Others are missing and scores were taken to hospitals suffering from burns and injuries received in jumping from windows.

RESUME CASE AGAINST UNITED S O E MACHINERY CO

Boston, Mass., Dec. 2.—The doctrine laid down by the United States supreme court in its interpretation of the Sherman anti-trust act in the "minimograph case," was the basis of the defense set up by the United Shoe Machinery Company yesterday at the resumption of the dissolution proceedings instituted by the government. Federal officials alleged the company to be an unlawful monopoly within the provisions of the act.

OTTAWA JOINS FIGHT AGAINST THE CHANGE

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—If the railway companies definitely decide to cut off their interest in the cartage companies on January 1, as they propose, it will not be the fault of the Ottawa Board of Trade. The council of the board yesterday appointed a deputation to go to Montreal to interview the officials of the Grand Trunk and C. P. R. Not only Ottawa is interested, but Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton and London will be affected by the proposed change.

IN FAVOR OF STATE AID TO AGRICULTURE

Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 2.—Alexander Lucas, M. L. A., has submitted to the provincial government his report on state aid to agriculture, to investigate which he recently made a trip to Australia and New Zealand. He found that the state houses in Australia and the dominion in New Zealand were all enthusiastic as to the system and he submits complete and compiled statistics to show the great increase in agriculture which has taken place in those countries.





THE CRIMINAL; HIS PUNISHMENT AND THE EFFORT TO REFORM HIM

J. King Kelley's Address Before The Fairville Methodist Church Brotherhood

Last evening at a well attended meeting of the Fairville Methodist Brotherhood, J. King Kelley, county secretary, delivered a very instructive and well received address on "Our Delinquent Population."

At the outset he referred to citizens generally being biased in their conception of prisoners in the keeping of the state, some of whom no doubt were innocent and others only partly bad. St. Paul himself was several times a prisoner and condemned by the government of the day, but people did not regard him as a character who should have been punished by his fellow citizens, but rather the reverse.

Mr. Kelley defined criminal law as merely a code of ethics the standard of which was being raised every year, which was being raised every year, making offences punishable which had hitherto been regarded as most trivial things and, in the opinion of the speaker, the increase in criminal operations was a cause of immorality as the ever growing number of laws which placed virtue on a higher level and made breaking the law easier matter.

He then traced punishment from the time of Henry VIII during whose reign 12,000 persons suffered the penalty of death and when, according to Sir Thomas More, twenty criminals had been seen on the gibbet at one time. There were 250 offences punishable by this extreme penalty and yet history records that crime increased in spite of the severity meted out to law breakers.

Mr. Kelley went on to say that, as the history of crime became shorter and they were gradually coming to the day when the law breaker would be punished in a manner to reform him, not to harden and embitter.

The speaker devoted some time to the methods of Doctor Gilmour, of the Central Prison Farm, Toronto, showing how kindness and good judgment in management had placed that institution ahead of most as to results with those confined to its keeping. Mr. Kelley read extracts from the bill prepared for our own government on a local prison farm and the comments and explanations were most illuminating.

In conclusion reference was made to Stead's book of Christ visiting the churches of Chicago, of his journeyings from one to the other and not finding congenial fellowship owing to the worldliness and selfishness of the congregations and finally of his visit to the hospitals, dispensaries, and prison farms, where the poor and needy were cared for and treated as if they really were human beings, in a sympathetic, kindly manner and of the author attributing to the Master the statement in regard to such institutions: "These are my churches, not the other."

A vote of thanks was moved by W. A. Nelson and seconded by W. J. Linton. On next Tuesday evening Mr. Nelson will address the brotherhood on some practical legal points with which the average man has more or less to do.



