Washington, D.C., Jan. 28.-Consul Haynes at Nanking says that the famine is ten times worse than anvempire for the past forty years. The Chinese officials admit their inability to cope with the situation. The government is trying to help the starving people to keep their cattle and to this end is taking oxen and buffakeeping them thus until next spring, when it will return them.

Consul Haynes declares that whatever aid may be expended by this government in the present crisis will certainly do much to dispel the illfeeling recently aroused by the boycott, the exclusion act, etc. Consul General Rodgers at Shang-

hai advises the department that the reports as to the conditions appearing in the newspapers, both foreign and Chinese are for the most part sustained by investigations made by American naval officers. Further
