Dignity-Other Stirring Speeches-Many Ladies Present. Besides being a brilliant social success, the banquet tendered to Sir Wilfrid Laurier by the Board of Trade last night proved an event of national and even Imperial political importance.

Imperialism was the keynote of the whole function. Each speaker dwelt earnestly upon Canada's participation in the glories of the British Empire, and the Premier himself emphatically stated that he would not purchase trade with the United States at the expense of Canada's digniy.

In the course of his address, Sir Wilfrid made a formal announcement of vast interest to the nation. He stated, without reservation, that in two years a fast Atlantic service will bring Great Britain within four days' sail of Canada. The good news only tended to intensify the great confidence in Canada's commercial future, which characterized the entire function.

A feature of the banquet was that the guest of the evening was sur rounded on all sides by Tories. Sir Frank Smith sat beside him, and five of the half-dozen leading speeches were delivered by as many staunch Conservatives: Dr. Parkin, E. B. Osler, A. E. Kemp, Edward Gurney and D. R. Wilkie, to wit.


