Other great religi-tions retivalists have arisen in England from time to time, but few possessed the organising genius, the personal magnetism, and the power to move the masses that John Wesley knew so well how to exercise.

WESLET FORMS THE HOLY CLUB. At Lincoln College, Oxford, where Wesley was sent to complete his theo-logical studies, he soon gathered around him the most earnest of his fellow stu-dents. Among these were such men as Charles Wesley, George Whitfield, Wil-liam Morgan, and Robert Kirkham. Under Wesley's leadership, these con-genial spirits spent their time in de-votions, visiting the sick, the poor, and the prisoners. They were called at first, in derision by their fellow students, the Holy Club. As their methodical ways became better known the mem-bers of the Holy Club were dubbed Me-thodists. This word, so long a term of ridicule, was, in course of time, con-verted into a name of honor, and as studies Wesley was invited by his father, whose health was failing, to take up his work in Epworth, and as-sume the rectorship, but John Wesley's destiny led him into other paths. Crossing the Atlantic, he spent two years in ministering to the aborigines and to the colonists. Wes-ley was dismayed to find that class dis-tinctions were already dividing the lit-the community. The children of the well-to-do regarded with contempt the children of the poor, who went shoeless to the Sunday school Wesley had founded. To rebuke the young snobs Wesley appeared one Sunday at the school with neither shoes nor stock-ings, and thus taught his flock the folly of pride in merely worldly possessions. Thereafter shoes ceased to be a class distinction. While in America a Miss Sophia Hopkey entertained matrimon-ial designs towards Wesley, but he was not minded to gspouse her. She mar-ried Willism Villiamson, and the pair set about stirring up the people against Wesley, on account of the rigid Church-ly rules he enforced. Finally Wesley declined to administer the Lord's Sup-per to the couple, and they had him ar-rested for the refusal. Wesley soon af-terwards returned to England, but his soul was troubled. 


