

SAYS SHE'S A SPOILED CHILD

PETER AT MERCY OF THE ARMY

Will Probably Ask the Regicides to **Absent Themselves Until Trouble** Blows Over.

Belgrade, June 20. - Great Britain has practically broken off diplomatic relations with Servia. The British ambassador, G. F. Bonham, leaves here Monday for England. The consul of Great Britain, W. G. Thesiger, will take charge of British interests. The new Servian constitution was ga-

abolishing the constitution of April 6, 1901, and all ordinances contravening the new constitution. The Hague, June 20. — The Dutch representative at Belgrade has been instructed to assume the same attitude

as Great Britain towards the provisional government of Servia.

THE KING'S PREDICAMENT. Belgrade, June 20. - Unless King Peter is prepared to altogether ignore the foreign demands for the punishment of the assassins of King Alexander and Queen Draga, his only means of satisfying any requirements appears to be to persuade the criminals to absent themselves until quiet is restored, when they will be permitted to resume their places in the army. The provisional government hold office solely at the will of the army, and should King Peter promise to punish the officers implicated, it is as likely as not that the army will force the withdrawal of the invitation to occupy the throne. It is suggested in official circles that Russia may possibly advise the officers concerned to so absent themselves.

The bill also the Beavers or Thornborough. The home team easily won by a score of bids the manufacture of oleomargarine, butterine or their substitutes for it is their first season in the C. L. A., butter. There is a clause that only butter made in a creamery shall be marked as creamery butter, and a clause providing that butter containing more than 16 per cent of water shall be considered as adulterated. The use of any acid, alkali or chemical to cause butter to absorb water is forbidden. Penalties are established for contravention of the act. Mr. Fisher explained that the necessity for this law had arisen quite recently. About two years ago the Congress of the United States forbade the manufacture of process butter, and it was said that some of the manufacturers Rochester - Rochester 0, Jersey designed to transfer their business to this country.

Mr. Fisher explained that process butter is a poor butter, which has been made over in a certain way. The trouble with it is that it will not keep. If eaten at once no great harm would be done, but if mixed with other butter and sent abroad it would be sure to spoil on the way and thus injure the reputation of Canadian butter abroad. Mr. Fisher then introduced a resolution for an act providing that seeds of cereals, grasses, clovers, forage plants or vegetables, sold for the purpose of seeding, shall be free from the seeds of certain weeds; establishing grades of seeds of timothy, red clover, and alsike, and providing that such seeds offered for sale shall be marked with the seller's name and address, the name of the kind of seed and the grade, providing for the examination of such seeds and their analysis by an official seed analyst. Mr. Fisher explained that the department had received a large number of requests that something be done to protect the farmers in this matter.


