SPECIAL MEETING TOWN FATHERS.

Chatham-Red Bank Subsidy Can't be Obtained From Ottawa.

SEWER EXTENSION.

Lively Debate on Bill Board Question.—Overdraft Reduced to \$24,000.

A special meeting of the Town Council was held in the Town Hall on Monday evening. There were present; His Worship the Mayor, and Ald. Belyea, John Clark, T. A. Clarke, Falconer, McMurdo and Russell.

His Worship read a communication asking for what sum per square yard the town council would agree to lay a granite sidewalk in front of the post office property. He added that he had since seen Mr. D. W. Waterbury and signed an agreement with him to have the sidewalk on Pleasant and Henry streets laid at the actual cost not to exceed \$2.25 per square yard. Mr. Waterbury also agreed to recommend to the Public Works Department the placing of a similar sidewalk in front of the armory.

Communications were read from W. S. Loggie, M. P. re Dominion subsidy for the John Russell Co's steamer "Rustler," stating that he had brought before both the Trade and Commerce and Postal departments Messrs. Russell's claims for subsidy but had absolutely failed to induce either departments to make a grant. Filed. Communication was read from R. A. Lawlor re Miss Murphy's claim against the town for damages sustained from defective sidewalk. Mr. Lawlor asked the council to defer compulsory collection of Miss Murphy's taxes until such time as he could meet them in consultation. Filed.

Communications from the Union of Canadian Municipalities were received, one inviting the Council to send a delegate to the Annual Convention to be held at Port Arthur, Ontario, August 13th to 16th, and the other urging the early payment of the annual fee of ten dollars.

On motion it was resolved to lay these communications on the table and ask for further information.

Communication was received from Aemilius Jarvis of Toronto re some \$300 accrued interest unpaid on bonds.

On motion the communication was filed. Communication from Albert Hickey asking to be relieved from taxes for the years 1903, 1904 and 1905, as he was not living in town those years, was, on motion, referred to committee on petitions.

The Mayor reported that as the town was receiving only three per cent. on their deposits in the bank and had to pay five per cent. for their overdraft, he and the town treasurer had that day paid off \$6,000 of the overdraft reducing the latter to \$24,000.

Ald. McMurdo reported for Board of Public Works committee stating that (1) to lay a ten inch sewer pipe from John Ferguson's residence to the Adams school would cost about \$165, and (2) recommending the purchase of a car of cement for sidewalks.

QUEBEC'S LIBEL SUIT.

The libel suit brought against Oliver Asselin, editor of Le Nationaliste of Montreal, by Hon. Jean Prevost, minister of colonization, mines and fisheries in the Quebec government, in the course of which Baron de L'Epine of Belgium, a witness for the defence, testified that Hon. A. Turgeon had stipulated with him (L'Epine) that the Belgian company L'Epine represented must pay one dollar per acre for colonization lands of which price seventy per cent. was to go to the provincial treasury and the remainder to an election fund, resulted in a disagreement. The jury stood six to six.

and John Russell it was resolved that Committee be authorized to construct the sewer by contract, work to be completed by August 15th.

On motion it was decided to order a car of cement.

The question of appointing an Inspector to see about taps that are allowed to waste the water of the town was discussed, but no action was taken.

Progress was reported concerning the preparation of plans for a new coal shed.

Ald. Falconer complained that he had not been consulted about the construction of the circus billboards, which were closing the entrance to the public slip. He understood that Ald. Russell, another member of the Park and Fire Committee, had not been consulted.

The Mayor said that he himself had, upon receiving \$25 more for a license than had ever before been obtained from a circus, authorized the erection of the board, and would again, under similar circumstances, do so.

Ald. John Clark, chairman of the Park and Fire Committee, said that he had not been consulted either in the matter, and that he felt the sight so keenly that he thereupon tendered his resignation as chairman.

Ald. McMurdo moved that the resignation be accepted. This motion was not seconded.

Ald. A. Clarke moved that the resignation be not accepted, and his motion was seconded by Ald. Falconer.

Ald. John Clark and Falconer spoke on the matter.

The Mayor left the chair which was taken by Ald. Belyea. He claimed that the slip was under the jurisdiction of the County, but that if any department of the council had anything to do with it it was the Public Works Committee.