BIGGEST LIVERY BUSINESS WAS STARTED WITH ONE GREY HORSE

(Times Special Correspondence) London, Nov. 18.—What is believed to be the biggest livery business in the world—the proprietors of which own and run more than 600 motor-omnibuses, and employ, besides, more than 5,000 horses and a huge fleet of motor cars—proves to have started, some sixty years ago, with just one solitary grey nag. This business is the famous one of Messrs. Tilling, whose dispute with their motor-omnibus drivers over the question of whether the latter should be allowed to wear their trade union badges when on duty started a big "bus strike" here. The story of the growth of "Tillings, Limited," is one of the business romances of London. In the early fifties the district of Peckham, now a dingy suburb of the metropolis, was a "truly rural" locality, and about this time it was that a worthy resident of Peckham named Thomas Tilling started as a livery stable man with one grey horse and a trap. A shrewd soul, Tilling prospered from the start, and it was only about a year later that he commenced an omnibus service from the corner of Rye Lane, in Peckham, to Grace Church street in the "city," a distance of something like four miles. You can do it on one of Messrs. Tilling's motor-buses now for tuppence halfpenny, but for lugging a passenger in on one of his old dark green omnibuses the late Thomas Tilling charged one shilling and eleven pence. The "buses" were highly popular, however, for many years. Whatever may be slow about London, it is not her motor-omnibus services which manages to kill something like 800 persons a year, and injure a lot more—and, like time and tide, wait for no man, so it is rather amusing to learn that the first Tilling's "express" bus, which was drawn by four horses, used to call round at the private houses of its regular patrons before starting for the city. Its conductor, too, blew a post horn. However, the service succeeded and its originator started others in quick succession—to Dulwich, Clapham, Herne Hill, Lewisham, and a dozen other places. In the meantime he was developing a huge carriage business. For many years Messrs. Tilling have supplied the horses for the lord mayor's show, the metropolitan fire brigade, the army, and at the present time for the territorials. Three years ago they had 7,500 horses in their stables. They still have 5,000, and these include 700 greys, said to be the finest collection of its kind in existence. The present heads of the business are Richard and Harry Tilling, sons of the founder. The former was quick to see the possibilities of the motor, and can

claim the distinction of having run the first public motor bus—on the Oxford-circus route. The firm now run over 500 motor-omnibuses, and have one of the largest fleets of motor cars in London. They are also contractors to the post office for motor mail vans.

MONTRÉAL PETITIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT

Quebec, Dec. 3.—A Montreal delegation yesterday presented a monster petition to the government asking for the repeal of the paving law, the holding of a referendum on the board of control, and opposing the proposal of a citizens' organization to divide the city into fire wards. Members of the Chamber of Commerce and the Retail Merchants' Association presented the idea of their respective associations that the time was not ripe for the subdivision of the city. The premier promised consideration.



Savannah, Ga., Nov. 8.—A cross-continent flight in a day!
A great, graceful aero-yacht, capable, it is confidentially asserted, of accomplishing this marvel—of soaring away at dawn from New York, with passengers comfortably installed aboard, and settling down leisurely to its dock in San Francisco the next morning—has just been perfected here!



Captain M. A. Batson, U. S. A., Retired

It has gone through its first successful trials before officers of the United States army, on the waters of the Herb river. It is a wonderful twelve-wing hydro-aeroplane, upon the construction of which Captain M. A. Batson, U. S. A., retired, has been laboring more than ten years. During all that time word has drifted across at intervals from Dutch Island, in Savannah harbor, that Captain Batson was perfecting a novel flying machine which, he believed, would make the present types of planes seem like mere toys—"toys of death," he called them. But Captain Batson kept all details to himself.

Today it is complete! The marvelous craft floats lightly on the waters of the Herb river, displacing only twelve inches in spite of its great weight. Skimming over the surface, it makes sixty miles an hour!
The early trials seem to have proved that its stability is as great as its inventor claims. As soon as conditions are favorable, Captain Batson will make a further trial, taking his vessel on its first long air cruise—Savannah to New York without stop.
Then the great New York to San Francisco without stop, carrying passengers, will be tried.
The first aerial trials seem to show that 100 miles an hour can easily be attained by the vessel's three 120 h. p. engines of special design. The planes, moreover, are so attached to the body of the machine that the angle at which they cleave the air can be continually modified to meet changing air currents, and this will give the craft an even greater speed, it is expected.

