EDITORIAL

Parliamentary Battles Re-Fought

During the days when Mr. Gladstone's Home Rule Bill was under discussion in the house of commons a Conservative member noted for his rather truculent and combative disposition delivered himself of one of his usual fiery harangues. He was answered, if we remember rightly, by Mr. Tim Healy, who brought down the house by applying to his bellicose adversary the magnificent verses from the thirty-ninth chapter of Job, descriptive of the horse in his strength. "The quiver rattleth against him, the glittering spear and the shield. He swalloweth the ground with fierceness and rage; neither believeth he that it is the sound of the trumpet. He saith among the trumpets, Ha, ha; and he smelleth the battle afar off, the thunder of the captains and the shoutings." Appropriately as they were then used, they are equally graphic as a picture of that old Canadian parliamentary gladiator, Sir Richard Cartwright, who so recently laid down his arms to the last grim adversary. At the time of his death Sir Richard was occupied with the proof-sheets of the first volume of his reminiscences beginning with his first election to parliament in 1863, and closing with the victory of Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the general election of 1896. They cover, therefore, thirty-three stirring years of Canadian history, including the latter and fiercer half of the American civil war, the cancellation of the Elgin Reciprocity treaty with the United States, the accomplishment of confederation and the story of the earlier parliaments of the Jominion. Not only does Sir Richard Cartwright give his own ersion of the strenuous political and personal struggles and atrigues which marked that period, but he incidentally discusses he important issues arising from the development of the country nd its government and the evolutionary changes in the relationship to the imperial authority. He took his own share in all of these and whether his narrative or his judgment be or be not accepted oth are conveyed with that mastery of pure and nervous English liction which was equally conspicuous in the commons, the senate and on the public platform.

Copious extracts have already appeared in the daily press and it s only human that they have been selected mainly from the chapers that contain the personal element or Sir Richard's estimates of he' chief political battles of the time. The form in which the reminiscences are cast assists quotation. Sir Richard has supplied time. imself with an imaginary interviewer, an accommodating personage who asks the very question that is needed to provide an approoriate peg for the succeeding paragraph. This unfailingly correct and timely inquisitor also takes occasion to enliven his note book with graphic references to Sir Richard Cartwright's "grim laugh," his answer "after a pause," and other occasional indications of inernal feeling all of which one may imagine Sir Richard in his libary setting down on his manuscript with a sardonic or humorous nvoluntary chuckle. They serve, however, a literary purpose by arresting attention and preparing the reader for some peculiarly cyncal comment or well-weighed judgment. The device throws an interesting sidelight on the personality of the parliamentary veteran who could thus in the winter of his days fight his battles over again -"thrice he routed all his foes and thrice he slew the slain"-in the solitude of his study. Only occasionally does the old warrior a trace of that mellowing which should accompany the tranquility and serenity of old age. In the case of Sir John A. Macdonald he admits not having properly appreciated the difficulties of that statesman's position. Yet he adheres in substance to his original verdict. "Still looking back," he writes, "after the lapse of twenty years, while I do not feel called upon to retract one single word I have written or spoken concerning him, I am bound to admit that he may also have had more excuses than I at one time supposed, and also that in several important matters, he did, as a rule, try to do his duty." Surely that invited some modification of a not wholly informed judgment but Sir Richard would not yield-"the unsubduable old Roman"

Without pursuing further the personal concerns and political controversies that bulk so largely in these reminiscences, the opportunity may be taken to quote some passages bearing on matters of other than historical interest. In interview No. twenty-eight Sir Richard talks about the Halifax award and praises very highly the great tact and skill displayed by Sir Alexander T. Galt the Canadian arbitrator. The Canadian Government had successfully contended that the whole conduct of the affair should be left in its hands with a result fully justifying that course. This moves Sir Richard to remark that the position of the English Government as between Canada and the United States is delicate and difficult and he is disposed to make large allowances for them. Here he again urges that "it would be of great advantage to all concerned if Canada were allowed to have a special charge d' affaires attached to the British embassy at Washington, subject of course to the authority of the British ambassador, but appointed and paid by us and permitted to correspond freely with the Canadian Government. I am quite aware," he adds, "that there is no precedent for such a proceeding and I am equally aware that there is no precedent to fit the case of such a relation as today exists between Canada, England and the United States." Talking later, in the same interview, about the difficulty even the ablest British diplomatist finds in arriving at the real inwardness of the relations between Canada and the United. States he remarks that "the only Englishman of very high rank who had really grasped the situation in 1874 was no less a person than His late Majesty, King Edward VII." A notable tribute to the penetration of he who worthily earned the cognomen of "Peacemaker."

