GARRISON AT ARMORIES CHEERS FOR KING GEORGE Impressive Scenes as Proclamation

Announcing Accession of His Majesty is Read to Troops.

While a multitude of people in Queen's Park were standing eager, expectant, yet withal patient for the official memorial service, Toronto Gar-rison, in accordance with military tra-ditions, had read to it the proclamation of King Edward's death and of the accession of George V., and afterwards the proclamation, pursuant to an act passed by the Dominion Parliament in 1906, providing in the event of the de-mise of the crown all persons holding office, should continue in the discharge of their duties and take the oath to the new sovereign as soon as possible. The troops mustered promptly at 145 p.m., under Brig.-Gen. W. H. Cot-ton, and drew up in column formation ton, and drew up in column formation on the parade ground south of the ar-mories, the permanent corps on the east and the militia on the west. Col. east and the militia on the west. Col. Sir Henry M. Pellatt as divisional and commanding officer called the brigade to attention and gave the order, "Of-ficers and colors will take post in re-view order." The whole force came to attention and the officers and colors moved to the front. Col. Septimus Denison as chief staff officer mounted an improvised platform, asked for si-lence and then read his excellency's proclamation, saying:
