THE NEW LAKE.

The Colorado desert in San Diego county, the most southern county in California, is a great inland basin containing about 3,000 square miles. At Yuma, on its southeast corner, the Colorado River is fully 400 feet above the lowest point in the surface of the desert, a fact which probably furnished the key to the lake formation recently refeed the river were unusually heavy last winter, and the river being swollen by the sonsequent melting has overflowed its banks, the water forming a vast take in an Desert itself. THE KINGSTON SCANDAL.

We avail ourselves of the compact summary of this case prepared by a contemporary. It would seem that in February, 1889, the department advertised for tenders for the construction of the graving dock at Kingston. The date for receiving them was March 27. The lowest tender re ceived purported to be that of A. C. Ban croft; it amounted to \$261,000. McFarlane's tender was the next lowest-\$285,000. Then came the tender of the Connollys, members of the firm of Larkin, Connolly & Co., for \$322,000, and some higher on The contract having been awarded to Bancroft, he wrote to the department asking to have the Connollys admitted nership with him. This was done and the contract was placed and stands to-day in the name of Bancroft & Connolly. The entrance to the dock was to have been 48 feet wide, but at later stage the engineer in charge recommended that it should be increased to 60 feet, so as accommodate large lake vessels of the Cibola type. An order-in-Council was passed to that effect. A few days afterwards, however, the engineer reported that a width of 55 feet would be sufficient. Here a curious thing occurs. The engineer stated that the enlargement of the mouth of the dock from 48 to 60 feet would no involve additional cost. But when he re-ported in favor of 55 feet he said that an extra cost of \$35,000 would be entailed Mr. Gibson, now the member for Lincoln who tendered for the work, agrees that there should have been no extra outlay either for the 55 or for the 60 foot entranc "There is less masonry," he said in the House, "for a 55-foot opening than for a 48-foot opening, and I know what I am talking about." 


