

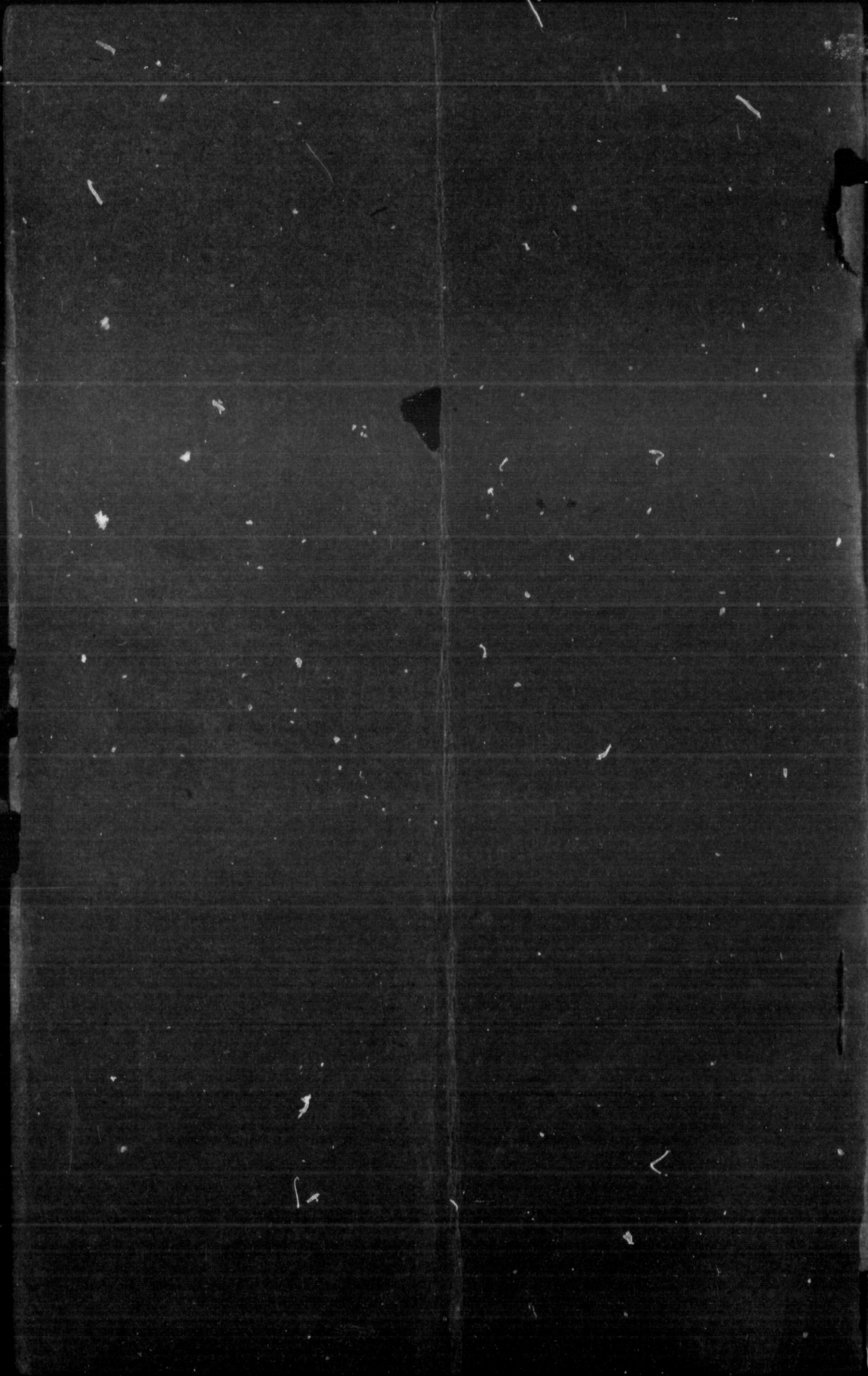

YEAR 1890-91

Notre-Dame Hospital was established for the cure and relief of the sick, without distinction of race or creed. The nursing of the patients is entrusted to the Reverend Grey Nuns, nineteen of whom reside continually in the Hospital. In addition to these, two ladies of the same community come to the Hospital every evening to watch the sick during the night.

The Hospital has a Catholic chaplain or almoner, who provides the help and consolation of religion to all who stand in need of it.

* * *

The Corporation of the Hospital is composed of Ordinary Members, Life Governors and Elected Governors.

The business of the Corporation is under the supervision of a board called the *Board of Governors*.

The medical service is entirely under the control of a board called the *Medical Board*.

Finally, the management and direction of the corporation are entrusted to a board called the *Board of Management*.

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Any person having paid a yearly contribution of at least five dollars, becomes an ordinary member of the corporation and continues to be so as long as he pays such annual contribution. He has the right to attend, take part in the deliberations, and vote for the election of Governors at the annual general meeting of all the members of the corporation, which takes place on the first Wednesday of July.

Any person having paid the sum of one hundred dollars becomes a *Life Governor* as long as he pays a yearly contribution of ten dollars.

The *Life Governors* are *ipso facto*, members of the Board of Governors.

The *Elected Governors* are appointed at the general yearly meeting of the corporation. In no case can their number exceed twelve.

In order to be eligible as a Governor, one must have paid a sum of at least twenty-five dollars and must pay a yearly contribution of at least five dollars. The *Elected Governors* have the same rights and privileges as the *Life Governors*.

* * *

The *Board of Governors* is composed of all the *Life Governors*, and of not more than twelve *Elected Governors*.

The Board transacts the general business of the corporation and meets at least four times a year, on the last Wednesday of March, June, September and December.

The Officers of the Board of Governors are a President, two Vice-Presidents and a Secretary.

The Board of Governors must report at the annual general meeting of the corporation, on the state of general business, in accordance with a statement made by the Board of Management.

* * *

The *Medical Board* meets once a month, its officers being a President and a Secretary. This Board has the absolute control of the whole medical department of the Hospital. It watches over the sanitary arrangements, suggests the purchasing of surgical instruments, appoints the attending physicians, the house-surgeons and assistants, and the physicians in charge of the out-door departments. It determines the hours for the attendance of physicians, the admission of patients and the consultation at the out-door departments.

The *Medical Board* makes regulations for the diet of patients and the behaviour of the medical students and nurses ; it has

the right to visit and examine the pharmacy at any time and to suggest whatever it may deem advisable for the good of the Hospital.

In the interest of science, the attending physicians and surgeons, or in their absence, the house-surgeons, have the right of performing a *post mortem* examination on all patients dying in the public wards of the Hospital.

* * *

As it has been previously stated, the management, control and regulation of the corporation of the Notre-Dame Hospital are intrusted to the *Board of Management*.

This Board is composed of a priest of the Seminary of St. Sulpice, appointed annually by the said Seminary; of not more than six members elected annually by the Medical Board (three at least of whom shall be members of the said Medical Board), and of not more than six members of the Board of Governors, annually elected by that body.

The Board of Management report to the Board of Governors every third month, eight days at least before the quarterly meeting of the said Board.

The officers of the Board of Management are a President, a Treasurer and a Secretary.

The Treasurer has charge of all the moneys, debentures and titles of property belonging to the corporation; he receives all the subscriptions, donations, legacies and other sums paid to the institution.

Eight days before the July quarterly meeting of the Board of Governors, the Treasurer must give to the Secretary of the said Board, a faithful and minute statement of all the sums received and paid by him during the year.

The Board of Management meets twice a month, on Wednesdays, at 4 P. M.

* * *

The Hospital is open to all the needy sick, *without any distinction of race or creed*.

The admission of patients is left entirely to the Medical Board. *However, no patient recognized as incurable or suffering from any contagious disease or mental derangement, can be admitted.* The same may be said of any woman in advanced pregnancy, unless she have met with some accident endangering her life and necessitating immediate attendance.

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Children under five years are not admitted, unless in certain cases requiring special treatment, and when the attending physicians and surgeons deem it necessary. No patient is admitted whose ailments do not absolutely require his stay in the Hospital.

The Hospital has five out-door departments: a general out-door dispensary and a dispensary for throat diseases under the control of the Medical Board; a department for the diseases of the eye and ear, nose and pharynx, under the direction of Dr. A. A. Foucher, surgeon oculist to the Hospital; a dispensary for the treatment of children's diseases, under the control of Dr. S. Lachapelle and a dispensary for the diseases of women conducted by Dr. T. Brennan.

The number of patients treated this year at the out-door departments was 22,567.

The daily visit of the wards is made regularly at 11 A. M. by the attending physicians and surgeons. As will be seen further on, the house-surgeons make an additional visit, morning and evening.

Besides the public wards where poor patients are admitted, there are in the Hospital, private wards for each of the patients as has the means of paying. In these private wards, paying patients enjoy all the comfort desirable and may be treated by their own doctor or any physician of their choice.

* * *

The house-surgeon and his assistants reside in the Hospital. They visit the wards at least twice a day, morning and evening. They examine all the patients suffering from serious or urgent diseases, and take charge of all cases brought in, until the attending physicians arrive.

The *house-surgeon alone*, or, in his absence, the assistant house-surgeon has charge of the admission of patients.

If any urgent case is brought to the Hospital, the house-surgeon must send for the attending physician or surgeon without delay.

The house-surgeon and his assistants must never be away from the Hospital when the attending physicians make their daily visit. If one of them is obliged to be absent at any other time, he must previously inform his colleagues of the fact, so that one of them may be always present at the Hospital.

The house-surgeon must enter, or cause to be entered, in books especially kept for that purpose, the names, age and sex of all the patients, the date of their admission and of their discharge, the treatment followed in each case, the state of the patient when discharged, the name of the disease he was

laboring under and other peculiarities. He must also see that the prescriptions of the attending physicians and surgeons are carefully prepared, and if necessary, must attend personally to the compounding of medicines.

The house-surgeon and his assistants are not allowed to take charge of patients outside the Hospital, nor even in the private wards of the Hospital; all their time and care must be devoted to the poor patients of the institution.

Those desirous of becoming candidates for the positions of House-Surgeons must address a written request to that effect to the Superintendent or to the Secretary of the Medical Board; an application blank will then be furnished the applicant.

* * *

No medical student is allowed to attend the Hospital unless he has previously taken his admission ticket.

Under no pretence whatever are medical students allowed to go into the wards in the absence of or without special permission from the attending physician.

During the daily visit, the medical students must follow the professor, as it were, *step by step*; that is to say, they must not examine or talk to any other patient than the one who is, at that moment, the subject of the clinical lecture.

Unless they are especially authorized to do so by the *chef de clinique*, students are forbidden to enter into conversation with patients.

The following positions are open to the students as non-resident assistants in each department: 1° Two in Surgery; 2° Two in Medicine; 3° One in Gynecology; 4° Two in Minor Surgery; 5° Two in the Eye and Ear department; 6° Two in the Histological, Pathological & Chemical laboratories; 7° One in the Electrical department; 8° One in the General Dispensary; 9° One in the Children's Dispensary. Those positions, so important practically, may be obtained by writing to the Chief House-Surgeon who will submit the applicant's name to the approval of the professor in each department. Each clerkship gives two month's service and a certificate of attendance is delivered at the end of term.

* * *

The ambulance calls number 393 this year.

The call is made by telephone, directly to the Hospital, and in less than two minutes the vehicle, accompanied by a house-surgeon, is on its way to the scene of the accident.

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On this subject there would be a suggestion to make: that the public would fully ascertain the necessity of asking for the ambulance before doing so, as it very often happens that the vehicle is called out by incompetent, irresponsible persons, for drunken people, or for those who do not in the least require it; this is to be deplored as it occurs very often and is of no benefit to any one. The attention of the public is drawn to this point so that useless journeys may be avoided and that a competent and a responsible person may make the call by telephone.

* * *

The Hospital can receive at present 22 patients in the private rooms, and 96 patients in the public wards.

There has been this year, a daily average of 86 patients in the Hospital.

The average stay of each patient was 21.2 days and the total number of days, 37,015.

The death rate during the year rose to 97, or 5.0% of the total number of patients cared for; deducting the 5 who died prior to their admission, 8 whose deaths occurred within 1 day after admission and 10 within 3 days, the percentage falls to 4.2%.

* * *

Nine new life-governors were elected during the year: Messrs. J. Baxter, L. Bourgoïn, C. Desmarteau, W. Cassils, T. Saughnessy, T. Préfontaine, C. F. Cise, E. St-Louis and P. Wright. It is to be hoped that this example will be largely followed by parties who will deem it an honor to take an active part in the progress and success of a good work that is gaining in importance from day to day.

* * *

It is worthy of public notice that in all countries, and especially in England, hospitals dependent on public charity, are in a great measure endowed with bequests and extraordinary donations. This species of assistance increases their revenue and settles their existence beyond peradventure, by the creation of fixed and permanent funds. Let us hope that Notre-Dame Hospital will not be overlooked by such as feel disposed to leave legacies to charitable institutions.

* * *

The Hospital has received during the year the following legacies : Late Charles Bell, \$500 ; late N. Larivée, \$200 ; late P. Grace, \$100 and late M. L. Laing, \$100.

* * *

The Governors of Notre-Dame Hospital offer their sincere obligations to the Lady Patronesses, who have spared neither time, fatigue, nor expense, in their labours for the advancement of the institution. The thanks of the Board are also extended to the gentlemen who made the yearly collection, as well as to all who, by their donations, have enabled the Hospital to take its place among the most worthy charitable institutions in Montreal.

