

Interesting Story of Old Time Work Found in Archives

ONE NEAR SITE OF RAILWAY DEPOT

Records Found in the Letter Book of Elder Ward

An interesting account of tide mills operated in Saint John about 150 years operated in Saint John about 150 years ago, when a bushel of Indian corn could be bought for 50 cents, is taken from records in the local office of the Dominion Archives, Princess street.

"The first aboideau and dike at the Marsh Bridge," it says, "were constructed in 1788, by James Simonds, who soon after wards built two tide mills there, with perhaps a grist mill in connection. The first grist mill in the vicinity, however, was situated at the outlet of Lily Lake and was built about 1770.

NEAR DEPOT.

"There was a saw mill at the outlet of the mill pond, near the Saint John railway depot, as early as the year 1767. It was, of course, a tide mill, and was built by Simonds & White. Later on, and prior to the arrival of the Loyalists, there was also a primitive grist mill here. The Hazen grist mill was, however, of later date. The story of its erection in the year 1787 is contained in the letter book of the elder Ward Chipman. Writing to Messrs. Ludlow & Goold, of New York, under date June 4, 1787, Mr. Chipman says: "There was a saw mill at the outlet

"I have a share in a set of mills erecting here, for the completion of which several materials will be wanted, which I believe can be procured much cheaper and better with you than elsewhere. A list of them is enclosed, together with a letter from Mr. Stephen Bedell, our millwright, to his father, who lives upon Staten Island, who is a good judge of the articles we wanted.

. We wish the things to be shipped on board the schooner St. John, Benjamin Andrews, master."

The next reference to the mills in Ward Chipman's letter book is found in a letter to his brother-in-law, Wm. Gray, dated Dec. 12, 1787, in which the following passage occurs: HALF-DOLLAR BUSHEL.

"I am concerned pretty largely in a set of tide mills erected in the city in the summer, which are so far completed that we have one pair of stones grinding very handsomely; and if Indian corn is at a low price with you it will answer very well to import a quantity here. I have, therefore, desired Lovett not to engage any freight after his arrival in Boston until he hears from you. If good Indian corn in as low with you as half a dollar a bushel and can be conveniently procured, shall be obliged if you will ship me by him 400 bushels. It will be necessary to see that the quality is good, as it will be gound entirely for family use, Indian meal being much used here by the poor."

THE one thing in the world that women yearn for most, and get least, from men, is the truth. Man flatters woman, and he scolds and blames her, He cajoles her and he jollies her, and occasionally he browbeats her, but he seldom favors her with absolute veracity in his dealings with her.

Whether men consider that the naked truth is too shocking a spectacle for feminine eyes to behold or not, no one can say. THIS is bad enough in society, but for the business woman it is tragical.

No one but the working woman, who has had to deal with men, knows how hard it is to get a man to tell her the truth. He will make her a thousand promises he never means to keep; he will delude her with rosy hopes he knows to be false; he will make a million excuses that have no foundation—rather than come bluntly and plainly out and tell her just how things really stand.

This is particularly hard on the girl who is just beginning to work.

If a man employs a boy as clerk or stenographer, and the youth makes mistakes, his employer will say, "Now, look here, if you don't learn how to spell, or if you don't come earlier, or quit looking at yourself so much in the mirror, you will get fired." And the boy thus adjured has, at least, a chance to correct his faults and learn his business; but not so the girl.

Her employer doesn't tell her the truth and give her an opportunity to learn her trade. He makes some feeble plaint about business being bad and having to reduce his force, and dismisses the girl, who might, had she been told the truth about why she failed, have learned to be a useful worker.

What we call women's unreasonableness is nearly always to be attributed to their not knowing the facts in the case.

ONCE upon a time I saw a half-dozen clever men—lawyers and trustees of an estate—absolutely balked by the uncompromising attitude of a woman who refused to be persuaded or cajoled or driven into doing the one sensible and obvious thing they desired her to do.

Finally they appealed to me for advice. "Go and tell her the exact truth about the situation," I said. And the bravest of the lot took his courage in both hands and remedies for hysterics in his pocket, and did so. The woman listened to him without a sob, and the minute she understood the real situation she did exactly what they desired.