Ald. Clark contended that the slip which is closed by the bill boards was part of the Park, the whole of which, as well as the land on which the town hall is situated, belongs to the county. As long as the County allows the town to use County property as a park, control of that property properly belonged to the Park and Fire Committee.

Ald. T. A. Clarke's motion was adopted.

Ald. Belyea gave notice that at the regular meeting in July he would move a bye-law imposing a license upon each pool and billiard table and bowling alley, etc., in town.

Adjourned.

OPPOSITION OPEN THEIR CAMPAIGN.

J. D. Hazen and James H. Crockett Spend Several Days on The Miramichi.

BEGIN TO ORGANIZE.

A Party Caucus Held In Newcastle Saturday Night.

Messrs. J. D. Hazen, leader of the local opposition, and Jas. H. Crockett, of the Fredericton Gleaner, visited Newcastle, Millerton, Chatham and other places in this county last week in company with Mr. John McKane of Bridgetown. On Wednesday the three gentlemen visited Millerton, where Mr. James Robinson, ex-M. P. resides, and, we presume, thoroughly discussed the political situation with that veteran campaigner.

On Thursday, the Edward Sinclair Lumber Company's mill at Bridgetown was visited. Mr. McLane shut down the works and addressed the men on the political outlook, closing by introducing to them Mr. Hazen, who then spoke to them at some length.

The same day Messrs. McKane, Hazen, Crockett and Robt. H. Armstrong visited Chatham, calling on the Opposition leaders there.

On Saturday evening a meeting was held in Mr. Crockett's room in the Miramichi Hotel, at which, besides the above named gentlemen, W. A. Mott, ex-M. P. of Campbellton; D. Morrison, and John Morrissy, M. P.'s, and others of Newcastle were present.

The opposition are hard at work organizing their following in the county, and it behooves the Government to look well to their own standing if they would win four seats in Northumberland at the next election.

I. C. R. P. SPRING.

Ottawa, June 4.—For one month ending March 31 surplus on Intercolonial Railway will be \$218,000. For the 12 months ending June it will be in the vicinity of \$300,000.

The Department of Marine and Fisheries in conjunction with the I. C. R. is doing all that it can to obtain information and make arrangements for carrying fresh fish in cold storage from Halifax, St. John and Canso, by Intercolonial Railway to Quebec and Ontario markets. An appropriation for this was secured last session of Parliament.

CHATHAM CATHEDRAL.

At Chatham on Sunday service was held in the New Roman Catholic Cathedral, the basement of which has just been finished. At the 10 o'clock service, Bishop Barry, assisted by Monsignors Dugal, V. G., and Vargly, ordained Messrs. Claude Cyr of St. Hilaire, George Bernier of St. Basil, Nazaire Savoie, Rogersville to the priesthood, and Joseph Albert Hart of Edmundston to minor orders. The new cathedral which, when completed will cost in the vicinity of \$200,000, was begun in 1903. The exterior, with the exception of the spire, is finished, but the interior of the main church will not be completed for some years. The basement where Sunday services will be held is beautifully finished and has a seating capacity of 1,200.

PREMIER MEETS HIS SUPPORTERS.

Local Government Caucuses Held in Fredericton on Thursday and Friday Last.

PUGSLEY FAREWELLS.

Premier Robinson Makes Good Impression.—No Cabinet Change Yet Announced.

Fredericton, N. B., June 6.—A caucus of members of the legislature supporting the government, held in the executive council chambers this evening was presided over by Mr. Barnes, of Kent. The only absentees were Messrs. Young, of Gloucester, who is ill; Farris and King, at present in the old country, and Whitehead, of York.

Premier Robinson came in for a most cordial reception and the proceedings were most harmonious. Matters in connection with the policy of the party were discussed.

At the conclusion of the caucus, ex-Premier Pugsley entertained the members of the legislature supporting the government and head officials of the several departments at a farewell dinner at the Queen hotel. It was a most successful function and everything passed off pleasantly. There were more than fifty guests, and not a vacant seat. Dr. Pugsley had on his right Premier Robinson and Speaker Osman and on his left F. B. Carvell, M. P., for Carleton, and Hon. C. E. LaBillois. Surveyor-General Sweeney occupied the vice-chair, having A. B. Copp on his left and Deputy Receiver-General Babbitt on his right.