LADIES,

From our being associated with the Hospital, we have participated in the happiness that divine Providence has this year granted the worthy daughters of the Venerable Mother Youville, their foundress, whom they now see honored with the title of Venerable.

She is the first Canadian woman who has been found worthy of this honor; her life, as a woman of the world, wife, mother and nun is a model for every woman.

We form a part of the house that is hers; let us then, as our director advises, join our prayers to those of the Sisters of Charity to obtain the prompt beatification, and even the canonisation, of their heroic foundress. Let us be ever more devoted to our work and the protection which she vouchsafes from heaven will be felt by us, since we have the honor of being her cooperators.

We must admit however, Ladies, that we are so with little trouble; with God and the managers' help, our task, so admirably assisted by charity and the goodwill of all, becomes more and more easy.

You will be doubtless happy to learn that to meet the growing demands of the Hospital, the administrators, during last June, had to purchase the property owned by honorable Judge Berthelot, and annexed to the Hospital on the southwest side.

It is to be hoped that the enlarging will, while fulfilling other requirements, permit the opening of a children's ward.

As you see, Ladies, there is still in Notre-Dame Hospital a large field for the exercise of our zeal and charity. For, besides

the cost of the property, this enlargement will necessitate further expenditure for the installing of those new departments and for their maintenance.

Heading our household feasts is the annual dinner of our patients, the Christmas of those unfortunates. It was given on the 27th December. His Grace the Archbishop, being then in Rome in attendance on His Holiness the Pope, Grand Vicar Maréchal, the administrator of the diocese, presided over and blessed the tables. The latter, through the inexhaustible charity born of religion, were amply supplied.

Among the clergy present, were the Superior of St. Sulpice, the Revd. Abbé Colin, Revd. Father Drummond, rector of St. Mary's College, accompanied by the Revd. Father Lemire; Abbé Sentenne, parish priest of Notre-Dame and director of our Association; Mr. Latraverse, chaplain of the Hospital; Messrs. Vaillant and Charpentier, priests of the Archbishopric. Besides those gentlemen, there was a large attendance of distinguished citizens, of physicians, governors and managers of the Hospital; also His Worship Mayor Grenier and many worthy friends of the institution for whom this occasion is a feast.

Forty Lady Patronesses, headed by their Vice-President Mrs. Amable Prevost, and dressed in their ambulance costumes so appropriate to those family rejoicings, surrounded and attended on the patients. Mrs. Prevost was acting president, in the absence of our worthy president, Mrs. R. Thibaudeau, who was confined to her bed by a long illness, which, although painful and trying, did not lessen the interest she has always taken in her cherished Hospital.

Gifts of provisions of all kinds, as usual, were very abundant; and the Sisters, the Managers and Lady Patronesses of the Hospital can not express in sufficiently grateful terms, their thankfulness to all those generous benefactors.

We equally owe thanks, Ladies, in the name of our association, to all who helped so generously at the concerts given at "Sohmer Park" for the benefit of the patients; to Messrs. Lavigne and Lajoie who so kindly benefitted the sick in the inauguration of their musical soirées so justly popular in Montreal; to the proprietors of the different newspapers who opened up their columns so charitably to advertise the concerts; to Mr. Melançon, N. P., and Mr. Lesage of the City Hall, who helped so energetically; finally, to all the friends and administrators of the Hospital who by their readiness in answering our appeal, assured the success of those concerts.

It is our duty also, Ladies, not to forget before the Lord, those benefactors: Colonel Chas. Bell and Messrs. Nap. Larivée, McLeod Laing and P. Grace, who did not appear empty-handed

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before the sovereign tribunal; their good works had preceded them and their charity to the Hospital, receives its reward above.

In closing, Ladies, I desire to again plead the cause of the "Bread Contribution." We have often spoken of it in our monthly meetings; it is so much to be desired that it be prosperous; it is such a trifle for each subscriber, and such an immense boon for the Hospital.

Why is not our voice loud enough to be heard by all those who might contribute to the good work. Let us unite our efforts, and redouble our zeal; if every one of our two hundred Lady Patronesses brought one charitable subscriber into the work, the annual deficit would soon be covered.

We are the witnesses, but how many persons are unaware of wonders of ardor, economy, labor and devotion that are accomplished in this asylum that charity opens to suffering.

God always blesses the care that is given the sick, either by curing them or by affording them the still more precious grace of suffering with resignation and of making a good death.

It is our duty then, Ladies, to help by every means in our power the worthy Sisters who devote themselves to those works of mercy; we must give and see that others also give the "glass of water" that is never without its reward.