In the domestic relationship the lack of truth between men and women is even more to be deplored. Who can doubt that there would be fewer disappointments in marriage if, instead of telling a a girl she is an angel and that if she married him she would never have to do anything with her lily white hands but soothe his weary brow, a man would say: "See here, Mary, I know you have a temper and a tongue, and so have I, and if you marry me life is not going to be any picnic by a long shot. I'm poor and I expect my wife to help me, and you'll have to wear made-over gowns and do the work of willing hands, and, please God, we will win out together."

OF COURSE, no lover says that—he draws a fancy picture of an impossible Eden, and then when the girl goes up against the sordid reality she feels, and feeling, resents being roped into a confidence game.

Women may also justify their extravagance on the ground that they are rarely told the truth about their husbands and fathers' business. Not one woman in a thousand knows what she really can afford to spend, and men have only themselves to blame for the consequence of a woman thinking she can afford champagne on a beer income.

The pathetic part of all of this is that men put themselves to so much trouble for nothing and perjure their souls without reason. The truth and woman are not two inharmonious elements that explode and blow up when brought together. Rather do they make a soothing combination that makes for peace and harmony.

IT IS because women know they are being lied to that makes them unreasonable, suspicious and jealous, for we all fear ghosts that we cannot see more than the perils we do see.

A man can never know what a sensible, practical good fellow his wife is until he begins to tell her the truth about things.

IMPORTANT.—In preparing feeding mixtures it is imperative that all utensils, bottles, nipples, etc., should be sterilized in boiling water before using. Use a dry spoon in removing contents from the can, and in measuring be careful to pour from can to spoon, allowing the milk in the spoon to level itself. Repeat this procedure with every spoonful measured, using the same spoon every time. This will insure accurate measurement and produce the best results.

### DIET FOR CHILD DURING THE SECOND YEAR

Usually after the twelfth month, the mother should select a diet schedule. Every new article of food should be carefully prepared, and given at first in very small quantities. All meals are to be given regularly, with nothing between meals. With many children this expansion of the diet list is attended with considerable difficulty. They are thoroughly satisfied with milk, and refuse all other form of nouralment. In such cases, withhold the milk until the more solid articles of food have been eaten. If both are given at the same time, the child will prefer the milk and when he has finished drinking it he will refuse the solid food. The following diet schedule will permit the mother to select a suitable meal from the foods listed. It is never advisable to make a change in diet during very hot weather.

### NOTE: One teaspoonful of EAGLE BRAND CONDENSED MILK added to one ounce of boiled water results in a mixture equivalent in nutritive value to whole milk. Whenever the word milk appears in the following diet, EAGLE BRAND should be diluted accordingly.

9 A.M.—The juice of one orange.

3 P.M.— Beef, chicken, or mutton broth, with rice or stale bread broken into the broth. Six ounces of milk, if wanted. Stale bread and butter or rusk and butter. Many children at the above age will take and digest appleaauce and prune pulp; when these are given, milk should be omitted.

7 A.M.—Oatmeal, hominy, cornmeal, each cooked three hours the day before they are used. When the cooking is completed the cereal should be of the consistence of a thin paste. This is strained through a colander, which upon cooling will form a mass of jelly-like consistence. Of this give two or three tablespoonfuls, served with milk. 8 or 10 ounces of milk as a drink. Toast.

9 A.M.—The juice of one orange.

11 A.M.—A soft-boiled egg mixed with stale breadcrumbs, or one tablespoonful of scraped beef mixed with stale bread-crumbs and moistened with beef-juice. A drink of milk. Rusk or bran biscuit, or stale bread and butter.

3 P.M.—Mutton, chicken, or beef broth, with rice or

butter.

3 P.M.—Mutton, chicken, or beef broth, with rice or junket or with stale bread broken in the broth. Custard, corn-starch, plain rice pudding, junket, stewed prunes, baked apple or apple sauce.

6 P.M.—Farina, cream of wheat, wheatena (cooked two hours). Give from one to three tablespoonfuls, served with milk. A drink of milk. Rusk or stale bread and butter.

7 A.M.—Cornmeal, oatmeal, hominy (prepared as in the above schedule). Serve with milk, or with butter and salt. A soft-boiled egg every two or three days. Hashed chicken on toast occasionally. A drink of milk. Bran biscuit and butter, or stale bread and butter.

