

Aaron Hoffman, the young Russian Jew, who was arrested a couple of days ago, charged with thefts from a number of London jewellery stores, was sentenced to one year in the Central Prison, and deportation at the conclusion of that term, by Police Magistrate Judd this morning.

Hoffman's position was considered by the magistrate to be a rather peculiar one, as he has only been out from Russia for four or five months. His mother, who is now Mrs. Slobaski, of Clarence street, did not appear to take any particular interest in him, and stated that she did not want him about the place.

Through an interpreter the prisoner eclared that he had never been in trouble in Russia, and that he did not know how to get along in this country after his mother and stepfather had efused to care for him in a strange ountry.

Nineteen Years of Age.

Hoffman is but 19 years of age, and while in court he would not answer the magistrate in English, the men who laid the charges stated that he was easily understood in his dealings in the stores. The first charge was that on March 25 he stole a pearl ring from Victor W. Ferris, a jeweller. The value was \$15, but Ferris recovered the property before the man got out of the door of his establishment. In his hasty exit Hoffman dropped two other rings which bore the stamp of another jewelry store. This led to a second charge, and pleas of guilty were entered by the prisoner in both cases. The announcement was made in the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Sir James Whitney in explaining a bill he was introducing "respecting the appointment of a commissioner to report on certain territory.'

The member for Manitoulin will have charge of a party containing experts and engineers to report upon the character of the country, its agricul tural and mineral resources, but more particularly to determine the best route for the Government railway in the event of its being projected to Port Nelson, and the harbor facilities at the river mouth. The terms of the Federal measure by which the land is set aside give the province five years which to locate its five-mile strip to the Nelson and ten-mile frontage n the river and Hulson Bay.

In introducing the bill Sir James xplained that it was intended to ren-ter it possible for Mr. Gamey to reeive remuneration without losing his eat in the House.

The expedition will probably start this summer, and to that end the further supplementary estimates tabled yesterday set aside \$10,000.







AN AID TO BEAUTY.

With the coming of summer, of course, every girl will want to wear the comfortable Dutch collar on her muslin and gingham dresses. Many a girl will sigh hopelessly as she views the hollows and bones of her neck. A peauty specialist says that with persistent care and treatment it is posible for any girl, and every girl, to become quite presentable in this respect, and without undue expense. Here's how, according to him. First, treat your neck to a Turkish bath, put a pinch of borax and a handful of patmeal in some hot water, then using a new piece of flannel for a washcloth, scrub the skin thoroughly with good toilet soap. Rub hard, until the neck is red as a beet, then rinse with warm water, dry, and massage gently with cold cream or lanoline, rubbing round and round, kneading the flesh softly. The skin will now be feeling tired and flabby, and to brace it and close the pores, it needs a cold application. Dip a small Turkish towel in a basin of very cold water containing a handful of dissolved salt; wring the towel just enough to keep it from dripping, and fold it around your neck. Do this several times, then dry the skin thoroughly, and this finishes the first part of the treatment





Stirring Appeal in Behalf of the Loggers and Miners.

WINDSOR CONVENTION

Windsor, March 28.-At a public neeting held last evening in St. Andrew's Church, in connection with the Women's Home Missionary Society, Dr. Grant, superintendent of home missions, gave a stirring address making an appeal on behalf of the oggers, miners and the men engaged in the various industries along the coast of British Columbia. "There is now no lone Pacific shore of which we sing in our Canadian hymn, "The Pacific coast," said Dr. Grant, "is a hive of industrial activity, and we cannot afford to neglect this throng-ing multitude. The call to this work is insistent. Will the women of the Presbyterian Church respond?"

Dr. Grant's appeal met with an enthusiastic and practical response. The Women's Home Missionary Society will undertake this work at an estimated expenditure of \$50,000 for the first year, and Dr. Grenfell's mission to the deep-sea fishers on the Labrador shore will be duplicated by one similar on the western coast. The work of the women's board of ome missions in the United States was briefly outlined by Mrs. Gilder-sleeve, of New York, who said that she envied Canadian women their opportunity for expansion along misionary lines. There were many things waiting for the American women to undertake, but the support of their schools in districts where the Fovernment had not yet an adequate ystem is so costly that they were unble to advance along other lines.

RAMSAY'S THEORY TO BE PUT TO THE TEST

Experiment Will Be Made of Burning Coal Under-

ground.

[Canadian Press.]

London, March 29.-Sir William Ramsay, in a speech last night, announced that an experiment was likey to be made in the way of carrying out the suggestion made by him, that an ideal state of things would be to have retorts in the bowels of the earth to produce gas for power.
"I firmly believe," he said, "that

something will be done in the way of not raising coal, but letting it remain underground, burning it there, and taking off the gases. I have been in communication with a large colliery proprietor, and he is going to give me a chance of making an experiment on a very small scale.

"If this succeeds, a candle may be lighted in England, which will not be extinguished in our time."


