It is estimated that the wheat crop of the three prairie provinces for last year 246,000,000 bushels will be available for export. This is sufficient to make 56,571,421 barrels of flour, sufficient for 9,889,998,675 loaves of bread of 24 ozs. each; which would provide one loaf for each day for a whole year to 27,123,264 people.

The Capture of Bitlis

Petrograd, Mar. 6.—An official statement regarding the capture of Bitlis, issued by the War Office, details the capture of Bitlis, and shows that our troops backed the position without firing a shot. The attack was made in the night during a snow storm, and about 3 o'clock in the morning a bayonet charge was ordered. The Turks, after a desperate resistance, were fledged and the Turkish artillery position stormed after hand to hand fighting the result of which was that the defenders, who fought with greatest desperation, were all killed on the position. In pursuit of the enemy we captured twenty guns, six latest Krupp types, all of which were in good condition. We also captured on the positions huge quantities of food and rifle cartridges. Each had in a large depot of ammunition. During the pursuit the Turks were captured, and the number of prisoners continues to increase and includes 40 officers.

Results of the Storm

The following message from C. C. Pittman of Lunenburg was received by the Marine and Fisheries Dept.—"Great destruction of fishery property along the coast in Sundays gale. Two dwelling houses at Mick's Cove were completely destroyed with sea and a store at Lord's Cove containing codtraps, etc., demolished.

Salvation Bands Composed of Women

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—Salvation Army bands, composed of women, will soon be a common sight in Canadian cities. Over 300 of these male musicians have joined bands in the various overseas contingents and more than 3,000 members of the Salvation Army have enlisted in the ranks. Kingston will have one of the first women bands, as cording to announcement here:

Now or Never For Germany

W. A. Williston cables to the Toronto News that the "Now or never" policy of the Germans in the West has led to a revival of speculation on naval possibilities. This, associated with a renewed interest in the navy by both sides and the undoubted new activity of the German navy, suggests a possibility of the enemy playing his final card if his endeavor to force a military decision fails. The British press, reflecting public opinion, insists upon the necessity for adequate preparations on land and sea, realizing the potentiality of enemy sea activity.

Letter from the Front

15 Gladstone Street, Bristol, England, Jan. 14, 1916.

Dear Father—I am back in Old England once more, after being 11 months in France and Belgium. It was just 11 months from the day I left my billet in Lavington till the day I left the firing line in Belgium. During that time I have had numerous very close calls. I will tell you about the last one.

About 15 days ago I was out with a working party of 18 men in a little shell-battered village in Belgium. We were trying to get some bricks for our horse lines. We had just got on the roof of an old ruined house and was putting a rope around it to pull it down when a shell burst about 200 yards away. We didn't worry about that. A moment later another came a little nearer, and soon another. Then we looked to see what was doing. There was only one gun popping at us. He cut his range about 30 yards left and lengthened it, about the same, so we knew we were under plain observation. But we wanted these bricks to keep our horses up out of the mud, and the boys who helped block the Kaiser's road to Calais in the face of thousands of shells and gas and other terrible things, were not the kind to be chased away by one little 18-pounder popping high explosives at us.

Letter from the Front

Every shot came nearer and nearer and we worked faster and faster till a shell hit the corner of the building next the one on which we were working. Then lead and iron and brick, wood, dirt and everything went in the air and started to fly around our ears. Sixteen of the 18 got hit. A brick got me in the right shoulder. A trick got me in the left. I pinched myself to see if I was dead, then picked myself up and discovered that something had torn a hole in the tail of my coat.

I looked around and found a piece of the shell that fitted the hole exactly. So I guess it must have made the hole. I have it with me now and will send it on to you to day. It's a piece of an 18-pound high explosive shell. Those of us who didn't get hurt too badly helped the other way to the ambulance. Again was the wonderful good luck of the company was with us, and nobody was killed. Eleven of the boys are here in England in hospital, all doing well.

But while we were trying to get our senses together to make sure we were not all dead, we heard the roar of a gun, close by, and then another. We then knew that the Montreal Heavies, under Major Magee, of St. John's, had sent two messages across the enemy's lines. We heard no more of the enemy gun. We learned later our old Canadian gun 17ers had put him out of action with just two shots.

Our wagons came up then and they loaded the bricks and pulled out. I had only been in the lines about 20 minutes when my horse, who is a good old brute, kicked me in the leg, for no other reason than because I gave him a nice feed of oats, then went behind him to fix his rug on him to keep him warm. I would not go to hospital as I knew my furlough would soon come, and I did so want to have a happy week with my friends here. I am staying with a lady friend I know in Canada. She was very sick and





Turks are Fleeing From Trebizond

A Central News despatch from Petrograd says the Turks are hastily evacuating Trebizond and the neighboring towns on the Black Sea coast of the Caucasus region.

The evacuation of Trebizond was made necessary by the approach of two Russian forces, one moving westward along the shores of the Black Sea through Rizeh, and the other in a north-westerly direction from Erzerum. An official statement from the War Office Saturday night said that Erzerum troops were within fifty miles of Trebizond. Unofficial reports have placed the second attacking army about the same distance from Trebizond on the Black Sea coast.

Trebizond lies 120 miles north-west of fortress of Erzerum, recently occupied by the Russians, and is the capital of a vilayet of the same name. The city stands on a plateau, surrounded by an old wall. It is an important trading centre and has a population of about 40,000. Xenophon and the Ten Thousand Greeks in their great retreat, reached the sea at Trebizond.

Petrograd's Monday night official statement said the Russians were still "pursuing the retreating Turks" in the Caucasus.

Liebon, Mar. 7.—Four German steamers, which had taken refuge in the port of Lourenco Marques, Portuguese East Africa, have been seized and the Portuguese flag hoisted on them. The crews of the vessels have been interned.

Volunteers Wanted

A proclamation appears in this week's Royal Gazette calling for volunteers to enlist in the ranks of the Empire's Army and Navy. Newfoundland has sent forth 2,000 men for the Army and 1250 men for the Navy. The idea is now to double the numbers. Men between 19 and 35 years old are wanted. Volunteers from outports will be given free passage to St. John's.