9 A.M.—The juice of one orange.

11 A.M.—Rare beef minced or scraped; the heart of a lamb chop, finely cut. Chicken. Spinach, asparagus tips, squash, strained stewed tomatoes, stewed carrots, mashed cauliflower. Baked apple or apple-sauce. Stale bread and butter. After the twenty-first month, baked potatoes and well-cooked strained beans.

3 P.M.—Chicken, beef or mutton broth, with rice or with stale bread broken into the broth. Custard, cornstarch, or plain rice pudding, junket, stewed prunes. Bran biscuit and butter or stale bread and butter.

6 P.M.—Farina, cream of wheat, wheatena (each cooked two hours). Give one to three tablespoonfuls, served with milk, or with butter and salt. A drink of milk. Rusk or stale bread and butter.

The following suggestions have proved to be helpful when properly used with bottle feedings, and they may be used in conjunction with Eagle Brand Condensed Milk. Always pour the milk from the can into the spoon—allowing it to level itself but not run over. You can readily understand that by dipping the spoon into the can you get more than a level spoonful, because of the milk that would adhere to the bottom of the spoon.

When you have added the milk to the water stir thoroughly. This is important.

We recommend that you cover the can tightly with an inverted cup, and keep it in a cool, clean place.

When baby is four months old, give one teaspoonful of strained orange juice, diluted with equal quantity of boiled water, once daily before feeding time. Gradually increase the amount until you are giving the strained juice of a half of an orange undiluted, once daily before feeding time. Orange juice may be continued until child is old enough to eat other fruits as well as oranges.

### OATMEAL JELLY

When baby is five months old, add one teaspoonful of oatmeal jelly to each feeding. Gradually increase the amount until you are adding three tablespoonfuls of oatmeal jelly to each feeding. To make oatmeal jelly add for our part of catheral light and for the contract of our part of catheral light and on the catheral to the catheral tables. four ounces of oatmeal to one pint of water; boil for three hours in a double boiler, and add enough water so when cooking is completed a thin paste will be formed. This while hot is forced through a strainer to remove coarser particles. When cold a semi-mass will be formed. Oatmeal jelly may be continued until child is old enough to eat

Oatmeal water very often relieves this co. dition. To make oatmeal water add one heaping tablespoonful of oatmeal to one pint of water, and boil for three hours in a double boiler. This will make a little more than half a pint of thick gruel to which add one pint of water that has been boiled. After straining mixture through fine strainer, you should have a little more than a pint of whitish liquid. This should be used with each feeding instead of the plain boiled water. If you find that this makes bowels too loose, dilute oatmeal water with plain boiled water.

Barley or rice water may be used instead of oatmeal water. If necessary two to three drops of plain codliver oil may be given twice daily added to the morning and night feedings.

### DIARRHEA

Give nothing but plain boiled water for twenty-four hours. Then start feeding with barley water, or rice water, to which has been added a little salt to improve the taste. If these feedings are retained, and bowel movements lessened, small amounts of very weak regular feedings may be started and gradually increased according to baby's condition. If your baby does not improve after trying the above suggestions, consult your doctor at once.

Obtain the very best barley flour. Add one rounded tablespoonful to one pint of water. Boil for thirty minutes, strain; then add enough water to make one pint.

Add one tablespoonful of rice to a pint of water. Boil three hours, adding water from time to time so that you will have one pint of rice water at the end of the three

### LIME WATER

It is seldom necessary to use lime water with Eagle Brand Milk but should there be undigested particles of food in the bowel movements (which seem to be otherwise normal) or should there be vomiting of large curds shortly after feeding—or colic—it would be then advisable to try lime water. Obtain freshly prepared lime water at the Druggists, of which add 1 to 2 teaspoonfuls to each feeding.

### COLIC OR VOMITING

These conditions may be due to over feeding, or constipa-tion. Reduce quantity of food and use constipation for-mula, or lime water formula, as given above.

ONDON, June 11. - The Soviet Charge, replying to a protest from the British Foreign Office, against the sending of Russian funds to English strikers during the recent general strike here, has made a categorical denial that the Soviet Govern-ment was responsible for these

contributions. This dispute, like previous ones in which the Soviet is involved, centers in the relation between the Third International and Russian trade unions OTTAWA, June 11—The parliamentary committee investigating the administration of the Department of Customs and Excise concluded its public sittings this evening.

