Strain and chill again so that the fat can be taken up clean and hard. Used with an equal quantity of lard and a little salt this makes fine ple crust. It is also a good substitute for butter in cookies, and cake especially, when fruit and spices ar

If the regulation icebowl with hol or drippings is too expensive, try this or home use: Get a wire croquett basket, with loose wire handle, which may be removed.