WHAT BATSON'S AIR-SHIP MAY MEAN
If the Batson air-yachts were put into regular service over much-traveled passenger routes, there would be startling changes in the existing schedule.
A man living in Columbus could go to work in Cincinnati every morning and return in time for supper at night. A Toledo man could go daily to his office in Detroit and send his daughter back and forth to a private school in Cleveland. Neither would spend more time on the way than many a suburban commuter does nowadays.
It would be nothing at all for a San Diego housewife to run up to Los Angeles to do a little visiting with friends in the morning and return home in time to get lunch. Going from Tacoma to Seattle would be a shorter trip than it is going down town by street car in most cities. If a man living in Evansville, Ind., lost his job there, he could take one in Terre Haute without even having to change his residence.

This same novel arrangement of the planes, making it possible to change their angle of incidence at every moment, will give the machine perfect stability and security from accident, according to Captain Batson.
At the tremendous speed expected, and with absolute security, the air yacht will carry a crew of six men and twenty-five passengers, and fuel for a two-day journey. The passengers' quarters is the cabin, which is suspended between the planes. From a bridge in front of the cabin a pilot will guide the ship. It is said that controlling it will be just as simple as running an automobile.
Captain Batson's plan—or dream—is a feet of these ships—a regular aero-navigation system of passenger, freight and mail routes—real air lines! With this in view, he has organized the Batson Air Navigation company, with a capital of \$250,000.
Aviation experts say that it looks as though, thanks to Captain Batson's ten years of labor, the problems of com-



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CLUB WOMEN, UP IN ARMS, FORCE INDIANAPOLIS COLLEGE DEAN TO TRIAL ON THE CHARGE OF MURDER OF BRILLIANT YOUNG WOMAN PHYSICIAN

(Times Special Correspondence) Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 30.—Dr. William B. Craig, dean of the Indiana Veterinary college and graduate of the Ontario Veterinary College, Toronto, just placed on trial here for the alleged murder of Dr. Helene Knabe, through the intense activity of the great body of Indianapolis women's club, became the center of one of the country's greatest murder mysteries.

First—was Dr. Helene Knabe murdered? The police of Indianapolis said "Yes." The police of Indianapolis said "No."

Op—was Dr. Knabe a suicide victim? The police of Indianapolis, declining the murder theory, insisted that she was.

The whole Indianapolis Council of Women and a sorority of women physicians say nothing; they simply collected \$200 and hired private detectives to probe the case. The indictment of Dr. M. B. Craig and Alonzo M. Ragsdale, an Indianapolis undertaker, who acted as Doctor Knabe's executor, resulted, Ragsdale is charged only with being an accessory after the fact, the grand jury having heard he hid evidence against Doctor Craig.

In November, 1896, a German immigrant girl landed at New York. Her name was Helene Elise Knabe and she came from eastern Prussia. In fifteen years, through the progressive steps of kitchen work, business school and medical college, this girl, with no more start than thousands of other immigrant women, had become a practicing physician of Indianapolis and a bacteriologist of more than local fame.

On the morning of Oct. 28, 1911, this brilliant young woman doctor was found dead in her apartment—her throat cut almost to the spinal cord. No traces of the murderer, if murder it was, were visible.

On the morning in question Doctor Knabe's assistant, Katherine McPherson, stepped across the threshold, but one thing occurred to vary her ordinary routine. But that one thing suddenly assumed great import.

On the evening before, at six o'clock, Doctor Knabe asked her to call on her way to the office the next morning, for a pair of shoes she had ordered. She brought the shoes with her. Word came, intending suicide, order shoes brought to her.

