

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

According to news received in London during the past twenty-four hours the Austro-Germans have made progress at only one point on the Roumanian front, but that point is one of considerable importance on the Roumanian side of Cymes Pass, which leads from northeastern Transylvania into northern Roumania, and is traversed by the railway. The Germans have reached a pass ten miles within the Roumanian frontier. In other passes the situation is virtually unchanged. Meanwhile the Russians have been heavily engaged in many places, attacking fiercely with the object of preventing the withdrawal of any Austro-German troops for action against Roumania. On the Macedonian front, it is announced, a grand attack began last Saturday.

TWO AUSTRIAN AEROPLANES SHOT DOWN.

There is much field yet to be ploughed, and there is work for all in the ploughing.

Our first duty is manifestly in the matter of the periment and Marie Re.

Is more age than product and the product of the pro in a lump from a market that for the time being has more money than it in the end must repay it from its own resources. The payment should come now and the resources should be explored and organised in the right way. Yesterday we referred to the sad drowning of Capt. Henry Morris, washed overboard from the deck of the little steamer Jennie Foote. The vessel had been on her way back from Battle Harbor and learning of the new port regulations here, headed for Carbonear. She encountered Tuesday night's storm crossing Conception Bay and had the stays supporting the smokestack carried away by seas. While temporary repairs were being made Capt. Morris was seen going aft on the opposite side of the ship. A few minutes later he was swept overboard by a heavy sea which boarded the vessel. Rescue was impossible owing to the conditions that prevailed. Deceased was a native of Trinity and a brother of Mr. Joseph Morris, merchant at that place. Two nephews of the deceased lost their lives recently: One was killed in ac-tion at the front and the other was lost at sea. Capt. Morris lived in St. John's for 30 years and was a respected citizen and a skilled navigator. He was an employee of long standing in the firm of Baine Johnston & Co. He is survived by 4 sons and 8 devictors. is survived by 4 sons and 2 daughters.
To the bereaved family much sympathy will go out.

### Body Washed Ashore.

In a message to Deputy Minister of Justice, Magistrate Giovanetti, of Trepassey, states that a body, identified as that of Edward Grace, of the illfated schooner Bonnie Lass, had been washed ashore there yesterday. No further information came to hand, though the assumption is that it was much decomposed, having been in the water since September 24th last when the Bonnie Lass foundered crossing Trepassey Bar.

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
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