The health of the King was proposed by the chairman and drunk with musical honors.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley proposed the health of Premier Robinson, who responded to the toast in an elo-

quent speech, which was frequently punctuated by applause. He paid an eloquent tribute to the work of Dr. Pugsley, and expressed the opinion that he would soon be filling a higher position in the great council of the nation. He, Robinson, will follow the same progressive lines which had marked the administration of his predecessor, and it would always be his aim to give the people good, sound, honest, economical government. He felt that New Brunswick was on the eve of great development in the way of transportation and he felt sure that St. John was destined to be the great winter port of Canada. Moncton also, he thought had a wonderful future before it.

The vice-chairman proposed the health of F. B. Carvell, M. P., and that gentleman responded in an able speech, which was applauded again and again. He paid an eloquent tribute to the work of Dr. Pugsley, and predicted that he would soon be occupying a very high position in the public life of Canada.

Hon. F. J. Sweeney, in an interesting speech, proposed the health of ex-Premier Pugsley, and the company joined in singing For He's a Jolly Good Fellow.

Dr. Pugsley, replying to the toast, said that he did not consider himself worthy of all the kind words that had been spoken concerning him. He had been a member of the government since 1885, and had done his best to advance the interests of the province. He believed that the affairs of the province during the past twenty-three years had been honestly and economically administered and the government would be sustained when next it appealed for the support of the people. He thought it was decidedly in the interest of the country that the government so ably led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier should also be maintained in power for it had done much to advance the interests of the country. He thought that New Brunswick was on the threshold of a great era of prosperity and in this connection he made mention of the railway development that is now going on in the province. In conclusion, Dr. Pugsley spoke of the pleasant relations which always existed between himself and his supporters in the legislature, and assured the latter that he would always maintain a friendly interest in their work.

Short addresses were made by Hon. G. F. Hill, Urban Johnson, G. W. Allan, M. P. P., and George N. Babbitt, deputy receiver-general. It was after 3 o'clock when the gathering broke up.

Fredericton, June 7.—The local government and the members of the legislature who were here at-

tending the caucus, left on this evening's train for St. John. The prevailing opinion is that Geo. W. Allen will be appointed attorney-general for the time being, and Mr. Barnes a member of the executive without portfolio.

GOOD WORDS FOR THE GOVERNOR.

His Honor Lieutenant Governor Tweedie is filling his high position in a most acceptable manner and those who have come frequently in touch with him since his promotion to the office of Chief Magistrate of the province say that he is destined to become one of the most popular governors the province has ever had. He was the only member of the Blair government who told his leader on the floors of the legislature what he thought of his methods of handling his colleagues. TO VISIT NEW BRUNSWICK

His Excellency the Governor-General will visit his province in August. The vice-regal party will arrive in St. John at about eleven o'clock on the morning of Tuesday, August 13th. Wednesday will be spent in St. John, and Thursday in Fredericton. On Friday Earl Grey will return to St. John.

On Wednesday evening there will be a dinner in honor of His Excellency at the Union Club. The dinner will be given by the Lieutenant Governor and the government. On the day following the Governor General will go to Fredericton by boat. On the evening of Thursday, a reception will be held in the government buildings at Fredericton. Another part of the St. John programme will be a luncheon given by the Canadian Club on Wednesday.

FACTS OF 1906.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST. Homestead Regulations.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 2 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 80 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

- (1.) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
 - (2.) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person, residing with the father or mother.
 - (3.) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
- Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

FRAUD IN ENGLAND.

Britain has set a good example in the punishment meted out to the corrupt officials of West Ham, England. On being convicted of receiving bribes and conniving at various frauds, five of the six managers of West Ham work-house, along with four lesser officials, have all been disfranchised for seven years and sent to prison, some for terms of two years with hard labor, others for terms of two years, and shorter periods according to degree of guilt. Some of the offenders are also to be forever disqualified from holding any public office.

THE HAYWOOD TRIAL.