Miss McPherson, not finding Doctor Knabe in the office, stepped to the adjacent bedroom. On the top of the bed, which had not been slept in, lay her employer's body, half naked. Her impression was that Doctor Knabe was in pain, she rubbed toward her—then sprang back in terror. Doctor Knabe lay in a pool of blood, her hands tucked under her head and thigh, and her head pressed beneath the brass rail of the bed.

On screens heard coming from Doctor Knabe's flat the night of the tragedy, will the prosecution build its case—that and the fact that a man was seen leaving the apartment soon after the screaming subsided.

The personal relationship of Doctor Craig and Doctor Knabe will be subjected to the scrutiny. And the crux of this examination will come when the prosecution attempts to show that Doctor Knabe had become objectionable to him—something which had caused bitter quarrels between the two. Craig will be charged with breaking a promise to marry Doctor Knabe, intending to marry Katherine Agnes Fleming of Avon, Ind.

Doctor Craig is a fine-looking Scotchman, big of frame. He is one of the founders of the Indiana School of Veterinary Medicine in Indianapolis and has a host of friends among the professional and business men in Indianapolis.

Rev. Dr. J. W. MacMillan Coming Here to Address a Meeting in Connection With Matter

The members of a special committee appointed to consider preliminary arrangements for a home for delinquent girls in the maritime provinces to have the way for later developments met yesterday in the Y. M. C. A. building with Rev. F. S. Porter, president, and Rev. G. A. Kubring, Rev. Gordon Dickie, and Rev. W. G. G. in attendance. Arrangements have been made to have Rev. Dr. J. W. MacMillan of Halifax address a meeting to those interested in the undertaking in the near future. Dr. MacMillan has had considerable experience in social work in Winnipeg and Halifax, and in addition is lecturer in social work at the Halifax Theological College. The proposal is to have a home on the cottage plan sufficient for the whole maritime provinces if means can be provided to finance the scheme. The government of Nova Scotia and P. E. Island have signified their desire to assist, and New Brunswick and Newfoundland have shown keen interest. The need for such an institution as is proposed has become apparent, and those interested say it is only a question as to the best means to secure it.

At the meeting refreshments will be served by the ladies of the Women's Council.

MUST KEEP PRINCIPLE OF HOME RULE, BUT ARE OPEN TO TALK CHANGES

Three British Ministers and Carso Speakers at Meetings Last Night

(Special to Times)

London, Dec. 2.—Three cabinet ministers contributed last night to the campaign of political oratory. Lord Haldane, in the stronghold of the Unionists at Birmingham; Sir John Simon, in the shipping and manufacturing centre of Hull; and Mr. Samuel, in his constituency at the seaside resort of Leeds. All leaned towards conciliation and a settlement of the Irish trouble.

Lord Haldane laid special emphasis on the need of immediate action and quiet discussion away from the heat of the public platform. He insisted that Mr. Asquith was as ready as ever to discuss the details of possible changes in the home rule bill, and the post-master-general was equally certain that the Leeds speech was not intended to shut the door, but he was not sanguine about a settlement by consent.

The government held that the fears of Ulster were unjustified, but it was willing to modify the bill without impairing its principles in order to calm the anxiety of the northern province. Sir John Simon repudiated Austen Chamberlain's charge that Mr. Asquith had withdrawn from the conference idea.

Sir Edward Carson spoke before a huge audience in Sheffield and declared that the situation was growing graver daily. Six months hence it would be seen that Ulster was not a province. Mr. Asquith had declared war at Leeds, they had accepted the challenge and would fight to a finish.

THE RELIABLE STANDARD

(St. John Standard, Tuesday.)

The government proposes to approach the question in scientific, workman-like fashion. The government is about to take the wise, business-like course. The cost of living will be dealt with by scientific economists well qualified for the undertaking.

(St. John Standard, Wednesday.)

