are many wounded men belonging to our Regiment. Fresh beds are greatly needed owing to severe fighting. Who will help? The Guardian will be pleased to receive donations.

College Extension Lectures

PRELIMINARY NOTICE

Courses of lectures covering the requirements of the Licentiate in Arts of the Council of Higher Education and of the second, or Sophomore year, in certain Canadian Universities, will be organized for the next Academic year, beginning October 1st, 1916, and ending April 30th, 1917. The following, and possibly other subjects will be included:—English, Mathematics, Latin, French, Physics, Chemistry, Geology and Mineralogy.

Candidates passing successfully through such of those courses of lectures as are required for the Second Year in Arts in the Universities, will be admitted as Third Year students in the Universities, provided they are otherwise qualified. Each of the lecture courses will be open to qualified students whether they have graduation in view or not.
