TRADE MATTERS.

In his recent message to Congress President Cleveland significantly observed: - "with natural resources unlimit ed our progress should not be checked by a false financial policy" and adds "the real trouble that confronts the Government is the maintenance of its gold reserve". It is thus evident that the executive and the cabinet of the United States have no fears as to the future of the country the only matter with which they are concerned is how to deal with the pres. ent financial issues. The Democrats have one recipe, the Republicans another, and in the opinion of the solid men of the country, the multisude of counsel and the different modes of treatment prescribed is as with us an exceedingly potent cause of evil. Could the two parties only lay aside partizanship for a while and sit down to patriotically consider the situa tion they would not be long in Jevising means to prevent the national progress being checked. It is much the same in this country; where by many people the outs - that is the opposition are regarded as being a species of anarchist in asmuch as they make all manner of ob jections to the way in which affairs are being conducted, but are afraid to sug gest a remedy, even if they have as much confidence in free trade as some of them profess to have.

In Great Britain they are having what is termed "a boom time" in speculation. They have any quantity of idle money seeking investment, but hesitate to put it out in the United States because despite their unlimited natural resources they are afraid of the "false financial policy" which the opponents of the administration are forever denouncing. So it is here, the efforts of the opposition whether in Dominion or Provincial matters pover cease. They decry the almin's ration and in that way injure the country, for to say that its public affairs are improperly administered is the worst blow that could be aimed at it. And so instead of our having British capital more largely embarked in our commercial, manufacturing, mining and other enterprises, the money finds its way into

BRITISH COLUMBIA COAL.

We are pleased to notice by the San Francisco coal reports that business is very brisk and prices are steady. It is said, moreover, that during January there were periods when British Columbia coals were almost unprocurable. while tomage is in demand to carry coal from the Northern mines; extreme rates being paid. It will be remembered that about this time several vessels were lost and others made long delayed passages. It is well understood that Vancouver Island coal is the best that is sold on the Pacific Coast, and we thinkthough we, of course, are not down to the secrets of the trade, that in view of our proximity to the principal ports of distribution a bigger husiness ought be done, were the parties directly interested

the principle of the great advantage which accrues from quick returns.

Our collieries have to compete with the United States mines on the Pacific Coast and with those in Australia and Great Britain. The latter c al is brought out in considerable quantities at a very low figure, the profits of the carriers being made on the return cargoes of wheat and other products sent ab o.d. With the Australian article it is very different, a 'ong voyage has to be made, which is not the case with the United States and British Columbia coal. This is a considerable element in our favor. Then as for the competition between the coal produced in the mines belonging to our neighbors, the Vancouver Island article is so much superior that there is no wonder, as the matter has been put, that "teams have waited in line several hoursto secure a load."

IN THE INTEREST OF LABOR.

A bid is at present before the Provincial Legislature, introduced by Mr. Kellie, which provides that all wages due for labor performed within the province shall be paid for in the lawful money of Canada, and no other, and shall be paid at the place where suc labor is employed or at the nearest practicable point within the province. This is understood to be intended to prevent people in the mining districts paying for wages or supplies in depreciated American currency or at times, making their checks payable at Spokane or other American points, thus rendering it possible for a business to be done by people of a speculative turn of hand in cashing such checks or money orders. Another piece of legislation affeeting the working man is at present before the city council, Alderman Bragg having proposed that in connection with works carried on by the municipal auth rities, nine hours shall constitute the working day. Both these propositions are in the interests of the workers and should not only be adopted, but be deemed most satisfactory by those whose interests they are intended to promote. We may further note that on Tuesday evening a meeting of workingmen and t'eir friends was held in the city hall to discuss the respective merits of day labor and contract labor, the foll wing resolution prefaced by a preamble setting forth the general advantages of the principle being adopted: "Be it resolved by the citizens and ratepayers in mass meeting assembled, that the mayor and council be earnestly requested to have all work on streets, drains, sowers, waterworks, etc., performed by day labor, and that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the city conneil.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

We notice that an endeavor is being made to secure the weekly attendance of a band at Beacon Hill Park an idea which commends itself to us in a favorable manner. In castern and other cities it is the custom to have bands playing in the squares and public places much more frequently than is proposed here. The cost of such a departure would not be very much, while music in the parks proves an attraction which keeps many people from by no mears desirable places where the charms of music are made among the most attractive features. Besides, the cultivation of a taste for music has an elevating effect on all classes of the community and those who cannot afford to have it at home might at least be given the opportunity of getting it in a place of popular resort, towards whose maintenance every one contributes. Besides, as a rule the performers are among the best of the mechanical and operative classes, who may well be encouraged in their study of music. Generally the musician is in his own way a superior class of citizen, while as an operative his music taste seldom if ever detract from his skill as a handicraftsman.