The government has not yet reached any decision in the matter. When there is an announcement to make, it will probably be revealed that the problem will be dealt with in a satisfactory manner.

Now a Revolution in Ecuador

Guayaquil, Ecuador, Dec. 2.—A serious engagement took place yesterday when a newly organized band of rebels attacked the town of Milagro. After three hours of fighting, the rebels were routed. One of the rebels was killed, seven wounded, and eighteen taken prisoners. The government forces lost four killed and six wounded.

CARAQUET RIVAL OF THE COBEQUID

Sister Ship in New West Indies Service Arrives—Winter Port Notes

The steamer Caraque of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Line came into port last evening from London to take up along with her sister ship, the Cobequid, the service between here and the West Indies. The vessel is of the same substantial build and neat appearance as the Cobequid, and a good sea boat. In fact one of the officers said this morning that she is the best he was ever in.

The officers, the majority of them are young men, are a sturdy looking group. They are as follows: Captain, W. E. Smith, R. D., R. N. R., first officer, F. R. Miles, R. N. R., second officer, J. E. Atkins, R. N. R.; third officer, J. F. A. Thompson; purser, A. E. Milton; doctor, H. Clasen; chief engineer, H. Stead; second engineer, H. J. Gringer; chief steward, H. Wills.

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The ship was delayed somewhat during the early part of the voyage by the rough weather, but from the Banks in the westward the weather was good. The Caraque will make her first sailing from here on Sunday morning.

The White Star Line Teutonic was reported 700 miles northeast of Cape Race at six o'clock last night, bound west.

Ferness Line steamer Kappashanock will sail from Halifax this evening for St. John. She is due here on Thursday evening.

DEATH AGAIN ENTERS FAMILY CIRCLE OF F. P. BRADY OF I.C.R.

Son-in-Law, D. M. Ferguson, Passes Away in New York Hospital

(Special to Times)

Moncton, N. B., Dec. 2.—Much sympathy was expressed for Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Brady and family in the bereavement caused by the death of Mr. Brady's son-in-law, Duncan MacIntyre Ferguson in a New York hospital. He belonged to North Bay, Ont., and was about twenty-eight years of age. Within the last three weeks there have been three severances of family ties. The deaths include Mr. Brady's son, Arthur, in Montreal; Mrs. Brady's sister, in Vermont, and the son-in-law on Tuesday. Mr. and Mrs. Brady and their daughter, Mrs. Farnale, have gone to North Bay to attend the funeral.

MATTER OF CHECKERS AND C. P. R. ADJUSTED

The matter of the disagreement between the railway checkers and the C. P. R. has apparently been arranged, as the union men returned to work on the night shift last night along with the men who were used to fill up the crew on the night the trouble started. Mr. Croft of the C. P. R. said this morning that so far as he knew the matter had been adjusted satisfactorily to all concerned.

BOARD OF TRADE TO SEND MAN TO WASHINGTON ON THE MATTER OF POTATO EMBARGO

At a meeting of the council of the board of trade yesterday, the movement in the United States among potato raisers to have Canadian potatoes shut out of that market, on the ground that they are affected with powdery scab, was discussed. It was pointed out that New Brunswick has made enormous shipments of potatoes to the United States this fall, and looks to that market to absorb perhaps as great a quantity as has already gone forward. Not only so, but New Brunswick farmers have placed orders for more fertilizer, and did more fall ploughing this year than usual with a view to greatly enlarging the area under cultivation in potato crops next year. To have the American market closed would therefore be a disastrous blow to our farmers.

The council of the board will endeavor to have this province represented at the meeting to be held in Washington on December 18 to discuss the whole question. It is not expected that any immediate decision would be made by the United States government, but that a thorough inquiry would be insisted upon, and a demand for proof that Canadian potatoes should not be admitted before the proposed embargo would be considered. The consumers want the potatoes, because the United States crop is short.

TENDER ACCEPTED
