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
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EXTREME HEAT FATAL


Nearly Thousand Youngsters Were Guests of Ontario Motor League.

INDEPENDENCE IN POLITICS. Toronto is an excellent community for the airing of independent political sentiments at any other time than election times. Newspapers will praise wisdom, the courage, the moral force of anybody who ventilates a sentiment whose ventilation will effect nothing and affect nobody. But let the foolish wight bring his independent sentiment before the public while the scrutineers are being appointed, and woe unto him, and anathema and chloroform and similar chemicals.
