| A Terrible Disaster. <br> A orowd of women struck by lightinag in the wyoming valley. <br> Soranton, Pa., Aug. 12.-A thril. ling catastrophe occurred this afternoon on the hills, about five miles from this city at a place called Kubn's Patch. A large number of women and girls from Scranton were on the hills gathering berries, when a storm came up fron the sonth and they rushed to an untenanted building to take shelter from the down pouring rain. About forty-one women and chiildren found room in the old house, while seren were obliged to stand outside under the storm. With the increasing storm the sheets of fire began to descend, the lightning becoming more vivid and the peals of thuuder secming to advance from distant caverns until |
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the old building bogan to tremble. At
length a lightning shaft, more vivid than
any that had preeeeded it, descended
among the unhappy group of woumen
and girls, kiilling two of thee and scorch.
ing in a frightful manner four others,
tearing the flesh of theirlimbs
tearing the flesh off their limbs and pro-
ducing a hart sickening scene a mong
the panic stricken women. For some

by the appalling sight they had s sen
and were unable ro render any assis-
ance. The groans of those faearfully
injured and six other suffering victims