The jury having been completed, the trial of William D. Haywood, secretary of the Western Federation of Miners, for the murder of Es-Governor Frank Steunenberg, began last week at Boise, Idaho. The jury contains no member of a trades-union, and the whole twelve are political opponents of the accused. The objections of defendant's counsel to several of the jurymen were overruled by the presiding judge.

As President Roosevelt has classed Haywood and the other members of the Executive of the Western Federation as "undesirable citizens," and as Governor Gooding of Idaho publicly declared several months ago that the accused men should never leave Idaho alive, the chances are that, no matter what the evidence may be, the present trial will end in a conviction followed by a speedy execution and an attempt to break up the Federation, that has so long been an eyesore to the Mine Owners Association of the West.

Alfred Horsley, alias Harry Orchard, who in 1896 deserted his wife and child in Ontario and eloped with a married woman with whom he had boarded, afterwards leaving her to marry a third, is the prosecution's chief witness. Horsley, who was caught almost red-handed, admits that he himself killed Steunenberg and also committed some twenty other murders, but, at the same time, he declares that all the crimes were instigated by Haywood and other officials of the Western Federation. Without the least sign of emotion he told one of the most revolting tales of crime that have ever been revealed in an American court, horrifying and disgusting those who listened.

The character of the chief witness being such, his evidence will be of no value except it is corroborated by other and more reliable witnesses. This the prosecution claims will be done. Serious havoc, however, has already been made with Horsley's evidence during cross examination. The defending lawyers, taking up Horsley's admission in his direct evidence that he had once been treacherous to his alleged co-conspirators, developed that he long ago entered the employ of D. C. Scott, one of the mine owners, and had been paid by K. C. Sterling, a detective in the employ of the Mine Owners' Association; also that while other members of the Federation were being daily arrested or interfered with by the militia during strikes, Horsley was never molested by the soldiery, having been guaranteed immunity by Scott. It also appears that shortly after he called out the troops to suppress the strike at Coeur d'Alene, Steunenberg thought it best to leave that vicinity for a time and sold out his interest in the Hercules Mine, the purchasers of which subsequently became millionaires. Max Malich of Denver declares that Horsley told him that he would kill Steunenberg because he prevented him from becoming a millionaire. If Malich's story be true, Horsley evidently demanded from Steunenberg a share of the Hercules mine in return for his work as a spy in the labor camp and upon being refused determined to kill Steunenberg in revenge. The case is attracting wide

SERIOUS TOPICS DISCUSSED.

Presbyterian Commissioners Deliberate On the Relation of Church to Social Reform.

STRONG SPEECHES.

Government Control of Liquor Traffic—No Use Preaching to the Hungry and Homeless.

Montreal, June 7.—The first great debate of the Presbyterian general assembly occurred yesterday afternoon over the relation of the church to social reform. Overtures presented from several synods, suggesting the formation of a committee for temperance and moral reform, or the appointment of an agent to represent the church in that field, precipitated the discussion.

The first climax was reached in the deliverance by Rev. C. W. Gordon (Ralph Connor), of Winnipeg, who laid the blame for moral corruption in commercial and political life to a large extent on the standing aside of the church.

"The pulpit cannot afford to tell the pew to go down into the fifth of politics," he said, "unless the pulpit is prepared to go down and bear its part in battle." Mr. Gordon advocated strongly the formation of a committee for the appointment of an agent for this work. He feared the church might be losing its grip in some ways, but he was confident that Presbyterianism had a message for the laboring man.

E. G. G. MacDonald, K. C., of Kingston, struck a discordant note, but at the same time a striking note. "Call it Committee on graft and moral reform," he said; "Canada is not suffering from intemperance one hundredth degree to what she is suffering from graft. Our forefathers in Scotland were honest if they did drink more whiskey than we do. We are not an honest people."

John McKay, of Sault Ste. Marie, wanted the church to undertake a campaign for government control of the liquor traffic. If would be supported by the Episcopalian and Catholic.

Professor Magill, of Halifax, contributed the speech of the day in the appeal for the broadening of the work of the committee to include social reform. He spoke of his work in college in lecturing on temperance and by correspondence in stirring up an interest in social reform, and cited applications made to him for information along that line. "It is no use preaching to men, women and children who have nothing to eat," he said, and who are living in a room where no dog should sleep."

