

Tenth Annual Convention of the Western Branch at Woodstock.

Interesting and Encouraging Reports of the Year's Work—A Plan of Campaign—Addresses by Re-turned Lady Missionaries.

WOODSTOCK, Oct. 6.—The tenth annual meeting of the western branch of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church is being held here this week. Ladies are in attendance from all parts of Western Ontario, and Miss Wintemute, a returned wissionary from Janan is present. returned missionary from Japan, is present, also Miss Whitfield, a missionary from the

for the salvation of the world.

Miss Whitfield, who has been engaged in missionary work in Africa, briefly addersed the convention, describing the work in the Dark Continent. She had been engaged for five years under Bishop Taylor, her field being in Liberia. She spoke of the mission field in that colony, and in the whole of that continent, and the comparatively little work as yet accomplished. She gave an interesting description of the country, the habits of life of the natives and of the Liberians. Bishop Taylor endeavors to make his missions self-supporting by obtaining land and raising the comparative work of life, but the workers were too few by far. The chief work in Liberia is with the children. There is not difficulty in getting the boys, but with the girls it was different.