In interview forty-six Sir Richard deals in a suggestive way with another favorite topic-that of an alliance among Englishspeaking nations. His own "leading idea is that Canada, from her geographical position, must, so long as she continues to be a portion of the British Empire, be either a hostage for the good behaviour of Great Britain to the United States or else a link of union between the two countries. I have always hoped," he continues, "that Canada might ultimately prove to be the latter and one main reason I had for advocating reciprocity in 1887 and afterwards, was that I considered that if we were able to create a great and mutually profitable trade between ourselves and the United States. we would thereby very greatly diminish all chance of friction between England and the Great Republic, even if we did not go further and pave the way for a federation or alliance of all English-speak good. ing nations." Sir Richard has much to say on reciprocity thruout the volume and no doubt sincerely believed in its desirability. But ail the world knows today that the United States had in contemplation all along something very different from an alliance of the kind he desiderated. The famous "adjunct" letter of President Taft will long stick in Canada's gizzard. Our Debt to the Empire

In discussing the emergency naval contribution many of us make the mistake of believing that Great Britain is pressed for resources and really needs our assistance. As a matter of fact, the Mother Country will probably be able to worry along nicely for many decades, if not centuries, were we to refrain from giving at this

The sentiment which ought to prompt us in making a contribution is that we in Canada are as much a portion of the British Empire as the people of England themselves. Our self-respect should move us to do what we have hitherto refrained from doing in the past, not only for our own protection, but undertaking a reasonable share of the responsibility resting on all British states to maintain the integrity of the empire.

It is true that Canada did her part when the Boer nations threatened the stability of the empire in 1899, but previous to that emergency and itent to sit back and watch our brothers in England, Ireland, and Scotland do the fighting, while we merely passed resolutions. The British navy is our navy as much as England's and we have been wanting in self-respect in not assuming our share of the burden of its upkeep. When we vote a sum of money as an emergency contribution it ought to be considered as part payment of the debt we owe Great Britain and our future permanent policy should be determined with the idea of taking our proper place as a member of the family which owes its security to the effectiveness of Great Britain's

Christmas Gifts

Too much attention cannot be given to the question of suitable Christmas presents and we are glad to notice that there is an organized movement in the United States among prominent women to discourage the custom of giving useless things as Yuletide favors. This movement originated among the very rich people who could afford to spend money lavishly at this season, but who see no necessity of setting an example to those who are not so richly endowed. Because of the practice of exchanging gifts among friends and acquaintances a heavy financial burden is often entailed to keep up appearances and the work of selection so as not to duplicate or to give something not in taste, often drives women to the verge of nervous prostration. The practice robs the holiday of real happiness and the genuine sentiments of affection and cordiality that normally belong to them. The chain system of exchanging gifts destroys the real sentiment and makes the giving merely perfunctory. If we would allow each gift to represent genuine sentiment we would be doing something worth while this year.







BIG LONDON MOTOR SHOW

Review of Exhibits at Olympia

Famous as have been previous motor exhibitions at Olympia, the 1912 show bids fair to surpass any of its predecessors whether at home or abroad for novelty, merit and representativeness. Organized by the Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders in connection with the Royal Automobile Club, it is the eleventh of the series, going more than one better than the world-famed show of 1911. In fact, it is the world's large-

men, touring cars and luxurious town carriages alike are prominent.

Tendencies of the Exhibition.

The trend of the automobile industry as revealed by Olympia is both striking and welcome: In the first place, there is a real and successful attempt to blend as it were, the carriage work with the chassis, the majority of the exhibits no longer giving one the impression that the body has been built regardless of its future destination. On the contrary, the dash not infrequently sweeps upwards and outnfrequently sweeps upwards and outwards, its swelling panels merging narmoniously into the carrosserie. In not a few cases also, the same ten-dency is noticeable in the bonnet it-self, which likewise blends with the dash without an abrupt transition marking their junction. 

Automobile Legislation

SUNDAY MORNING

The Ontario Motor League is about to approach the Provincial Government in regard to changing and amending the. existing Motor Vehicles Act. The World does not know what is proposed along these lines. but we beg to draw attention to a few of the things needed in order to remove the heavy burden of injustice under which the automobile owner at present

First: Give the motorist equal treatment in the courts; stop the practice of imposing a fine of \$1.00 on a teamster and \$5.00, or more, on a motorist for the same offence.

Second: The motorist is forced to stop his car while a street car is taking on or discharging passengers. A teamster driving a heavy wagon is allowed to push his way thru the crowd. Make this regulation apply to all vehicles.

Third: A motor car is obliged to carry anywhere from two to five lights; a heavy. cumbersome wagon, which takes up more room in the highway, is not compelled to carry any light. This is an absurd condition which could not exist in any other civilized country. Compel every vehicle that uses a highway at night to carry some sort of a light. If this were done the intensely powerful searchlights which motorists are compelled to use in the city would not be necessary.

