

We believe that the regulations for the sale of beer should, therefore, be ease. Health, after all, is a simple different and more reasonable than thing. Fresh air, light and simple those applied to whiskey. Why not diet, plenty of cold water, and no exgive licenses for beer only, especially cesses provide all the means of perin cities and towns, and limit whiskey fect health. licenses to a very few places? And put stricter hours on the whiskey business than on the sale of beer?



EAGER TO TREAT WITHOUT CHARGE

Friedmann's Brother Complains Bitterly of Restrictions in New York.

NEW YORK, March 17 .- (Canadian Press.)-Dr. F. F. Friedmann meant to treat without charge all sufferers from tuberculosis, according to his brother, Dr. Arthur Friedmann, who today declared that it was a crime not to permit him to do so. Dr. Friedmann has been refused permission by the medical authorities of the city to give his treatment except in connection with certain hospitals. Since his arrival here hundreds of sufferers have besought him to aid them. "Many of these people have come from out of town and they cannot be taken into the city hospitals because they do not live here," Dr. Arthur

Friedmann declared. He told of a victim of the disease who had laid siege daily to Dr. Friedmann at his home for ten days. "This man," he continued, "has a temperature of 104 and 105 and is walking about the streets. He may drop dead in the street, but we cannot help him. Dr. Friedmann can treat only cases in hospitals and those under care of a government physician There are hundreds of persons in New York to whom he wants to give his treatment for the benefit of humanity but his hands are tied. He is eager to

Two Essential Points.

There are two essential points bear in mind regarding these early spring bulbs, and, unless close attention is paid to these points, very indifferent success will be attained. A very general impression seems to prevail that any time about the month of November is a suitable season for the planting. On the contrary, no greater mistake can be made. All bulbs should be given plenty of time before the arrival of winter to form good, strong roots, and also to make within themselves all necessary prep-

bloom obtained.

The second important point,—and it is MOST important with especial regard to the spring bulbs about to be described, presently,—is the fact that these bulbs, once established, should on no account be disturbed for several seasons at least. They one and all resent undue interference, after they have become settled. A situation should therefore be chosen that will not be required, later, for other will not be required, later, for other summer plants. Choose, then, rock-eries, the edge of your lily pond, and around the trunks of trees and shrubs, the sod being cut away in wide circles for this purpose. In such situations as the latter the bulbs may be massed with great effect, and since the ice and snow usually disappear from beneath these shrubs and trees earliest in the season, the bulbs will have an early opportunity of show-ing. The year 1912 has been a period of marked expansion, with undisturbed prosperity and steady development in every part of the Dominion. MONTREAL, March 17.—At the Montreal Stock Yards, West End Market, the receipts of live stock for the week ended March 15. were 1500 cattle, 130 sheep and lambs, 2600 hogs and 1400 calves. The supply on the market this morning for sale amounted to 1200 cattle, 100 sheep and lambs, 1900 hogs and 600 calves.

This was the Easter live stock market and in consequence the offerings of cattle were somewhat larger than usual and the quality much better, as the drovers in most cases make—it a point to secure some of the best stock that can be had thruout the country for this trade. The display compared favorably with former years, but there did not seem to be the same interest taken in the market on the part of buyers as heretofore. Trade on the whole was fairly good.

A few loads of extra choice stall-fed steers sold at \$7.50, including one of 22 head, which weighed 30,175 pounds and a number of loads of choice steers changed hands at \$7 to \$7.25 per cwt. For picked lots of extra choice Easter steers as high as \$7.75 to \$8 was paid, and choice sold at \$7.25 to \$7.50 per cwt. There were several buyers from Quebec on the market who bought all the extra choice and choice bulls at \$6.25 to \$6.75 per cwt.