Walter Paul, of Montreal, believed that intemperance caused slumdom, and Rev. Alex. Miller, of Ontario, thought the church should stick to the proper regime of social reform, the preaching of the old gospel. Finally the whole subject was referred to a committee for further reports.

MICHAEL MALEY.

Michael, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Malley of Nelson, died suddenly yesterday morning, at the early age of seventeen. Consumption was the cause of death. Deceased leaves, besides his parents, three brothers and two sisters to mourn their sad loss. Deceased's brother Thomas, was buried in January. The bereaved family have the sympathy of the entire community in their bereavement.

RESTIGOUCHE ORANGEMEN.

The Orangemen of Campbellton are making arrangements for a grand celebration on July 12th. The Orangemen from the county will turn out strong, and it is expected there will be a number from different parts of the province. The annual sermon will be preached this year in the Baptist church by Rev. P. J. Stuchess.



Last winter Miss Grass was found to be in trouble, and when Scott came to this city about Christmas he engaged a team on Sunday afternoon and drove down to her home. Upon learning the state of affairs he at once promised that he would marry the girl, and returned to this city ostensibly to make arrangements for the ceremony to come off the following day. Instead of keeping his promise Scott left here by train on Monday, and has never since been seen about the city. On Sunday Miss Grass was taken violently ill, suffering from convulsions. Drs. Bridges and Weaver, of this city were summoned, and an operation was performed, but the unfortunate girl never regained consciousness, and died last evening. Much sympathy is expressed for the bereaved parents.

DR. CAMPBELL, MODERATOR.

Presbyterian General Assembly Opened At Montreal Wednesday Night.

Montreal, June 6.—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada held its opening session in Eskine Presbyterian Church last night. Rev. Dr. Falconer of Picton, N. S., was in the chair. The business meeting was preceded by services at which Dr. Falconer preached the opening sermon. This ended, nominations for the moderator were in order. Those nominated were: Rev. D. Campbell, of St. Gabriel Church, Montreal; Rev. H. Mowat, Montreal; Rev. Dr. Lyle, Hamilton, who declined to accept nomination; Rev. Dr. Duval, Winnipeg; Rev. Dr. Carmichael, Toronto, and Rev. Dr. Finlay, superintendent of Missions.

The vote resulted in favor of Rev. Dr. Campbell. Dr. Campbell, with natural modesty, wished to decline, but the assembly would not hear of it. Dr. Campbell has been pastor of St. Gabriel's for forty years, and the last ten years has been one of the assembly's clerks. The assembly after disposing of some routine business, adjourned until ten this morning. There is a large attendance of delegates from all over Canada.

PREMIER RECEIVES LUMBERMEN.

Restigouche Deputation Argue Their Cause Re Long-Standing Dispute.

Moncton, June 5.—Premier Robinson received a deputation this morning, representing the independent lumber companies of the county of Restigouche. The deputation was composed of Mr. Napier, manager of the Shivers Lumber Co., and Mr. F. M. Anderson of the same company, also Hon. A. S. White, K. C., as counsel. The matter discussed had reference to the difference between the independent lumber companies and the Restigouche Boom Company in the matter of the Restigouche booms. This has been a disturbing question for several years past and two years ago a commission was appointed by the provincial government to enquire into the subject and this commission reported to the Legislature. Since then negotiations have been progressing looking towards an amicable settlement, but nothing definite has been accomplished. The independent mill owners, as represented by the deputation today are applying to the government to take action under the Domain Act, passed in 1906. This act gives the government considerable power in regulating boom companies, their tools, etc., and expropriating lands. The premier promised to take the matter into consideration and consult with his colleagues and will make the result known later.



"Elephants also 'go bad,' and there is even more danger with these huge beasts than with lions and tigers; for they may break out and kill and injure a great number of people, besides causing an immense amount of damage by tearing up and destroying property.
"There appears to be no especial age for an elephant going bad, but the majority of these animals become dangerous after a certain time in captivity. The most tractable and gentle elephant I ever had suddenly 'went bad' for no conceivable reason, and although after much coaxing and soothing he appeared to settle down quietly, there were certain indications soon after that he intended mischief. Finally his small eyes became so red and threatening that I considered it wiser to have him killed, rather than run any risk of his sacrificing human lives."
