## Here and There

Saskatchewan's crop cost \$187,-000,000 to produce last year. The proceeds amounted to \$287,000,000.

During the month of April and the first two weeks of May 300 claims were registered in the coun-ties of Temiskaming and Abitibi, the gold field of the province of Quebec.

With a population which is over 70 per cent. rural Saskatchewan has a larger automobile registration than any other province. One in every 15 people owns a car.

One of the largest fish caught in the history of Lake Timagimi was recently caught by E. B. Hamlin who, with a small bass hook and light steel rod landed a salmon trout weighing 24 pounds and measuring three feet in length.

In 1820 there were cut in Canada 4,023,826 cords of pulpwood. This would, if piled four feet high and four feet widy, reach in a continuous line over 6,000 miles, or the distance from Vancouver to Halifax, and out over the Atlantic to Queenstown, Ireland.

Trees to the number of 10,000 were distributed among Saskatoon school children by the Parks Officials and Dominion Forestry Branch on the occasion of Arbor Day. Each child received one maple and one ash Last year only 5,000 trees were distributed.

The Empress of France, of the Canadian Pacific fleet, now on the trans-Atlantic service between Hamburg, Southampton and Cherbourg to Que-bee, holds the record for the fastest journey between Quebec and Liver-pool, having crossed in 5 days, 22 hours and 38 minutes, just two hours less than the Empress of Britain.

General Sir Arthur Currie will unveil a memorial cairn at Sault Ste. Marie to Eticnne Brule and his companion Grenoell, the coureurs de bois, who found the Sault and discovered Lake Superior in 1622. The unveiling will take place August 7th during Discovery Week, when the Ojibways will produce "Hiawatha" on two afternoons.

Notwithstanding that there will be an increase this year in Canadian Pacific steamship traffic on the St. Lawrence, with 17 more sailings than in 1922, Canadian Pacific officials report that ships are being well booked and that according to present indications the 1923 season will show improvement in ocean trade from both Montreal and Quebec.

Whales are reported early and plentiful this season and despatches from Victoria state that conditions surrounding the inauguration of the deep-sea hunt this year are the most promising in more than a decade. The demand for carned whale meat has become so pronounced that the prospective pack of the Victorian whalers is already disposed of. England will be the distributing market for carned whale meat this year.

A replica of an old time Hudson's Bay fort, such as once was the nucleus of the western posts of the great company, and which still exist in the far north, will be erected at the Calgary Exhibition grounds, July 9 to 14, as a part of the by Stampede feature. Special arrangements are also being made to provide a commodious camping ground for the Old Timers who will attend with the old-fashioned chuck wagons and cowboy equipment.

Running on schedule the Canadian Pacific Steamship's liner "Empress of Canada," Captain A. J. Hailey, again demonstrated her right to the claim of "Queen of the Pacific." The Canadian vessel left Vancouver twenty-four hours helind the American liner "President McKinley" bound for Yokuhama rescrify. The "Empress of Canada" doked about 3 A.M., and the "President McKinley" arrived at S.A.M.







HOW TO AVOID RICKETS

A Nutritional Disease Affecting Young Animals.

Sometimes Called "Bullnose" and "Snuffles" — Caused Largely by Unfavorable Conditions—Prevention and Treatment—Get Rid of Chronic Runts.

The occurrence of this disease in young animals seems to be largely caused by unfavorable conditions of life, inducing impaired nutrition of the body. In particular there appears to be a lack of bone development, due to a deficiency of lime salts and other bone-forming elements in the body. Lack of exercise and close confinement in damp quarters are predisposing influences and are a cause of the disease occasionally in foals and calves.

In pigs the disease occurs generally soon after weaning time and particularly in litters born during the late fall and winter months. pigs associated with exposure to inclement weather and close confinement in cold damp quarters combined in accentuating the tendency towards faulty nutrition and ill-health, which are forerunners of Rickets. The feeding of young pigs excessively on corn and also keeping them exclusively on a sloppy diet of buttermilk is at times responsible. In some cases there appears to be an inherited tendency in litters, due possibly toerrors in the management and feeding of the sow while pregnant, and after farrowing.

In the case of caives and colts becoming affected with Rickets, they appear unthrifty and develop imperfectly. The bones of the legs become softened so that they gradually bend and become distorted, causing the animal to be bow-legged and enlarged at the joints, and otherwise unsightly shaped. They are prone to lie down a great deal of the time, and

The diet should be suitably balanced and consist of a mixture of ground oats free from hulls, corn meal, ground barley and shorts with a little salt, chalk and charcoal added from time to time. The feed should be given mixed with milk or water as a thick slop. A little ground oil cake or bone meal and skim milk is also good. As the pigs increase in size the diet can be gradually changed. They should be allowed plenty of range and pasture in summer. When young pigs are noticed showing a tendency of developing Rickets, the progress of the disease can often be arrested and a complete recovery obtained, if taken in time, by changing and supplementins their det with tonics. The diet should be arranged as already described, with the addition of some digester—tankage and bone meal. To the drink can be added lime water and to the feed a tonic composed of sulphate of iron one part, bicarbonate of soda and charcoal four parts. These ingredients are mixed thoroughly together and a spoonful of the mixture added to the feed allowance of each pig once or twice a day. In cases of pronounced Rickets in pigs, where not worth treating and should be got rid of.—C. D. McGilvray, Principal, Ontario Veterinary College, Guelph.
