This would lead to the absorption of the Austrian provinces of German mationality by Germany and the consequent extension of German dominion to Trieste, which would forever be lost to Italy. What is believed in high quarters to be an authoritative outline of the territorial demands of Italy and the position of Austria in regard to them was obtained today. The difference between the Italian and Aus-lan points of view as thus indicated, appears to be so great that well-informed persons are able to perceive no likelihood of an adjustment. Roughly speaking, Italy desires a sweep of territory to the north and east which would extend her boundary around the northern end of the Aegean Sea as far south as Flume, on the eastern coast. This would include the Austrian naval base at Pola, as well as the provinces of Trent and Trieste, acquisition of which had been Italy's long-che-ised aspiration. The concessions which Austria is believed to be will-ing to make are insignificant, as compared with the demand. It is regarded as probable that, under pressure from Germany, the negotations may be extended, and Austria may be Induced to grant (Continued on page 2)

Reports from the war zone indicate that the Allied forces on both sides of the theatre of hostilities are making preparations for the mighty advance which is expected to bring the world's greatest conflict to a conclusion, pos-sibly more speedily than was at first believed. For the past week or ten days the story from the western front has been but a repetition of British has been but a repetition of British and French successes, and it is now stated that these are but preliminary to the commencement of that forward movement against the German bosts for which the war-weary world has ong waited.

Last autumn found the Allies in France and Flanders greatly outnum-bered by the enemy. The Germans had made signal gains of territory and were confidently aggressive. When
