# **GETTING READY** FOR WILD NIGHT

New York Merchants Barricading Premises in Preparation for Riotous Celebration.

New York, Nov. 2 .- With the first gray shadows fo approaching dawn, the American voters set out today to choose a new president of the United States to serve for four years from noonday of March 4 next. Business in New York and elsewhere throughout the country is practically at a standstill, while the millions of ballots are falling and the destinies of men, state and nation, are being decided. Early weather reports were favorable, and political managers renewed their predictions of yesterday that a heavy vote will be cast in every state where there has been the semblance of a contest between the two old parties.

Brakeman Who Lost Both Legs in Accident Shows Wonderful

struggle for six days between life and eath, John A. McDermott, the C. P. R. brakesman, who early on Monday morning last lost both his legs at a siding five miles from Myrtle, died on Saturday night at the Western Hospital. McDermott fell under a moving string of cars in the black darkness and fog, it will be remembered, and had twenty-one of the cars and the locomotive run over him, almost severing his legs from his body. By sheer grit he dragged himself, bleeding and in agony, across two sets of tracks and up a fifty-foot embankment, where he was found by a search party tying up the bleeding stumps with his shoestrings. He was brought to Toronto and placed in the Western Hospital early on Monday morning. Since that time his conduct at the hospital has been exemplary of great courage. Never has anyone in the history of the institution put up such a struggle against such fearful odds. His great cheerfulness throughout the dreadful week endeared him to nurses, dectors and visitors, and the hospital was plunged in gloom when it was whispered about that he had passed

# SUICIDES OVER FALLS

Charles Hengerer Deliberately Wades Into Swift Current Above Niagara.

mat. It was made public through the medium of the London Telegraph, and created a furore at the expense of the Emperor, the German press, almost without exception, condemning it as a "blazing indiscretion." To protect the Emperor, the chancellor has issued an explanation. His story is that the diplomat in question sent the text of the interview to the Kaiser, suggesting that its publication would help to promote a friendlier feeling toward be no recounts. Germany in Great Britain. The Emperor handed it to Chancellor Von Buelow, who sent it to the foreign office, by which it was approved. The chancellor says he did not read it be fore passing it on to the foreign office, and would have advised against its publication had he known its contents. had last year expended \$500,000 in Y. M. C. A. work for their employees; and these men, coming from a Y. M. C. A. building, were better able to protect the interests of the public and the railroad companies than if they came from a barroom.

The Y. M. C. A. reached all classes of men from the railroader to the student, from the North American Indian to the Chinaman of the Orient. A Broader Work.

"And the Y. M. C. A. has not only progressed mentally, physically and morally," continued Mr. Thomason, "but it has broadened in a business sense. At one time the Y. M. C. A. was satisfied to haphazard it along by merely collecting enough money for immediate use. "Now it looks ahead, and despite all

this nonsensical talk of hard times, more money has actually been collected by the Y. M. C. A. since February, 1908, than in the two previous years." The speaker, in conclusion, said that the Y. M. C. A. hadn't reached the "chicken pie" plan of collecting money, and that instead of socials, sewing bees, etc., the more dignified plan of having a committee of businessmen visit other businessmen in the city. and solicit subscriptions, had been introduced.

To the Men of London. Mr. Thommason asked that London do three things, namely: Visit the luncheons to be held Tuesday, Wed-

nesday and Thursday. "We are not going to hold you up at these luncheons," he said. "We'll get you, anyway. And when our committeeman visits you, treat him like a gentleman. He is just as busy a man as you, and besides he is giving his time to a noble work."

Mr. Yeigh's Address.

Mr. Yeigh stated that there were two distinct classes of citizenship, who assumed his duty like a man. "The highest type has to do with religion," said the speaker, "and in-

volves a recognition of God." Religion was responsible for the highest endowment of men, and during the nineteenth century, among other thigs, brought about the abolition of slavery in the Southern States.




