



Vote Against Church Union Said to be Insurmountable

Federation is the Acknowledged Alternative and Mission Work in the Northwest Will be Divided Between Methodists, Congregationalists and Presbyterians, Saving Much Money--Toronto Churches Favor Union.

When the votes on church union, due at the Presbyterian offices to-day from all parts of the Dominion are counted, the aggregate vote against will, it is already indicated, be insurmountable. Federation is the acknowledged alternative in the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational Churches in the cities and larger towns as now in practical federation in all general lines of religious work. The churches have agreed to devote their energies to certain district foreigners to avert overlapping. It is pointed out that the church federation idea is to be given its greatest expression in the growth of church union sentiment up to the point of organic union. Leading Presbyterians, strong at heart for church union, will at the coming meeting of the Presbyterian General Assembly, promote action by that body in favor of the union with the Methodists and Congregationalists. By this means it is calculated that hundreds of thousands of dollars can be saved.

The Nursery

We hear so much about nervous nannies that it is little wonder it is even associated with babies. In the first place, she must consider baby as the healthy little creature he will be, if she lets him alone and does not worry over every breath he draws. I have known mothers to waken babies out of sound sleep to see if they were alive. Sometimes baby has a colic pain that doesn't mean a convulsion. Take the baby calmly, obey all the rules of hygiene in caring for him and he will get along famously.

Nervousness, loss of self-control, so insist on your baby being left by himself when he is very little. Turn him from side to side when he is lying in his basket, but do not allow him to be taken up or played with. Babies under six months of age should never be played with or teased in any way. Older babies may have a quiet play after they waken from the morning nap, but unless you want to spend a restless hour, do not pick up the baby before his bedtime. Nervous babies are often excited before six o'clock as a result of fatigue and it is a terrible mistake to let them hear their mother laugh. Let the nervous baby live in the fresh air and sunlight as much as possible. When he is old enough to play on the floor by himself do not let him too many toys at once and let his toys be quiet ones. Noxy rattles and toys that bang only make a baby fretful and cross. Older children love bedtime stories and mothers and children are never closer than at this time, but great care should be taken in the choice of stories. Let them be interesting, but quiet and restful, of the kind that lead to bad dreams and distorted imagination.

Rev. W. J. Pedley Says Mimico School Enquiry Proved That Whole System of Training, Education and Production of Children Needs Scientific Treatment.

"If the Victoria Industrial School investigation proved anything it proved that our whole system of training, education and of the production of children needs scientific treatment," said Rev. W. J. Pedley in his sermon at the Western Congregational Church last night. According to the pastor the Industrial School investigation gave ample evidence that the present social system was not solving the problems of civilization. Vice and insanity were being fostered, and the social system was not being taken in bringing up children. "This investigation reminds us now of the fact that we are being fostered to reach a healthy bodily and mental maturity. The fact that the investigation proved that one-third of the boys were mentally defective shows that heredity grips and stamps them from the very beginning. Social investigations should be made to determine if heredity would have borne fruit but for the care of the state."

Another Starry Upturn in New York—Marconi Still Soaring

WALL ST. ENDS WEEK WITH ANOTHER SPURT

Extensive Covering By Short Interest Lifts Prices in Short Order—Public Were Better Buyers—Favorable Week-End Reports.

NEW YORK, March 23.—Further strength and activity in the copper stocks and affiliated securities constituted the dominant features of today's operations on the stock exchange. Amalgamated Copper was again the leader, coincident with an advance in the price of the metal to 1-1/2 cents per pound, dealings in the stock far outstripping those in its erstwhile favorites such as U. S. Steel and Reading. American Smelting was even stronger than Amalgamated, adding to its steady advance of the week by three points. Buying of shorts has been so persistent recently as to suggest urgent short covering. Other industrial issues of less market influence gained from two to three points or more.

In the railway group the colliers added to their recent rise after a period of dullness, and such lesser stocks as Chicago Great Western pref., Western Maryland and Kansas City Southern were unusually prominent. With the exception of American Tobacco, which was exceptionally strong, there was little activity in this special class.

Bank Reserves Shrink.
Despite the unusual market activity of the week, actual bank loans decreased a little over \$1,000,000, but actual cash loss was \$2,000,000. Reserves decreased \$4,750,000, which brought the actual excess down to \$12,250,000. Non-member banks reported an increase of \$1,700,000 in loans.

Indices That Trade Conditions continued to improve are found in the average daily bank exchanges. These show marked gains over the preceding month and are much larger for the current month than in the same period last year. Some check has been given to business during the present week, however, but the market had weather in the west and southwest.

Westinghouse jumped over 3 points. Canners preferred 3 points. Corners preferred 3 for Amalgamated. 1 for Utah, while Boston led itself loose and enjoyed a riot of bullishness as has not struck the centre for many a day.

Strength and activity of the market continued during the second hour, if a slight halt, and the closing prices were rampantly strong with gains of one to four points generally at the highest for the day. The Reid-Moore interests were not content with the marking up of American Can. issues, but took hold of the Rock Island stock and the common and preferred were run up 1 point, respectively, over the previous day.

Smelters rallied 2-3-4 points to 85-8-4. There has been still greater public interest in the speculation today, the Coppers and Industrials being the favorites. We look for a growing breadth of market with greater public participation as should buy stocks on all favorable chances.

