CLEVELAND AND STEVENSON.

THE DEMOCRATIC NOMINEES AT CHICAGO YESTERDAY.

The President had everything his own way. The friends of ex-Governor Gray of Indiana made a hard fight for their favorite for the Vice-Presidency. But he was never dangerous.

FOR PRESIDENT—Grover Cleveland of New York, 1854; re-nominated and defeated in 1888.

FOR VICE-PRESIDENT—Hon. A. E. Stevenson of Illinois, first Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, 1875.

CHICAGO, June 23.—Grover Cleveland was nominated President on the first ballot at 4.49 a.m. He received 616,075 votes. Hill 112, Boies 103, Gorman 363, Stevenson 15, Campbell 2, Patterson 1, Whitney 1, Russell of Massachusetts 1.

It was a mighty and atmospheric and uncomfortable quarter that the delegates and spectators entered in the wigwam this afternoon. The conditions were not pleasant. All the speculation on the floor and in the benches was about the length of time in which the convention could complete its work and enable the visitors to leave the city. Another heavy rainstorm in the morning added to the general desire to get away.

Every day since the majority of attendance upon the convention from abroad has been in the city it has rained sometimes three or four times a day, and the exasperation of the visitors to Chicago is not to be wondered at. The delegates and spectators are in the wigwam this afternoon. The conditions were not pleasant. All the speculation on the floor and in the benches was about the length of time in which the convention could complete its work and enable the visitors to leave the city. Another heavy rainstorm in the morning added to the general desire to get away.

After the opening exercises the nomination of candidates for the Vice-Presidency was proceeded with, and during the entire proceeding the rain pattered on the roof and percolated through the rafters.

Governor Boies was looked upon as a likely candidate, but prompt upon his name being placed on the list he withdrew. It was then made that he would not stand. It then became evident that the contest would be between Hon. A. E. Stevenson and Ex-Governor Gray of Indiana, the other nominees, Mitchell and Boies, not being in it. When the roll was called the first vote for Stevenson was 235, for Gray 235, for Mitchell 2, for Boies 2.

Then began the changes, Iowa first came to the Stevenson camp, Montana next, followed by Nebraska, and then the other mid-western states. Missouri climbed over the wall, Georgia close behind and Kentucky came next. The flock of the states outside the Stevenson camp came to Kentucky with a rush of wings and later of feathers. It became only a question of time, and when the two-thirds vote for Stevenson had been obtained the nomination was announced.

At 5.30 the convention adjourned.

Marie Canal between Lakes Superior and Huron.

The Corcoran Parliament will be dissolved in a few days, and the general election which will follow, will decide the fate of the Irish cause in America, signed by Justin McCarthy, Thomas Sexton, John Dillon, Timothy Healy, William O'Brien, T. P. O'Connor, Arthur O'Connor, David Sheehy, William Abraham and Michael Davitt.

There is no shadow of a reason to suppose that Mr. Gladstone's ardor in the Home Rule cause has abated or that his fidelity to his engagements regarding the Irish cause has been in the least degree shaken. Within the past week he has given repeated assurances that he regards Home Rule as the paramount object of his remaining days.

By the readjustment under the last census the island must lose one seat.

THE HEART OF AUSTRALIA.

TO THE FAR BARROW RANGE WITH EXPLORER LINDSAY.

The Great Victoria Desert—Over Mountains and Plains From the Overland Road to the Forest, Near the West Coast of the Island Continent.

Diurnal failure has been the lot of the large party, led by David Lindsay, that was fitted out at great cost over a year ago to complete the exploration of inner Australia.

Three Unexplored Districts. The work of exploring inner Australia had, in the past, developed upon the lines of the Victoria Desert.

After leaving the line of the overland road, Lindsay's party crossed the Great Victoria Desert.

Over 400 miles southward was a remarkable little oasis, discovered by E. Giles in 1875. He reported that thousands of cattle and sheep could be raised in this fertile place.

At last the long-expected water was found. The entire scientific staff accompanied Lindsay and his party.

The expedition advanced except the discovery and naming of four mountains. Geographers are agreed that the mountains are of great importance.
