#### C. O. F. MUST INCREASE

Toronto, Oct. 2.—Alternatives of substantially increasing their rates or materially reducing insurance allowances, are presented to the Canadian Order of Foresters in the report of the special committee, consisting of G. T. Clarkson, Prof. M. A. McKenzie, of the University of Toronto, and Lyman Lee, barrister, of Hamilton, appointed by ex-Attorney-General Raney to look into the conditions of the big fraternal organization. The committee finds that the organization is but 47 and a fraction percent, solvent in its report presented to the attorney-general to-day.

The committee found that in class "A", which comprised 67,674 members, who had joined the order prior to August 1, 1919, a reserve of \$22,-385,000 was necessary to meet the maturing contracts.

The actual reserve available was only \$6,936,000, leaving a deficiency of \$15,449,000.