BANK CLEARINGS ACROSS THE BORDER
Better weather conditions and a general expansion in business activity in practically every section of the country is reflected in a greatly increased volume of transfers as tabulated by Dun's Review. The total this week reported by all leading cities in the United States aggregating \$2,928,770, a gain over the same week last year of 16.5 per cent. and over the corresponding week in 1911 of 42 per cent. NO NEW INDICATIONS IN TORONTO MARKET

General List Shows Easier Disposition at Week-end—Buoyancy in the Bank Stocks.

World Office, Saturday Evening, March 23.
The Toronto stock market offered no new indications in its week-end session, trading to-day being of a small volume and price changes generally negligible. The undertone was, if anything, a trifle easier, such alterations as were made being in the main declines from previous levels.

With Wall-street once again demonstrating an exceedingly bullish disposition, it might have been only natural to have looked for an uprising of activity in the local exchange, but if there were any anticipations of such, they were doomed to disappointment.

The upward swing in New York fell entirely to make the Toronto list look attractive to the outside trading element, unless a much broader speculative movement can be engendered, there does not seem to be any immediate change for the better in prospect along that line.

The South American traction stocks, Rio and Sao Paulo, were only conspicuous to-day by their dullness. The latter issue was not traded in at all, while the liquidation of a couple of small lots of Rio carried the price of the shares down nearly half a point to 11 1/2. Rio holds solid at 10 1/2, their recent high level.

Twin City, Porto Rico, and Spanish River were all a shade lower, a week-end profit-taking movement being underway. The former sold down a fraction below 108, and closed with the best bid at 104 3/4.

Strength in Bank of Commerce and Union was the feature of the investment section of the list. Commerce advanced nearly four points to 230, and Union regained its previous high of 152. There was nothing in the day's news to account for the rise in either instance.

MONTREAL STOCK MARKET.
MONTREAL, March 23.—The buoyancy of the New York market on Saturday had little effect on stocks in Montreal, a dull and listless session of the local exchange leaving prices practically unchanged. The only movements of any consequence were in Detroit, Erie and Canadian Cottons common. The movement in the former set the price up to 6 1/2 at one stage of the trading, but three points over the price two days ago. The latter showed a similar movement, which left the stock at 63 for a net gain of half a point. Canadian Cottons moved back combined to 2 1/2 a net gain of 1/2, and about four points over the price at the beginning of the week.

THE BANK STATEMENT.
NEW YORK, March 23.—The statement of clearing house banks for the week shows that the banks hold \$1,341,900 reserve in excess of legal requirements. This is a decrease of \$2,297,000 in the proportionate cash reserve as compared with last week.

The statement follows:
Daily Average Loans, decrease \$4,583,000; specie, decrease \$3,881,000; legal tenders, decrease \$497,000; net deposits, decrease \$7,274,000; circulation, decrease \$1,658,000; total assets, decrease \$11,541,000; actual condition: Loans, decrease \$1,020,000; specie, decrease \$4,414,000; legal tenders, decrease \$35,000; net deposits, decrease \$1,372,000; circulation, decrease \$423,000; excess lawful reserve \$12,250,000; decrease \$4,750,000.

CANADIAN RAILWAYS AND THEIR EARNINGS
The aggregate earnings of Canadian railways from all sources for 1911 were \$188,734,493, an increase of \$14,777,276 over 1910, or 8.3 per cent. Operating expenses amounted to \$128,774,794, or 68.2 per cent. of the total receipts, leaving a net income of \$59,959,699, or 31.8 per cent. of the total receipts. The ratio of operating expenses to gross earnings was 69.4, or 2.1 higher than for the preceding year.

The net earnings of \$59,959,699 were equal to \$271 per mile of line in 1911, as compared with \$254 per mile in 1910. The amount paid out in dividends during the year was \$30,577,740, of which \$11,485,740 was on preferred and \$19,092,000 on common stock. After all proper deductions had been made the amount carried forward to profit and loss for the year was \$1,882,959. The railways of Canada in 1911 earned \$18,444,883 from outside operations, with expenses attached thereto of \$14,150,464. Gross earnings in 1911 came from the following sources:

LONDON COMMENT ON FINANCIAL SITUATION
Lombard Street View of the Wall Street Outlook—Conditions International and American.

The special London correspondent of the N.Y. Evening Post cables: London, March 23.—If the strike is called off as a result of the parliamentary discussion and of the new conferences between the miners and the coal owners, the miners should resume work immediately, the actual effect of the stoppage of coal supplies on general business would be greatly minimized. The huge supplies of coal accumulated previous to the strike combined with the freedom from commercial circles, have served to prevent up to the present any serious disastrous effect on the nation's commerce as was at first apprehended.

This, however, should chiefly affect American shares, South African mines, and other international stocks, because home securities will still necessarily be affected by the early introduction of the bill, and by continued unrest in labor. But even these home securities would presumably get a temporary advance on news that the present strike was ended.

Any further rise of gold proportions is not, however, regarded as warranted, pending definite indications of any electoral public opinion, and elsewhere, presidential nominations, and pending also some evidence as to how your people stand in labor circles and elsewhere, being the pressing social questions of the day.

The tendency on the Berlin money market, which has increased as the April quarter-day approaches, will necessarily remain acute until the early part of April. By that time, unless your market makes considerable requisitions on the part of your banks, and elsewhere, there was very little business transacted in the Birkenhead market, and quotations last called remain unaltered, States and Canadian steers making from 14-1-4 to 15c per pound.
