Bank of Montreal crop report, Sept. 27: Threshing operations are well under way, and in most cases the yield of grain has been much better than expected. On the whole the heavy and silos are being filled. Root crops are good with the exception of potatoes. Winter apples fair. Tobacco crop has been badly damaged by frost. Pastures are in good condition.

DEATH OF DAVID ROSS

One of the most widely-known pioneers of Lambton Mr. David Ross of Watford, passed away Monday morning at the home of his sister-in-law, Mrs. W. P. McLaren, Ontario street, in his 93rd year.

Mr. Ross was born in Rosshire, Scotland, on Dec. 16, 1830. He was the son of Donald and Catherine Ross and came with them when only a very young child to Canada, settling near Little York (now Toronto). After residence there for a short time the family moved to Warwick (p. and settled on the homestead, corner of the 18th sideline and the Main road, where, deceased grew to manhood. Over 62 years ago Mr. Ross was married to Miss Mary Burwell of Warwick, who predeceased him June of last year. Soon after marriage he and his wife moved to Watford, where they spent the rest of their lives. Mr. Ross entered the grain and drygoods business with Mr. M. McLeay and afterwards was appointed postmaster, which position he held for over 35 years resigning about 12 years ago.

Mr. Ross was a life long Presbyterian and in his younger days active in local church circles. He was a member of the building committee of the church which celebrated its Jubilee on Sunday. He is survived by one sister, Miss Janet Ross of Leamington.

The funeral was held from his late residence, Main and Victoria streets, on Wednesday morning and was private. Rev. H. V. Workman officiated and the pallbearers were the six nephews who officiated at Mrs. Ross' funeral, namely, Theo. Luckham, David A. Ross, John Fraser, George Ross, Friend Luckham and J. W. McLaren. The body was placed beside that of his wife in the family mausoleum at the Watford cemetery.

APPOINTED TO SEAT ON COUNCIL OF RESEARCH

The Druggist Weekly of Aug. 1st has the following reference to Mr. W. H. Thom, assistant general manager, and a director of "Lymans," Toronto. Mr. Thom spent his boyhood and received his education in Watford and is a son of the late D. Thom.

"His many friends in the drug business throughout Canada will be glad to hear of the honor that has come to William H. Thom, Phm. B., chief chemist and a director of Lyman Bros., Ltd., Toronto, in his appointment to the Honorary Advisory Council of Canada for Scientific and Industrial Research. Mr. Thom, who has been with Lyman's for thirteen years, will represent the drug manufacturing interests of Canada, replacing T. Wardlaw, of Montreal.

William H. Thom, Phm. B., B.Sc., is a member of the society of Chemical Industry, and assistant general manager of Lyman Bros. He was also a member of the Canadian Council of the above society for a number of years. Mr. Thom was born in Paris, Ontario, receiving his preliminary education at Watford. In 1898 he went to London, England where he began his career in the drug business. In 1900 he returned to Canada and in 1903 graduated from the Ontario College of Pharmacy with honors.

Not content with this, he entered the Faculty of Applied Science at the University of Toronto in 1907, giving up the retail drug business. Here again he graduated with honors, in 1910, and as chief chemist immediately joined the firm of which he is now a director.

While at the university he was instrumental in organizing the Chemists' Club, which dates from 1909. This has since grown to be one of the most active undergraduate organizations.

Mr. Thom is to be congratulated on the progress he has made in his profession and his business advancement."

C. O. F. MUST INCREASE RATE OR REDUCE POLICIES

Toronto, Oct. 2.—Alternatives of substantially increasing their rates or materially reducing insurance allowances, are presented to the Canadian Order of Foresters in the report of the special committee, consisting of G. T. Clarkson, Prof. M. A. McKenzie, of the University of Toronto, and Lyman Lee, barrister, of Hamilton, appointed by ex-Attorney-General Raney to look into the conditions of the big fraternal organization.

The committee finds that the organization is but 47 and a fraction percent solvent in its report presented to the attorney-general to-day.

The committee found that in class "A", which comprised 67,674 members, who had joined the order prior to August 1, 1919, a reserve of \$22,385,000 was necessary to meet the maturing contracts.

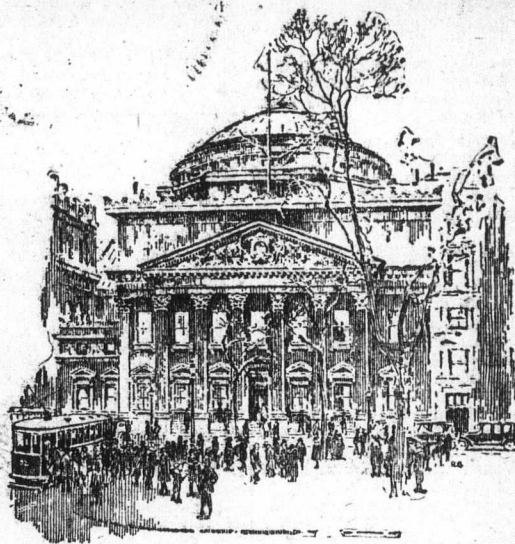
The actual reserve available was only \$6,936,000, leaving a deficiency of \$15,449,000.

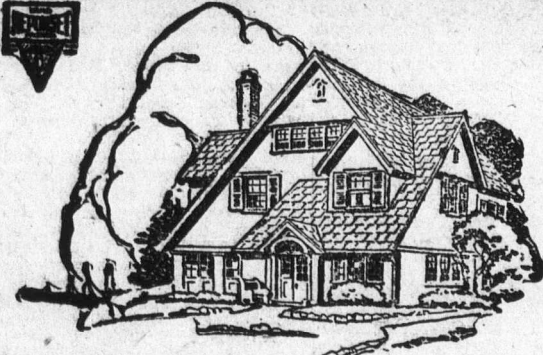

On the day's play Watford scored 29 points to their opponents 4 points and the postponed set will add a further 2 points to the club winning it.

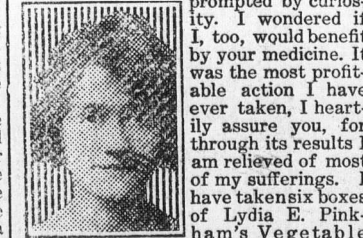

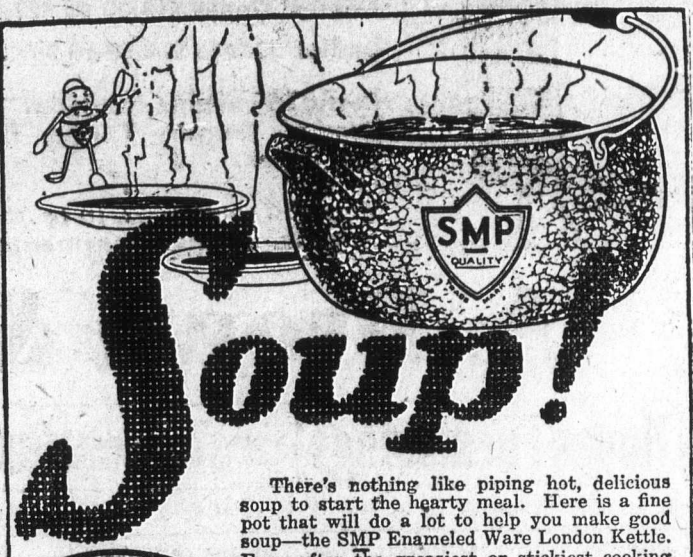
