Useful Hints.

Do not throw away cream that has turned slightly sour, but add a teaspoon of sugar, whip and serve with stewed fruits, etc.

To cut a loaf of hot brown bread take a piece of twine, place it around the loaf, cross the ends and pull. There will be a clean cut without crumbs.

When cooking vegetables, such as onions, cabbage, etc., which emit a disagreeable odor, try boiling with them a generous slice of stale bread.

Dry, grate and bottle all your lemon and orange rinds and they will be ready for use in dishes and sauces that call for the zest of a lemon or orange.

Honey and switches are much relished. The honey is blended with butter before it is placed on slices of brown bread.

Put melted down in the oven and sent into jars will keep for any length of time, and is much easier to chop up if treated in this way. Puddings will keep better if made with suet that has been melted in the oven.

Orange and Banana Custard.—Peel and cut the bananas into three slices; peel the oranges, divide them into quarters, removing the seeds. Have equal quantities of the two fruits. Arrange in layers in a big glass dish, sprinkling powdered sugar between the layers. Make a thin custard of eggs and milk, sweeten to taste. Cook the custard, and let it cool, then flavor it with vanilla. Put both fruit and custard in a cool place till wanted, then pour the custard over the fruit, and garnish with bits of candied orange peel.

The Exhibition.

It has finally been decided that the Nova Scotia Horticultural Exhibition is to be held in Wolfville this season. The dates fixed are Oct. 10th, 11th and 12th. Although late in getting started arrangements are now pretty well in progress and it is confidently hoped that the exhibition may be the best of the kind yet held. In order to make it such the combined efforts of all our people will be necessary. THE ACADIAN will undertake to do its full share, and solicits the co-operation of all interested in the progress of our town and community. During the twenty-eight years of its history this paper has sought by every legitimate means to aid in every movement calculated to advance the interests of the people of its constituency. This will be its policy in the coming show. The fact that already printing in connection with the exhibition, which could just as well have been done at this office, has been sent to other towns will not hinder us in doing what we believe to be our duty in connection with the exhibition. At the same time we may say that such a narrow and childish procedure is hard to understand, and has never so far as we know been followed in any other town in the three counties where such an exhibition has been held.

Town Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening, at which Mayor Harvey and Couns. Hales, Starr, Regan and Sleep were present.

Streets Committee reported that the work on Main street had been begun and was going satisfactorily forward. Plans and specifications had been prepared and the engineer was expected to be here next week to superintend the construction of the street.

Water Committee reported that the dam had been thoroughly cleaned, new hydrants had been put in on Main street, and other work done.

Finance Committee reported receipts for month \$705.75 and expenditure during the same time \$146.13. The debit bank balance at the end of June was \$1937.38.

Petition was read from J. W. Williams asking permission to hang a sign to project on street. On motion permission was granted.

Worth Thinking About.

President Taft in submitting the Reciprocity agreement to Congress, asked in its justification—"Ought we not, then, to arrange a commercial agreement with Canada, if we can, by which we shall have direct access to her great supply of natural products? Should we not, therefore, before their policy has become too crystallized and fixed for change, meet them in a spirit of real concession, facilitate commerce between the two countries, and thus greatly increase the natural resources available to our people?"

And again he said—"By giving our people access to Canadian forests we shall reduce the consumption of our own, which, in the hands of comparatively few owners, now have a value that requires the enlargement of our available timber resources."

And finally—"The reduction in the duties imposed by Canada will give us even a larger share of her market than we now enjoy, great as that is. These are good arguments for the United States and are having their proper effects, but the question for Canadians to consider is this—If our natural products and natural resources and our market is regarded as so valuable to the United States, who should they not be of infinitely more value to our own people in Canada? Why should Canadians chase after a shadow, and lose to the United States the substance which they have here at home?"

William Jennings Bryan, the great U. S. Senator, will visit the Maritime Provinces this fall and deliver a number of addresses. Arrangements may possibly be made to have him speak in Wolfville.

The Shad Fisheries

The Bay of Fundy shad commission has decided that the decline in this fish is largely due to the fact that the spaw fish are captured by the St. John fishermen before they have had an opportunity to deposit their spaw in the river. Keep it Like a Mah. In the earliest days of the temperance movement a boy attended one of the meetings. He heard the earnest words and felt stirred to place himself in the line of duty and in the place of safety. When he and the boys about him were asked to sign the pledge, he wrote his name on the paper, and hastened home to tell his mother. Her answer was, 'Keep it like a man.' And he kept it. 'Willie' went far from home to the new world so full of temptation. He is an old man now, esteemed and honored, and the words of the dear mother are still with him. 'Keep it like a man.' Happy is the young man who has a mother to stand by him and encourage him in every good resolution and effort.

A Bad Book. The influence for evil for a bad book or a bad picture is subtle and persistent. It can be gloated upon in secret, conned over repeatedly, so that its impression is kept fresh and active in the mind, it can be passed about and thus made an effective instrument for spreading its contagion. Besides, such prints can be circulated stealthily, so that they fall into the hands of the innocent, who before they are aware, receive a spiritual stain which in all their after years can never be effaced. The Moral and Social Reform Committees of the various Churches, and the Moral and Social Reform Council which has grown out of them, in the few years which have elapsed since their organization, have rendered inestimable service to the higher life of the Dominion; but it is doubtful if anything that they have been able to accomplish will count for more in the long run than the victories which they have gained in their fight against bad literature.—The Presbyterian.

The Temperance Campaign in Sweden. Temperance reports from Sweden show that the campaign against the alcohol evil continues to be pressed forward with gains to the cause of reform. The King of Sweden has presented 5,000 kroner to the Swedish Society of Physicians for prizes for the three best dissertations in popular form on the effects of alcohol on the individual and in society and the best means for counteracting them.

The Swedish Accident Insurance Company there will refuse to accept insurance to brewery workers. This is on the ground of the number of accidents constantly occurring among men in this trade and of the slowness with which they recover from fractures and sores, and because of the almost universal weakness of heart among brewery workers.

The Crown Prince of Sweden in opening a summer temperance congress at Hasselholm, gave to all intents and purposes his adhesion of the Swedish movement for prohibition. After describing the need of husbanding every resource in the competition with other nations he added: 'I do not hesitate to say that the people which first free itself from the injurious influence of alcohol will in this way acquire a distinct advantage over other nations in the present yet intense struggle. I hope it will be our people who will be the first to win this start over the others.'

Football and Alcohol. Edward H. Coy, Captain of the Yale Football Team, expressed his views upon liquor in relation to physical training in the 'Scientific Temperance Journal' for May. He says: 'Alcohol ever valuable or even necessary in athletics? There was a time when ale was thought to be good for men as a preventative to overstrained bodies. I never believed it did a bit of good. It may have made the men feel they were not held by the usual rules of training when they were allowed a glass of ale occasionally, but it is ridiculous to even suppose they were better physically or even mentally for that slight indulgence. Overstrained men can be treated differently and better, I think, and I carried out that policy when in charge last fall; none were allowed ale or any alcoholic drinks. I've seen several good athletes ruined, as far as athletics go, by drink. Who can honestly say alcohol is good for anyone and especially who can say it is of value to athletes? There are not even two sides to that question.'

Prohibitionists Encouraged by Late Election. Edward Fulton in Truro News: It will be gratifying to the friends of good order and good government to learn that the late elections have resulted in a great increase in the number of Prohibitionists in the House. Rev. Mr. Grant, who knows our conditions pretty well, considers we can count on seventeen, possibly eighteen, or close to double the number in the last assembly. This is getting pretty near to a majority—it would not surprise us a bit to see the government modify its policy in view of this.