Fourth: Amend the existing regulation in regard to passing unerals in the country. This is another example of rank in-

ustice to the touring motorist. Fifth: Amend the regulation which, in case of an accident. compels the motorist concerned to prove that the accident did not arise thru the negligence or improper conduct of the motor vehicle driver. There is absolutely no reason why the onus should be cast upon the motor man.

The above applies more to provincial regulations. There are a few points in regard to the operation of motor cars in Toronto, which the league might take up with the civic authorities. The traffic police seem to think it is absolutely necessary to give practically all their attention to automobiles. As a matter of fact, the average horse driver breaks far more traffic regulations than does the automobile man. If the police were to devote more of their time to regulating the horse traffic and less time to watching automobiles for possible offences, conditions in our streets would be considerably improved. In connection with this it may be mentioned that the motorcycle police are themselves consistent offenders against the Motor Vehicles Act, inasmuch as they do not carry lights upon their machines at night, and because they themselves continually exceed the legal speed limit. The fact that they are policemen does not give them any right to break the law.

The public attitude towards the motorist is changing. He is no longer considered an enemy of society. As usual, however, those who make our laws are the last to appreciate any change in existing conditions. Provincial and civic authorities must bring themselves up-to-date and cease to trouble the automobile owner with foolish and unnecessary prosecution.



Aviation and Motoring.

The debt which aviation owes to the motor car is, of course, practically limitless. If the earth-bound vehicle had not brought about the perfecting of the internal combustion engine, man would never have soared above the earth in heavier than air machines. Conversely, if the engine had been at that time brought to a reasonable degree of perfection, Stringfellow and his co-workers in the middle of the nineteenth century would have solved the problem that remained for the Wright Brothers to solve.

Now it seems as if the aeroplane might in turn offer some mildly helpful suggestions to the man who makes motor cars. The correspondent of one of the London motor weeklies was recently exploring the flying sheds at Brooklands, when he came across a fitting on a biplane which should prove equally useful on a motor car. This was a very ingenious yet simple gasoline tap, which was self-locking. The tap itself was of the usual tapered lug type, with a spring to hold it gasoline tight. In the handle of the tap, however, a small lever with a ball at the end was pivoted and the lower end of it was shaped to catch into either of the two slots in the top of the spherical body of the tap. Synagogue of Capernaum,

Where Christ Preached

DISCOVERY of unique interest has been made in the Holy Land. Hitherto there has been no building known to have been conspicuously associated with the life of the Saviour.

At last this deficiency has, it seems, been remedied. Professor Lucien Gauthier, of Geneva, a very eminent Biblical archaeologist, reports that the actual synagogue at Capernaum, where the Saviour preached, has been found.

Capernaum, situated on the western shore of the Sea of Galilee and near its northern end, was the scene of no less than five miracles performed by the Saviour mentioned in the New Testament. It was in this region that He began His ministry, and here most of its important events before His entry into Jerusalem occurred.

The Gospel of St. Mark begins by telling us how the Saviour came from Nazareth to Galilee and there called the apostles, who were working as fishermen. Then we read in chapter i., verse 21 of this gospel:

"And they went into Capernaum and straight-



The ruins now found on the shore of the Sea of Galilee are very extensive. Although the building is largely in a ruinous state, if would not be difficult to restore it to its original condition. It must have been a remarkably rich and handsome synagogue. The arches of the doorways and roof are very heavy and nificently carved. Several of the doorways are still standing.

The synagogue was ornamented with fine carvings of lions (the symbol of the ribe of Judah), with lambs and with eagles bearing garlands in their beaks. These stone carvings have been found in profusion among the ruins. Ineview of the fact hat such carvings were forbidden among the ancient Hebrews because they were graven images," the finding of these objects at Capernaum is particularly interesting. Their occurrence is strong evidence that the synagogue was not of very early date, and that it was built about the time of Christ. The strictness of the old Jewish law had been considerably relaxed at that time. There is also much in the style of architecture and the solidity of the building to support the belief that it was built by a Roman centurion.

Often the field in which the work is done is very narrow, and almost universally the underlying philosophy is felt rather than apprehended. The tragedy of Gilda's abduction and betrayal is one that takes place every day and this actor knows how to infuse just that touch of modern realism which makes the character live in spite of its artificial surroundings.

"The subtle touches of irony in the first act are intimated and suggested in the most quiet and unobtrusive manner possible, and are therefore all the more effective. The second act depends far more on vocal effort, and in this respect Mr. Riddez must yield the palm to others but he comes into his own in the third act, where with wistful, haunting appeal he implores the sympathy of the courtiers and later hears the story of his daughter's wrongs. Then the access of Berserk rage and desire for revenge is magnificently portrayed. It is a remarkably strong, tense and vivid performance, finished in its art, convincing in its realism, and singularly effective by reason of its quiet strength."

Torontonians will have an opportunity to judge of this wonderful artist when the Montreal Opera Company plays its lengthy engagement at the Royat Alexandra Theatre next February.
