

## The Evening Chit-Chat

Mrs. Ella Flagg, Young of Chicago, the woman who is superintendent of the schools of one of the largest cities in the country, may more, in the world, and who was awarded that office despite the keenest of competition from the best male educators in the country, has newly proven her right to this great position. At least in my opinion.

For Mrs. Young has come out with the statement that the building up of the bodies of the pupils of the public schools is more important than the training of the mind.

"We have come to believe," says Mrs. Young, "that it is more important to build the body of the youth, until it is as near physical perfection as possible, than it is to devote so much time towards development in mental attainments."

I wish that every mother in this land might read and ponder well over that statement.

Especially every mother of daughters between the ages of ten and twenty-one.

I was visiting a woman recently who has a daughter fifteen years old in the last year of high school. She brought out the girl's report card to show to me. It was almost all "A's" with a wee sprinkling of "B's." She was evidently very proud of this card.

Myself I think she should have been ashamed of it. For the girl is a puny, undeveloped, underized, stoop-shouldered, colorless little caricature of a girl. And the report card was the symbol of the reason for all this.

It almost makes me want to cry when I see mothers and fathers allowing and even encouraging their children to sell gold for dress in this way. How can they be so blind or cruel? Is it success you want for your daughters, Oh mothers?

Then know that brilliant report cards, anxiously studied lessons will not do one tenth as much to bring it

to them as normal healthy bodies and a reserve of strength.

Is it happiness you want for your daughters, Oh mothers?

Then know that nothing can do so much to bring it to them as a healthy attractive body--the beauty of health and the sanity and power, of it.

I know two girls who have always given more thought to mental, than to physical development, and who have been brilliantly successful in school and college. These girls have married recently. Under the strain of married life, which should not be any strain to the normal woman, one girl has broken down so that she has had to give up her pretty little home and go boarding, and another has become so nervous and unlovable that the patience of a pretty good man has been tried to the breaking point, and a disruption of the marriage is actually threatened.

Oh mothers, please don't take this as the mere mechanical ranting of a newspaper writer. It's much more than that. It's the heartfelt word of one who knows.

Please believe me and save your daughters from the inefficient, unsatisfactory lives, for which they may be preparing by their folly.

No matter what the teachers may say, don't allow your girls, especially those between twelve and sixteen, to study more than two hours a day out of school. There's no possible need of it. If your daughter can't keep up with her classes that way, just let her drop behind. That's no disgrace, not half so much a disgrace as an undeveloped body would be. But I don't think there would be any danger of dropping behind.

And in the time that she does not study, see that she is out of doors as much as possible. Woods Hutchinson says that everyone ought to have at least three hours a day of outdoor exercise. Does your daughter get this? Does she get half this? Does she get outdoors at all, except the walk to and from school?

These are questions that I wish every mother in the country could ask herself, and if the answer is not satisfactory, make it so.

### Household Notes.

When frying anything in deep fat have the flour sifter full of flour handy. If the fat catches fire, sprinkle thickly with flour and save disaster.

Marble washstands that have become discolored may be scoured first with wet salt, and if this does not remove the stains, then with salt and lemon juice.

The nicest duster for dusting out a house is a duck or goose wing, which on account of its feathery softness, will not scratch the furniture as some dusters do.

For lemon cake filling, beat one egg, add a cupful of sugar and the juice and rind of one lemon. Cook in enameled pan until rather thick. When cool, spread.

For fried squash, take the small green and yellow variety, peel and cut into half-inch slices. Dip in eggs and flour or crumbs and fry in plenty of fat until brown.

A paste of olive oil and salt smeared on spots on furniture and allowed to remain a few minutes, and then rubbed off with a soft cloth, will often remove the spots.

Grease on the kitchen floor can be softened by pouring kerosene over it and letting it remain for fifteen or twenty minutes. Later scrub with hot soda water or borax and water.

The coarse parts of lettuce and celery which are unfit for salad, should be placed in the stock kettle or chopped up and put into the dinner soup. Use the celery leaves as well.

To serve with hot chocolate, delicious sandwiches may be made of brown bread with a filling of chopped dates and pecan nuts, blended with a few drops of honey and lemon juice.


If potatoes are greased thoroughly before being put into the oven to bake, they will have a rich, satiny look and the skins will peel off as thin as tissue when they come to the table.

Good black lawn should not change color in washing if it is washed quickly in suds made of white soap and warm water and then passed through clear lukewarm rinsing water.