The committee will meet again on Tuesday morning, but the sitting will

be private for the purpose of considering the report to be made to the House of Commons. The expectation is that the report, or reports if more than one should be necessary owing to divergence of opinion among the members of the committee, will be presented to the House by Wednesday or Thursday of next week.

It is understood that the committee council have condensed the voluminous evidence which has been taken during the many sittings held into such a form that it can be handled with reasonable despatch by the committee in preparing the report.

The committee has been sitting for over four months, has examined hundreds of witnesses and delved into numerous reports on firms engaged in various Canadian industries. Its activities have revealed an extended system of commercial smuggling in silks, alcohol, automobiles and other commodities across the international boundary line.

PROTEST IS STRONG.

LONDON, June 11—A strong note protesting against the sending of money by the Russian Soviet government to assist the workers during the recent general strike in Great Britain was despatched to Moscow by the British government last night. It was transmitted to Sir Robert Hodgson, British representative at Moscow, for presentation to the Soviet government. No official text of the document is yet available and only its general tenor is known. The communication, according to unofficial versions, sets forth that the British authorities have definite proof that part of the money offered from Moscow to the Trades Union Congress was donated by the Soviet government itself.

This money, the note adds, was sent in violation of the Anglo-Russian Trade Agreement, and the belief is held that it was intended to foster a movement to bring about a change of government in Great Britain.







### Along The Sport Trail

SAINT JOHN AND THE NEW BODY. SIGNS are not wanting that Nova Scotia and New Brunswick along with Prince Edward Island will be handling their own sport affairs without interference one with another soon after the annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union here in September and the meeting here on June 21 will go a long way toward settling the matter. Obviously, if the majority of clubs under the present jurisdiction favor such a constitutional change in the best interests of sport, it would ill become the central body to oppose it and accede to the wishes of the minority. Nothing short of a miracle would bring every club into line on this particular question and efforts will be made to block such a re-organization. Proponents of the new arrangement argue that it is high time that New Brunswick be allowed control of her own affairs as is the case in every other province outside of the Maritimes. If it is good for the rest, it is good for the Maritimes and why should the Atlantic provinces be huddled together in a group and

more harmony developed under provincial associations. ONE of the objections already raised in New Brunswick is the fear expressed by a Moncton sport writer that Saint John clubs would wield a big stick and ruthlessly dominate any such organization. He

left to fight among themselves. Executive control, they claim, would be better than is the case now. Expenditures would be cut down and

"Any move to break with the present Maritime Province branch will be considered very carefully, particularly by those interests outside the city of Saint John, which probably unfairly, has already been accused of having too much influence in many ways in the amateur union."

AS NEAR as we can gather, the objection is against majority ruleone of the intangible foundations of the British Empire. If a new body is formed, some one must run it and as there is bound to be disagreement, majority must rule. This is what is happening in the M. P. B. today and has happened ever since it was organized but it is our claim that majority rule never hurt the M. P. B. one nth as much as the provincial personalities indulged in. The Moncton writer has doubtless attended several annual meetings of the M. P. B. He knows what we mean. It is this petty squabbling that has caused so much friction. The sponsors of the new movement believe that under a new regime, limited to the provinces, much of this friction would be done away with. We are inclined to agree with them.

AS FOR Saint John trying to hog anything, that is the last thing in the minds of amateur officials here. Every official we have talked to on the matter believes New Brunswick amateur sport would be bettered if we were allowed control of our own affairs under the specially-provided constitution by the Canadian Amateur Athletic Unions for all branches and under which the M. P. B. now functions. Few will find fault with the constitution. It is this petty bickering between the provinces that should be eliminated. Can this be done under separate provincial organizations? There are many who believe it can and are prepared to give it a trial. Have Saint John clubs ever banded themselves together deliberately to hurt Moncton clubs? Let us speak frankly on this subject and not raise sawdust dummies for knocking-over purposes. The action of Mr. Stirling in calling a meeting here on June 21 of all clubs is a step in the right direction. We can find out then just






