Ottawa in the Grip of Biggest Strike the Capital City Has Ever Known-Men in the Winnipeg Building Trades Decide On Walkout by Overwhelming Vote.

Toror to, May 1.—Labor's traditional strike day finds many Canadian cities suffering more or less from industrial disturbances. In Montreal, while no important strikes have been reported, police are preparing for trouble this afternoon between returned soldiers and Socialists, if the latter persist in carrying revolutionary banners or red flags. Toronto has 6,000 metal trades workers and 600 painters on strike, with no prospect at present of settlement. A big labor demonstration, with somewhat Socialistic tendencies in Queen's Park, was dampened by heavy showers, but another meeting has been called for the Arena tonight.

In Ottawa and Winnipeg building operations are almost completely tied up by strikes, although more serious difficulties with civic and public service employees in Winnipeg seem to have been tided over.

In addition there are minor strikes of various workers in other cities, but the prospects for settlement of many of them within a few days appear bright.

The most conspicuous feature of the government's measures against possible trouble was the occupation of the Place de la Concorde by cavalry, to insure the enforcement of the order against street demonstrations.

The cessation of work for the day, in accordance with the plan for the 24-hour shut-down, was virtually complete. Not a wheel was turning in any of the transportation systems, the subways and tramways ceasing to operate and taxicabs and buses keeping off the streets. Restaurants and cafes were closed, and guests in hotels had to go hungry if they had not supplied themselves with food beforehand, as no meals were being served in any of the capital's hundreds of eating places. Even the drug stores closed their doors. There was no solace for the city's population in the way of amusements, such as theatres, music halls and other resorts, for these were closed tight for the day. Out of the Red Triangle Fund \$175,000 will be set aside for the Dominion Council of the Young Women's Christian Association, who are looking after soldiers' wives and children coming to Canada. Y.W.C.A. secretaries help mothers on boats, and render to the women and children a service similar to that which the Y.M.C.A. does for the men. Y.W.C.A. rest rooms and refreshment service welcome the soldiers families at the ports of arrival. The sick are attended, children cared for, and the women folk cheered with the kin word and the helping hand. At the big railway stations the Y.W.C.A. representatives are there to help, comfort, advise and direct. And in certain cases, where money is lacking, funds are provided to complete the journey. The budget of the Dominion Council, Y.W.C.A. provides also for the extension of its many forms of service among Canadian girls.

business, the Y.M.C.A. maintains a fully equipped Red Triangle Club, where soldiers are provided with comfortable board and lodgings at nominal rates. Here they may meet to talk, play or read, write letters and make themselves at home generally.

At every dispersal centre in Canada, the Y.M.C.A. maintains its Red Triangle service, with free canteen, reading and writing facilities and information bureau.

In Military Hospitals

In each of the military hospitals in Canada, in the military camps and barracks where men remain on duty during demobilization, the Y.M.C.A. place a trained man in charge of full Red Triangle service, providing entertainment, recreation, instruction and social stimulus.

Besides the work for the men returning, your support is asked for the maintenance of four Red Triangle Secretaries and auxiliary staff with the Siberian Canadian Expeditionary Force.

Every returned man is offered six months full membership privileges free, in any local Y.M.C.A. The National Council is aiding the local Y.M.C.A.'s to meet the cost of dormitory accommodation, bathing facilities and other privileges and the employment of special secretaries in connection with local service to these men.

For Coming Men of Canada

The Y.M.C.A. asks your support for a greatly enlarged programme of service to Canada's boys this year, as the most valuable reconstructive work that can be done to repair the awful war-wastage of Canada's man power (60,383 dead and 156,799 wounded.)

A MEMORIAL HALL FOR THE O. A.

C., GUELPH.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:
Service has always been uppermost in the minds of students and ex-students of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. When the Great War came, over seven hundred of the best of these men answered the call of their country and joined the armies of the Allies in humanity's fight to the finish against the horrible Hun and the unspeakable Turk. These men risked all, that the ideals which they held most dear should not perish. 
