HOTHAM INLET.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Sept. 27.—

The steam schooner Fulton, has arrived,

FRENCH IN FASHION.

BRITAIN AWAITING LORD CROMER'S ARRIVAL AT CAIRO BEFORE TAKING ACTIVE MEASURES.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—The London correspondent of the Birmingham Post, writes that nothing will be done by the government in the matter of the French occupation of Fashoda until Lord Cromer, the British diplomatic agent in Egypt, who left here on Monday, arrives at Cairo, where the first stage of the negotiations will be carried on. The French Ministry apparently desires to remove the arena of discussion as far as Paris.

In Paris it is considered necessary in diplomatic circles that the Egyptian question should be settled to the bottom, and a modus vivendi established in order to reach an equitable and logical solution.

The Chronicle says it fears that while Englishmen and Frenchmen are speculating as to the outcome of the Fashoda affair, there is little left to speculate about. The contingency of Major Marchand's arrival was anticipated, and everything has since passed exactly as was arranged.

There is nothing in British or Egyptian law to prevent Major Marchand from displaying the tri-colored flag as long as he refrains from hostility, but the presence of the flag is as detestable of international meaning, as would be the British flag flying from an English ship in Paris.

The real significance of the situation is that the French placed themselves in a difficult position, from which Great Britain has every desire to assist in extricating them. The next move in any event, will be taken by France, and short of the withdrawal of the French Ambassador from London and a declaration of war, there is no alternative but to accept the situation. Great Britain will not allow armed reinforcements to reach Major Marchand, whose return will accordingly be a mere matter of time.

When France has accepted the inevitable at Fashoda, it is probable that Great Britain will consent to the neutralization of the Nile from its mouth to the lake, thus extending the principle on which the international status of the Suez canal was established.

Paris, Sept. 29.—The "Gaulois" quotes the Minister of the Colonies as saying that there is nothing in the attitude of the government that could suggest a foundation for the stories current of the government's abandonment of Major Marchand, whose expedition is now at Fashoda. No steps will be taken in any direction, the minister is reported as saying, until Major Marchand reports his arrival, and in the meantime existing orders for the guidance of the expedition will not be modified.

PARIS, Sept. 29.—At the Cabinet Council the Minister of Foreign Affairs, M. Delcasse, read a telegram from General Sir Herbert Kitchener, the British commander on the Nile, which had been communicated to the French Foreign Office.

"At Fashoda, Sept. 19, Marchand, being French 612. Marchand arrived on July 10 with eight officers and one hundred and twenty Soudanese tirailleurs."

The despatch also said that Major Marchand told General Kitchener that he had sent despatches to the French Government through the Congo and Abyssinia. Neither of these communications, however, has yet been received by the French Minister of Foreign Affairs. The latter also said that it was not true that any orders had been sent to Major Marchand.

A NATURAL QUERER.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—A despatch from the "Daily Mail" from Capetown says General Kitchener has called the Hon. Cecil Rhodes that he has established a post south of Fashoda and asks: "When are you coming up?"

LONDON, Sept. 29.—The Cairo correspondent of the "Daily Times" says: "The Soudan will become the first Governor-General of the Soudan, and he will take post for a time, but he will resign the Soudan. Major Marchand was in strict with the Soudan, and was glad to receive supplies from the latter, without which he would have been compelled to quit Fashoda. Major Marchand was unable to show any authority from the French Government for holding the place."

A DREADFUL FATALITY.

FOUR CHILDREN BURNED TO DEATH.

SHERBROOKE, Que., Oct. 3.—Four children of a farmer named Cloutier, of St. Severin, Beauce county, were burned to death in their father's barn yesterday.

How the fire originated is a mystery which the coroner is at present investigating. The children were all young.
