



The Pacific Scandal in England. (By special cablegram to the Glob LONDON Oct. 11, 1873.

The Pall Mall Gazette says that it is very discouraging to note the tone of the Canadian press on the Pacific Scandal. It had hoped to see some general expres sion of disapproval of the conduct of Ministers, which must be held to be suspicious if not criminal. It is plain that party loyalty has been stretched to far in excusing Sir John & Macdonald, and that the discreditable attempts made to divert public attention from Ministers acts to petty questions as to the publi cation of private documents, and demning such publications affecting the character of public men, her the astounding blindness of party spiris.