When a collar of a linen or batiste blouse becomes slightly soiled, it may be cleaned with a little naphtha or benzine in the same way as silk or satin. With this process the collar will not need pressing.

To bake fish without a watery flavor, do not place it on the bottom of the pan, but in an old plate, well greased. Set this in the pan and pour enough hot water in the pan to reach nearly to the edge of the plate.

When making chocolate frosting, try stirring the grated chocolate in the milk and sugar syrup after taking it from the fire or just before putting it on the cake. The rich flavor of

**Two More Steamers Arrive.**  
**STEPHANO, 12,000; BEOTHIC, 30,000. BEOTHIC LARGEST TRIP TO DATE.**  
 S. S. Stephano.  
 The S. S. Stephano, Capt. A. Kean, arrived back from the frozen pans at 7 o'clock yesterday morning with not enough seals to pay for the liner's expenses. Her catch is reported for 12,000 seals, young and old. The ship did not strike the seals until the 19th of March when 5,000 were taken, and has been scouring the ocean ever since picking up scattered ones. On the way home Saturday the Stephano passed numerous old seals. The crew of the Stephano reports the wooden fleet now on the front with from 5,000 to 12,000 and are gone looking for old ones.  
 S. S. Beothic.  
 The S. S. Beothic, Capt. W. Winsor, steamed into port at 8 o'clock yesterday morning. Her catch was reported as 30,000 prime young harps, the weight of 40,000. This is the largest trip of seals brought in so far this season and more than likely will be the very largest as all the "leviathans" of the fleet here returned from the floe, except the Sagona which is practically clean. The Beothic's white-coats are very heavy, and Captain Winsor said that some of them, those taken from the last patch, were the finest ever brought to the country. Some of these he weighed before coming to port and they tipped the scales at from 54 to 70 lbs. each. Captain Winsor told our reporter there was nothing very startling for him to tell and his report was already "wireless." The Beothic first struck the seals on March 15th, the day after sailing, about thirty-five miles N. N. E. of the Funks. The Adventure was into the same patch and when it was cleaned up the Beothic had 10,000 stowed below. The ship lost no time in gleaning away to the eastward picking up scattered seals. On Friday, March 22nd, when about 150 miles south east of the Funks the Beothic steamed into a thick herd of seals. It was thought to be the main patch as the ocean was dotted with whitecoats. The crew were quickly on the ice and engaged in the slaughter. For two days 20,000 were killed and packed. March 24th the day was devoted to picking up pans when suddenly a heavy sea raged causing the ice to loosen and break up and several pans were lost. The Adventure steamed in just as the patch was cut up. On Good Friday the Beothic was into a small patch about 200 miles E. S. E. of St. John's in company with the Eagle. They each got a thousand out of it. The Eagle is gone north looking for old seals. She reported for 12,000 and her chances of a successful trip are bright. The Eagle reported the Sagona with only 2,000. The Beothic was looking for the latter ship yesterday to give her coal, but could not find her. Capt. Winsor thinks the Ranger will have a bumper trip. When least heard from she had 15,000 and is still picking up old fat. The Beothic's captain and crew are all well and report a very rough, spring

**Bristol Collieries in Operation.**  
 Special to Evening Telegram.  
 LONDON, April 6.  
 Good Friday was generally disregarded as a holiday in the coal mining districts. There were further suspensions of work, notably in Bristol district, where all the collieries were put in operation. In Scotland the men who returned to work were mostly non-unionists, the members of the union having received instructions to await the decision of the National Conference before resuming work. Rioting occurred in a colliery near Dunfermline, Scotland, where unionists attacked non-union miners who desired to return to work. The police were called, quelled the disturbances, but not before considerable property damage resulted. Judging from interviews with miners' delegates, who already have reached London for the National Conference, and from speeches at meetings held in the coal districts to instruct the conference, it will likely be prolonged. The element in favour of continuing the strike is very strong, and intends to make an effort to control the conference. General belief, however, is that extremists will be defeated. The action, it is said, is largely an expression of discontent with the federation leaders. Whatever the result of the conference, it is not likely to bring about a revival of the strike.

