REFINING CANADIAN NICKEL

It would seem that Canadians have in their hands several separate and distinct weapons for compelling the refining of Canadian nickel ores in Canada.

In the first place the Dominion charter granted to the Canadian Copper Co. (now included in the International Nickel Co.) some years ago contained a clause designed to render compulsory the treatment of the company's ores in this country.

In the second place, the Orford patent for refining nickel ores in Canada, which patent some months ago passed into the hands of the International Nickel Co., or nickel trust, which lapsed non-payment of government fees.

And, in the third and last place, it is to be remembered the four years ago, in the session of 1898, the Dominion government took power to put an export duty on nickel ores and matte by order-in-council, and that two years later the Ontario government passed a measure having a similar effect.

These days of legislative lobbying have developed a new and unique type of lobbyist. He has established himself at Washington, where he is known as the "Christian Lobbyist," and his object is to bring public opinion to bear upon Congress as to procure reforms.