In the opinion of the Monetary Times, the dry goods business of the spring of 1895 will be conducted under improved and more healthy conditions. People are not going to jostle one another in their anxiety to buy goods. In so far as we can learn, importres have been uniformly careful in their purchases of go ds for the coming season. 'A burnt child dreads the fire,' and we shall be gready disappointed if, at the end of the season, there is, as has so often been the case, a plethora of goods on the market to be disposed of at slaughter prices. There need be but little fear that the importers have gone to the other extreme, and there will not be enough goods to go around. For although this may happen in certain lines, so perfect are the means of communication and transport, that nothing more than temporary inconventence will be experienced from this source. It is further said that retailers are equally cautious, those interests having shown a desire to hold off until it is possible to see how they are going before they make heavy purchases.

"YEARS of better trade ahead" are what are confidently predicted in many quarters; but we have, while times are dull, to strengthen our position. When we get the romised better trade than in the meantime it is for us to prepare \Salmon regulation notoriety.

The Chicago "Trade Bulletin" estimates the wheat in farmers' hands, 42,-000,000 tushels less than last year. Supplies in sight, 21,000,000 bushels more. Aggregate supplies are 21,000,000 bushels less t'an a year ago. It also estimates that there is an exportable surplus up to July 1 of 59,000,000 bushels. European supplies are 23,000,000 less than last year, and Argentine supplies 12,000,000, to 15,000,000 bushels less.

For some time grinders of paint have been satisfied with their returns, and constant talk of higher prices has been heard. The Montreal men are unanimously in favor of a change, but one Toronto house is apparently satisfied with the status quo. However, a verbal agreement to ruse prices de per lb. has been entered into.

SAN FRANCISCO COALTRADE.

J. W. Harriso i's latest San Francisco coal report dated February 2 says: "During the week the arrivals have been from the Coast collieries, 27,557 tons; no fereign cargoes have come to hand. Business in this line is still very brisk and prices steady. Wholesalers and retailers are kept busy filling orders at full prices, and have had a very profitable fall trade up to date. During January there have been periods when British Columbia coals were almost unprecurable, and teams have waited in line sev ral hours to secure a load; latterly we have had free arrivals, and the rush has moderated somewhat. Tonnage is in demand to earry coal from the Northern mines, and extreme rates that good tobacco can be grown there reserve being paid Some rew names have turning \$225 per acre with a cos. of \$65 been added to the loading list at New-for seed and labor. the Northern mines, and extreme rates

castle, N. S. W., increasing the amount about 10,000 tons; even with this addition the total quantity of foreign coal loading for this port is exceptionally small. The Cardiff and Liverpool lists of coal carriers are very light and not a vessel at any Scotch port; this must lead to an increased demand later on for our Ceast products. Quoted freight rates from England and Australia show no decline."

PULP MATCHES.

A difficulty with common wooden matches is their readiness in breaking at critical times. The end may fly into a pile of waste or lot of dry papers and ignite the same and cause a fire. Many fires have been traced to such causes. In rubbing a wax match for lighting purposes, it will bend without breaking, and the end does not fly off. But wax matches are too costly for practical use The new pulp match is flexible, and like the wax match bends in igniting and does not break, as is the case of the wooden match. A chief feature of the pulp match is that it can be bent double and yet not break. A machine for producing the pulp matches has been made. A strip of prepared pulp is admitted into the machine. The strip is as wide as a match is long. Metal blocks are indented with moulds the size of a match, and each mould shapes matches from the pulp strip. - Maritime Grocer.

London, England, is witnessing an old time boom inspeculation, but it is con fined to shares in South Africa gold mines. Prices have been moved to high figures due to free buying by the English, French and Germans. The "Statist" of that city says that after a while the speculation now almost confined to the South African department will extend to other markets. The present cycle of low prices will last until credit recovers in the United States and Australia. As soon as credit does revive the large increase in the gold production will begin to tell. Prices will rise slowly at first and then rapidly, and we shall probably see some years of better trade than we have had for twenty years.

California fruit raisers and shippers are beginning to consider the possibilities of Washington shutting them out of eastern markets, which they have so profitably enjoyed during the past, California has now to compete with a railroad rate of 83½c per hundred pounds from this section to the St. Paul market. - Souttle Trade Register.



The Portland Commercial Review says: The market as a whole has been very dull, flat and unsatisfactory. Jobbers manifest only limited interest, moving in a slow and indifferent manner, making I few and generally lower bids. Holders persist in asking steady prices. The dullness and depression is attributed chiefly to the rapid decline in wheat and the export demand is almost nil; a small amount is going to California and a few lots to British Columbia. During the month of January we sent by steamer to San Francisco 22,300 barrels of flour, also large shipments to the Orient and British Columbia. Quotations for standard declined to \$2.30 with 10 to 20c less for inferior grades.

The di.crepancy between some men's capacity for buying and their capacity for paying mrkes many failures.