**Indignant With Government.**  
 The people of the South Shore are indignant over the neglect of the Government in the matter of clearing the Toppal Road. Over 6 miles of this thoroughfare are impassable for horses and pedestrians, and if people want to come to the city they must cross Toppal Pond and come through private property, and if the fields are closed against them and the ice of the pond melts, which it soon must, the men will be compelled to stay at home. Snow prevented them getting out fence and building material, and now the impassable condition of the roads keeps them from getting out wood. Even in the Premier's District the people of Petty Harbor and other places are similarly neglected to the surprise of everybody and certainly to their disgust. There is "a rod in pickle" for the "Split" Government, and no matter how long Morris and his minions may postpone the day of reckoning they will get their medicine from an outraged public. That "Tory times are hard times" is now well recognized by everyone, but the people will soon relieve the situation and relieve the country of the presence of the present corrupt boddies who have usurped control of the Government for their own aggrandisement.

**Four Funerals.**  
 A sad and unusual sight was witnessed in the R. C. Cathedral Thursday afternoon when four funerals reached there at once. They were those of Messdames English and Clooney and Messrs. James Moriarty and E. Harrigan. The burial service was read by Rev. Dr. Greene.  
**SCHOONERS ARRIVE.**—Several schooners arrived here yesterday from the westward for supplies. The first schooner was the Gamecock, from St. Mary's, to A. Goodridge & Sons.  
**SAILS TO-MORROW.**—The s.s. Fogota will sail north to-morrow at 10 a.m. She will go as far as Tilt Cove with passengers and freight.

**Bonne Bay Complains**  
**ONE MAIL SINCE FIRST WEEK IN FEBRUARY.**

 Bonne Bay and the northwest coast have had one mail since the first week in February. This is absolutely inexcusable and a flagrant neglect of our interests. **Gulf Fishery a Failure.**

 CHANNEL, Saturday.  
 Seal just arrived from Gulf with 3,200 seals, all taken since Sunday, March 31st. Captain reports at that time Vikiing, Bloodhound, Southern Cross, Lloydsen, 100 each; Labrador, 250; Kite, 200; not seen or heard of Neptune since early part of March. He thinks she struck Mecathina patch. The prospects of other ships are poor. The ice is very heavy and all the steamers were jammed most of the spring. The Seal will discharge her trip here in a schooner for St. John's and leave for Halifax when transshipment is effected.

#### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, April 7. The decision of the Miners' Federation yesterday to order the strikers to resume work brought intense relief to the whole country. The termination of the strike amounts to raising a ruinous siege of the nation's industries, which has inflicted financial loss far greater than would have been caused by war with a great power for a similar period. Scottish miners will return to the collieries Monday, but it being a holiday in England and Wales, the workers there will not return until Tuesday. By the end of the week it is expected that every colliery will be in full swing.

OTTAWA, April 7. It is understood that A. B. Morine has resigned from the Public Service Commission as a result of the charges made against him by Carvell, M. P., Carleton. Morine says the charges are groundless, but the work of the Commission should not be hampered, and he, therefore, places his resignation in the hands of the Government. The Government has not yet accepted his resignation, but Premier Borden's position is that the Commission must be above suspicion.

LONDON, April 6. Three destructive fires in historic country mansions occurred last night. The first was in Lake House, Wiltshire, an Elizabethan edifice, full of priceless Jacobean furniture, occupied by Percy Allingworth, M.P., who with his wife and children were only saved from death by the barking of a dog. The family made its escape in their night clothes. The other fires were at Rosshir House, on Loch Lomond, and Gushlown Castle, near Navan, Co. Meath, Ireland.

GLASGOW, April 7. Striking coal miners, who object to the settlement, commenced rioting at Lochgelly coal fields in Fifeshire. Fifteen were injured. So serious did the situation become that 100 police were rushed to the scene from the city. The strikers threatened to burn the colliery, which is located 7 miles N. E. from Dunfermline.

LONDON, April 7. There will be a great anti-Home Rule demonstration in Ulster on Tuesday. About 150,000 men will take part, and the meeting will be held in the Royal Ulster Agricultural Society's grounds. Bonar Law and Carson will be the prominent speakers.

ST. LOUIS, April 6. With a roar heard for miles, the Mississippi river flood burst the Government levee 5 miles west of here. By to-day 150 square miles of farm lands will be an inland sea.

LONDON, April 6. Russia has definitely agreed to participate in the "six power" loan to China to the extent of fifty million dollars.

EL PASO, Texas, April 6. The bridge spanning the Rio Grande between El Paso and Juarez was blown up by dynamite.

