



Sir P. T. McGrath States His Case.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Allow me space in your columns to deny the charge in the Star and the Advocate last evening that my message to the New York Tribune describing conditions here was sent with the object of injuring the proposed loan being floated by the Government. I at once prepared the despatch which has been cabled back here and sent it to the Telegraph Office, to be wired to New York, and there my connection with the matter ends. I knew nothing of any loan being floated, and the appearance of the article at the same time that the loan negotia-

tions were in progress is a coincidence for which I am not responsible.

For the message itself, I have no apology to make. It is a truthful picture of conditions here as I see them, and it was written without applications are sufficient to the sufficient of the s political animus or any other ulterior motive, intended merely to explain the causes of the depression and discontent existing here and easily substantiated in regard to every state-ment included in it. I see nothing more unpatriotic in this article than in that which was published in the Montreal Star of April 30th, by Sir Philip Gibbs. This gentleman, as you are aware, is perhaps the greatest of the war correspondents produced by Britain in the recent struggle, and was given his K.B.E. for his services in that capacity. He is also the writ-er of several books on the war, and on other subjects, of numerous novels and of other literary material of high class. Since the beginning of the year he has been editor of the English Review of Reviews, and he has just completed a lecturing tour of the United States, which was most sucessful. He has now begun a series of syndicated articles appearing weekly in Canadian and American newspapers from Halifax to Vancouver, and from New York to San Francisco. In the first of these, published in the Halifax Chronicle, Montreal Star, Toronto Star and Win-nipeg Free Press of April 30th, he described conditions in England, as a result of the present strike, in the following terms:-ON VERGE OF STARVATION.

The miners in many districts are on the verge of starvation because their local associations have ex-hausted their funds. Women are pawning their clothes, furniture and even their wedding rings. In Cardiff, Liverpool and many other towns thousands of children are de-pendent upon charity for their daily food and there one sees the pitiful sights of working families waiting outside relieving offices clamoring outside relieving offices clamoring for small doles to help them over the next few days.

Here again is his picture of what would have happened had a general strike been declared by the Triple Alliance—Miners, Railwaymen and Transport Workers—as seemed probable for a few days:

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DIS-ASTER.

The volunteer defence force would have fired on riotous crowds and without any direct revolution-ary impulse there would have been something like a revolution unless all history is a mockery. What I have said many times in the United States and Canada is true, namely, that the British people are instinctively and traditionally opposed to revolution. 

THURSDAY, May 18th.

The House met at 3 p.m.

Notices of questions were given by Mr. Bennett, Sir M. P. Cashin, Mr. Moore, Capt. Lewis, Mr. Sinnott.

The House resolved itself into Committee of the Whole on Ways and Means, Mr. Scammell presiding, as Chairman of Committee.

The Prime Minister said he would deliver the Budget speech on the following day. It was proposed to impose a duty of 2½ cents per 1b. on sugar plus surtax. There was a deficit of \$184,000 debited to the Food Control Board in the Surplus Trust Fund. It was proposed to open an account in the Bank of Montreal for the F.C.B. and the surtax would be credited to that account until the debt of \$184,000 was liquidated, when the surtax would be removed. Some discussion arose with reference to the purchase of the stock of sugar remaining in the stocks of the F.C.B.

Mr. Bennett read circulars sent round by the F.C.B. to the various dealers concerning the sale of this sugar. So far as he could ascertain the importers were not anxious to take

sugar. So far as he could ascertain the importers were not anxious to take up the Board's offers owing to the uncertainty of the price. They discovered yesterday that Messrs. Rossiter had purchased the balance of the F. C.B. stock. It seemed very strange that on top of this the Prime Minister should say that the duty on sugar would be increased to 2½ cents instead of 1½ cents as originally an-nounced. He would not make any accusation of wrongdoing but there seemed to be something radically astray. This firm had an advantage of I cent per lb. over all other import-ers. The Government should have put ers. The Government should have put that sugar up to public auction. He saw no reason for discrimination. Rossiter and Co. were not a firm which could find \$65,000 at a moment's notice. There had been some inside information somewhere. The country was being bled to the tune of \$6,000. The Prime Minister disclaimed all knowledge of the actions of the F.C.B. on the part of the Government.

Mr. Bennett proceeded to throw some interesting light on the sugar question. He stated that \$206,000 was lost on sugar taken over from Har-

The Minister of Justice explained his last mentioned matter. Mr. Bennett said it was quite true hey had not actually lost this amount. They had sold it on a falling market, but although they had bought this at 25 cents and sold it at 15 cents they had later bought at 9 and 10 cents in New York and sold it at 15 cents, thus making up the deficit.
