



Inter-Collegiate Young Men's Christian Association.

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This department of the Y. M. C. A. movement was founded in 1877, and is now the largest student organization in existence. The first college Association was organized in the

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University of Michigan in 1858, and from that time until² 1877 the number of Associations on the Continent had increased to only 26, and these were bound together by no tie, and had no common purposes or methods of work. But since the Inter-Collegiate movement these 26 Associations have increased to over 500 in our own country; and besides the Associations in North America, the movement now includes the Student Unions of Great Britain, Germany, Scandinavia, The Netherlands, France, Switzerland, Australia, South Africa, Japan, India, Ceylon, China and other mission lands. Every prominent Institution of higher learning in the United States and Canada has now its organization, and within twenty years, more than 30,000 College men have been influenced to become followers of Jesus Christ, and tens of thousands of men have been trained in methods of Christian work. Thus is the College Association beng used of the Lord for hastening the coming of His Kingdom.

Its purposes are threefold :

I. To bring the students of the world to Christ.

2. To guard and develop them in true character building.

3. To send them into the activities of life true Christian citizens.

Our Work.

Our Association has endeavored in the past year as heretofore, to keep in intimate contact with the work of the other Colleges and the International Committee.

At the Intercollegiate Y. M. C. A. Convention, which met with the U. N. B. Assn., Fredericton, N. B. in November, "Acadia" was represented by thirteen delegates. Their reports to the Assn. made very manifest to us that a gracious time was experienced, and the spiritual quickening they received was communicated by the delegates to the life of the Association. We also had a representative at the Maritime Y. M. C. A. Convention in St. John, N. B. in February. Two of our members have been delegated to attend the Students' Convention at Northfield in June, and we will receive reports from them, when we return to study in the autumn.

In the early part of the year we had a visit from Evangelist Sayford and his co-worker Mr. Hooper. Their stay of three or four days with us was stimulating to the spiritual life of the Association, and every member felt blessed by their visit.

Sunday afternoon services were held throughout the College year, by members of the Association, at White Rock Mills, Forest Hill, Greenfield, Newtonville, Walbrook, and the Poor Farm. This work is under the direction of our Religious Work Committee.

A thorough course of Bible Study was carried on in the different classes of College and Academy, by well qualified teachers. This is an important part of our work and every student should be enrolled as a member for Bible study in his own particular class.

The Volunteer Band during the year pursued a systematic study of Missions. The first part of the year it took up a book on China Mission work with the title. "Down on the Hills of T'Ang;" the second term: "The Planting and Development of Mission Churches."

Regular contributions to mission work are made each year by the Association.

The various Committees desire the hearty support of all the students during the coming year in sympathy, work and money.

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
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
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
