



MISS WYLIF DISGRUNTLED AFTER VISIT TO CANADA

Suffragette Says it is Worse Here For Women Than in the Old Country (Times' Special Correspondence)

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, June 8—Miss Barvara Wylie who went to Canada to enlist the sympathies of Canadian women in the suffrage question, has returned to this country and has lost no time in expressing her disapproval of conditions in the dominion which, in her estimation, are so bad that until they are improved she will organise a boycott.

"Until Canada has done justice to its own women," she says, "we will urge the women of England not to go there. We are told that Canada is a woman's paradise. It is nothing of the kind. A woman's life in Canada is extremely hard and lonely, and it is because of their loneliness that the asylums there are being filled with women, who are driven mad by the loneliness. They are caged in a 'shack' often miles from any populated district. Turn your back on Canada."