#### Noblest Deed Recorded in Militarism.

Perhaps the scene of the finest acts of individual heroism at the storming of Delhi, September 14, 1857, was the "ashmere Gate, where the third column, under Colonel Campbell, forced an entrance. Covered by the fire of the 60th Rifles, a party of sappers and miners advanced at the double towards the gate, Lieutenant Horne, with Sergeants Smith and Carmichael and Havildar Mahoo, leading and carrying the powder-bags, followed by Lieutenant Salkeld, Corporal Burgess and others.

They reached the gateway unhurt and found that part of the draw-bridge had been destroyed; but crossing by the precarious footing supplied by the remaining beams, they proceeded to lodge their powder against the gate. The wicket was open, and through it

The Enemy Kept up a Heavy Fire. When the powder-bags were at last all laid, the advance party slipped down in the ditch to allow the firing party, under Lieutenant Salkeld, to do its duty. While endeavouring to fire the charge, Lieut. Salkeld was shot through the leg and arm, and handed over the match to Corporal Burgess, who fell, mortally wounded, just as he had successfully done his duty. Then a terrific thunder-roar and explosion, scattering large masses of masonry and mangled human forms in all directions, announced that these acts of heroism had been crowned with success.

For this "glorious deed—the noblest on record in military history," as Braid-Smith justly called it, when bringing it to the notice of his chief, the few survivors were awarded the Victoria Cross.

Since I first heard such statements

## Rambling Notes for 1911

BY I. C. MORRIS.

#### CHAPTER I.

There will, of necessity, be a good deal of random in what I have to say this time; hence the reader will be prepared for a sort of broken tale and uncertain story. But whatever may follow it will be truth, and will be written just in the same manner as if one were looking into his friend's face and telling the incident of a holiday outing.

At the present time the question of holidays is an important one—that is, it has assumed somewhat big proportions, and is as much a part of our city life as is business itself. There are some people who assert that it has gone too far, and that we are being captivated by its spirit. This of course is a matter of opinion, and as opinions have varied from Adam to the present time, we can probably afford to let them pass for what they are worth.

But even if we never got a regular holiday, or a half holiday, we are better off in this respect to-day than we were twenty-five years ago; because the hours of business are better regulated, and much of the late hour system is gone and past, and let us hope gone forever. The Great Teacher said in one of his talks to the people of His day "that there were twelve hours in the day in which men ought to work." Some twenty-three years ago the late Rev. John Rowse based his morning sermon upon these words, at St. Mary's Church, South Side, and when he had closed his discourse, the feeling was very keen. Whether John Rowse's sermon did any good I do not really know, but when we compare labor conditions of the present with those that prevailed at that time, the improvement is so marked, and so great, that it would not be amiss to conclude he really did do some good by the selection of this subject that morning. At that time the subject was unpopular, and only a fearless man, such as John Rowse was, would dare to support it. To-day the question is not unpopular but rather it is popular; and men in every position of life look upon our present system of shorter hours with favour and approval.

Now in speaking of labour I do not mean that narrow view of it which confines it to manual exercises only, but I mean work in every aspect, and such as is necessary to the commerce and trade of the age and especially of our own country. The bookkeeper, or the cashier, or the manager, or the out-door agent works equally as hard as those who toil under them. This may not seem the case to the casual observer; but it is a fact none the less. When I was a boy I used to look upon the clerks, and book-keepers, and masters and clergymen, and schoolmasters and all such persons as being a class of individuals that had nothing to do with work, and that only those of us who actually bent our backs and bared our arms and toiled as labourers were working. I thought that because of my inexperience in the routine of the labour world; and it was an opinion generally held and quite freely expressed by the working classes. Often and often I heard the men about me say: "Look at that fellow, what a fine job he's got. He needn't pull off his coat, all he got to do is to sit down and write all day long." Much of the same idea prevails among the working classes to-day; but it is a very erroneous idea indeed, as all who have passed through the various stages of business well know.

It is quite a daily occurrence to hear persons say: "Oh, what a feeling of distress I have after meals, fullness of the stomach, heaviness and headaches. I feel too tired to do anything. I have no heart to exert myself, and at times I care for nothing." "I often have a pain in the pit of the stomach, no appetite, my heart beats rapidly on the slightest exertion. I feel just as tired when rising in the morning as when retiring to bed. My sleep is often disturbed, and I often awake with a feeling of suffocation and a difficulty of again going to sleep. I have to be careful of what I eat, and my life seems not worth living."
