He blothed out that a resolution was passed in 1888, to the effect that the Congregational Church has always been willing to promote a spirit of unity among the various branches of the Christian faith. A committee was appointed to confer with committee was appointed by other Christian bodies to consider this matter. That committee had never been discharged, and Mr. Black moved that the above resolution be reaffirmed. Heartrending Disaster at Washington.

Total Collapse of a Historic Structure.

The Old Booth Theater, in Which Lincoln Was Shot. Falls Down, Burying Hundreds of Clerks

in the Ruins. One Hundred Persons Killed and Many Others Terribly Injured.

ome Costly Blundering by the Military Authorities

WASHINGTON, June 9-10 a.m.-Ford's old opera house, on Tenth street, in which President Lincoln was assassinated, has just fallen in. About 300 Government clerks were in the building at the time, and a great loss of life is feared. No details as

10:15 a. m.—The first floor collapsed through weakness, caused by excavating a cellar, and its fall carried down the other three floors, and with them hundreds of clerks. The dead and wounded are being taken out rapidly by the firemen and police. All the ambulances in the city have been summoned, and the rescued are being conveyed to the hospitals. It is feared 100 persons have been killed.

THE SCENES WERE TERRIBLE.
Some jumped out of the third floor. The
walls are still standing, but every floor is
down and every wall blown out. The
building had been condemned as unsafe and building had been condemned as unsafe and unsuitable for the purpose for which it was used for acme time, but sentiment has kept it going. The floors were heavily loaded with the records of the pensions divisions of the War Department. The clerks employed there were all men.

THEY WERE WARNED.

10:30 a.m.—One of the workmen, a colored man, who was employed in excavating the cellar, and who escaped with only slight cuts, says: "I told them yesterday that the archway would fall, for every time

that the archway would fall, for every time any one walked over the floor it would bend. I tell you I was scared and got out just as quick as I could. There were twenty men at work with me. I don't know what became of them."

Every hospital in the city has now been called into requisition to care for the wounded.

RECOVERY OF DEAD EGDIES.

10:45.—Eight dead bodies have just been taken out of the ruins. They have not yet been identified. Gen. Schofield has ordered two troops of cavalry and two companies. been identified. Gen. The Secretary of the Navy has ordered out all of the naval medical officers stationed here, and has also opened the Naval Hospital to receive the injured.

FATEFUL FLAMES

Destroy the Magnificent Ville Marie Convent at Cote St. Antoine.

Montreal, June 8.—The magnificent Ville Marie Convent at Notre Dame de Grace, a couple of miles out of the Montreal city limits, which is the largest establishment of the kind in America, was almost totally destroyed by fire this afternoon.

The establishment is divided in two separate portions. The mother house and the old historic building known as Monkland, which is used as the convent school. The mother house is the chief house of the Congregational Nuns, one of the leading orders of America, and the establishment where all the novices are prepared, and in the establishment at the time were some 250 novices in addition to the sisters and servants. The inmates made a hasty departure, carrying all the effects they could with them.

The fire spread from the eastern wing to the magnificent new church which had not been completed. This was destroyed.

In the convent school, a short distance from the mother house, were 230 pupils, and these were got out in safety. Chief Benoit, of the Montreal brigade, and several of the firemen were overcome with smoke and heat

The fire is still burning at this hour and will burn itself out. The mother house is a complete ruin. The flames will destroy the whole interior of the building, and only

will burn itself out. The mother house is a complete ruin. The flames will destroy the whole interior of the building, and only the blackened walls will be left standing. About a dozen sick nuns in the infirmary were all got out safely; and fortunately there was no loss of life. The only serious accident was to a fireman named Dufoind, who was badly hurt and had to be removed to the hospital.

The loss is estimated at nearly \$1,000,000. Mother Superior General Sister St. Jean Baptistes states the insurance will not cover a tenth of the loss.

PEDESTRIAN.—What are the rights of pedestrians and drivers of conveyances on streets, sidewalks and crossings? Ans.—The road in the middle of the street is for the use of teams and vehicles. Pedestrians have the right to the sidewalks. The crossings at the street corners are common to both, but pedestrians have the right of way, as against teams. Many drivers ignore the law, and dash over the crossing, endangering lives and the limbs of the pedestrians, without thinking they are violating the law. No vehicle or horse can legally be driven rapidly over the crossing, nor can the driver obstruct the crossing, nor can the driver obstruct the crossing. In cases of necessity, pedestrians can use the middle of the road and teams the sidewalks but the necessity must be clearly shown in the event of injury or accident. Teams driving over the sidewalks necessarily do injury, more or less, which can only be legally excused by a greater necessity. Pedestrians using the middle of the road do not necessarily injure it, but expose them selves to injury and loss by accidents for which they may have no remedy.

The Value of Lime Water.
The value of lime water about the house-hold can scarcely be over-estimated. To prepare it is an easy matter, as all that is necessary is to put a layer of slacked lime into a wide-mouthed jar, and fill it with cold water. There is no danger of using too much lime as the water will only take up so much, however much is put in. It takes only a few hours for the water to take up all the lime that is possible. After it has stood, say, five hours, the water may be drained off and more water added until the lime is all absorbed. Acidity of the stomach is corrected by adding a little lime water to the drinking water. A teaspoonful of lime water added to a glass of milk corrects the tendency which it has to casgulate in the stomach, forming a hard, indigestible mass. For this reason it should be added to the milk fed to children, and nursing bottles should be rinsed with it. As a mild disinfectant there is nothing safer or better.
