

# A NEW RATE FOR HOUSE LIGHTING

Will Be On the Basis of 2 Cents Polling Is Going On in Many Per Hundred Feet.

FIXED CHARGES REDUCED

Cost of Power To Be Higher, Namely, Four Cents for the Kilowatt Hour.

Another effort was made to adjust the rates for light and power by the water commissioners on Saturday, and the net result of a couple of hours' tussle with the problem was to change the rates for domestic lighting. The prices for commercial lighting and power have yet to be struck, and it looks as if the matter will cause some difficulty.

Some time ago it was decided that domestic lighting would be 4 cents per 100 square feet of floor space as a fixed charge, with 3½ cents a kilowatt hour for power.

There were many criticisms of this

schedule. Mayor Beattle himself ob ected to it, and he was backed up by nany citizens, who, with their own oills, figured out the cost. The commissioners received several Saturday they decided to remedy the

difficulty. The Rate Struck. As a result a new rate was struck. Henceforth domestic lighting will be on the basis of 2 cents per 100 feet of floor space, with energy at 4 cents kilowatt hour. In other words, fixed charges have been reduced by

half, but the power will cost more. "There were a large number of cases where the old rate would not be equitable," said Commissioner Chapman. "For some days I have been fig-uring out bills and comparing them

OLD MAJORITIES CLOSE

While in Most Cases the Conservative Majorities Are Large.

London, Dec. 5.-The second day's polling in the parliamentary elections opened with more spirit and under improved weather conditions. The loseness of the results already polled brought out a greater number of voters and workers today.

In some divisions voters, who had removed since the last register was made up, spent the night in their old constituencies in order to vote early and get back to their work.

The London Contests.

The rush at many booths was great. Interest centred largely in the seventeen contests in London boroughs. Of these seats nine voted Unionist and eight Liberal last January.

Most of the Unionist seats are quite

safe, being held by large majorities. The Liberals, however, have a hard fight to hold their own, notably in East Finsbury, the four divisions Islington, and in the east division of St. Fancras, where Joseph Martin, former premier of British Columbia, has a woman suffragist as well as the Unionist candidate, against him, and in West St. Pancras, where Sir Wm. Collins, the Liberal, won by ten votes over R. E. Dickinson, Unionist, in the last elections

Dear Sir,-Following our usual custom at this senson of the year, I beg to call your attention to the dangers to life and property from Christmas decorations, displays, etc., which are frequently made at this time of the year. The use of Christmas greens, harvest specimens and other inflammable materials such as draperies, scenery, cotton to represent snow, and the like (especially in connection with electric and other lighting systems), is decidedly an increase of hazard, it being impossible to make displays of that nature perfectly safe.
