#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND PATRIARCH OF THE GRAND ENCAMPMENT OF ONTARIO.

My Dear Brethren,-

At the close of another official year, it gives me great pleasure to meet so many of you in this beautiful young City, meeting so many old friends shows that an all wise Providence has dealt kindly with us, and seeing so many new faces, indicates that our beloved order is steadily advancing in numbers and influence, I now beg to submit for your kind consideration a report of my work for the past year.

### DISPENSATIONS.

Since the last session of this Grand Encampment, dispensations have been granted for the following Encampments:

Cannington Encampment, No. 35, Cannington. Instituted, January 12th, 1877.

Royal Encampment, No. 36, Hamilton. Instituted February 5th, 1877.

Dresden Encampment, No. 37, Dresden. Instituted March 29th. 1877.

I had much pleasure in being present, and assisting in the institution of the first two, and D. D. G. P. Turner, instituted the other. I would respectfully request that my action will meet with your approval, and that charters be granted to those Encampments.

I likewise have had numerous applications to grant dispensations and to confer the R. P. degree on the same night that the G. R. degree was conferred, and in these cases I had to be guided solely by the recommendations of the D. D. G. P. It

would save a large amount of correspondence if power was given to the D. D. G. P. to grant such dispensations.

## INSTRUCTIONS.

The question was asked viz .- Whose duty is it to instruct the Encampment in secret work of the order?

Answer-The duty of the Grand Representatives is to instruct the members present at the Grand Encampment, and the Grand Patriarch, or in his absence, his D. D. G. P., to instruct the Subordinate Encampments; but, as the correctness of the work which the subordinates thus receive is very uncertain, I would beg to suggest that this Grand Encampment try and effect some arrangement with the Grand Lodge, whereby some brother properly qualified to instruct in the secret work of both branches of the order, may be employed to visit each Lodge and Encampment, and instruct its members in the secret work and thus ensure a uniform manner of working.

COMMUNICATIONS. I received a communication from the Grand Sire, recommending our suffering brethren in Savannah, Georgia, to our kindness and consideration, and I caused a circular to be issued in their behalf, also one from the same source, calling our attention to the fact that a large number of subordinates were using Odes, other than those published by the G. L. U. S. and to prohibit such use, I also caused a circular to issue in that case, carrying out the instruction of the Grand Sire.

A communication was received from Peel Encampment wishing to know in what manner the decision of the Grand Encampment in their case should be carried out. Said decision has been carried out as I directed, and they are now working in peace and harmony.

A Communication from Victoria Encampment, Port Hope, requesting to be permitted to resume work, as Durham Lodge, to which they all belong, had resumed work in the manner prescribed by the Grand Lodge. I complied with their request.

## QUESTIONS AND DECISIONS.

QUESTION.—From Livingstone and Niagara Falls Encampment, which Encampment should brothers residing in Welland Answer.—Article 2, sec. 3 Constitution says: A brother must join the Encampment nearest his place of residence, at the time of his application.

QUESTION.—Can a C. P. Vote at the Election for Officers?

Answer.-Yes.

QUESTION.—By. D. D. G. P., J. H. Post, Belleville. The C. P. being present, can the P. C. P. confer the degrees, he being requested to do so by the C. P.?

ANSWER.-Yes.

QUESTION.—Can the D. D. G. P., confer the degrees by the request of the Encampment or the C. P?

ANSWER.—He can by request of the C. P.

QUESTION.—When is a patriarch liable to be dropped or suspended for non payment of dues?

Answer.—Subject to local law—As this question is one which sometimes causes a great deal of discussion in subordinates, it would be wise if the Grand Encampment would record some definite decision in the matter.

#### (5) CASUALTIES.

I regret to announce the death since last session, of D.D.G.P. Grigg, of Wellington Encampment.

I also regret to have to report to you the destruction by fire, of the Odd Fellows' Hall, at Clifton, by which Niagara Falls Encampment lost all their property. No Insurance. I would recommend that another Warrant and set of Books be issued to them, without charge.

In conclusion, brethren, I beg to record my thanks to the D. D. G. Patriarchs, for the valuable assistance given me, and also to all the Grand Officers, and may our deliberation during this session, be conducted with that kindly feeling toward each other, and nothing be said or done to disturb that harmony which should always characterize a Patriarchial Encampment.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE R. W. GRAND SCRIBE AND TREASURER.

To the Officers and Representatives of the R. W. Grand Encampment of Ontario, I. O. O. F.

### PATRIARCHS:\_\_\_

In accordance with annual custom, I have much pleasure in giving a detailed statement of the work and progress of this sublime branch of our beloved brotherhood. Another year has passed into eternity, leaving its impress behind, and although notable for continued financial embarrassment upon all classes of our people, yet, we have occasion for thankfulness, that we are yet an unbroken band, and prosperous beyond measure. This certainly is an evidence, that the principles of Odd-Fellowship are deeply rooted in the hearts of our people, and no matter how poor he may be in basket and store, he cannot afford to forego the social hours spent in our Patriarchal tents. older we become, the more convinced we are of the healthful influences of our Lodges and Encampments, especially over our young men. Victoria Encampment, No. 25, Port Hope, appears yet to be in trouble, and even suggesting the giving up of their effects, as they find it difficult to sustain themselves dreditably, or keep up sufficient interest in their membership to warrant their holding on. The field is certainly a good one, and I am greatly mistaken, if a united effort was made by the Odd Fellows of that stirring town, that it would result in one of the best Encampments in the jurisdiction. I sincerely trust that some of our leading members in that vicinity will give them a helping hand; and that Patriarchs from adjacent Encampments will occasionally pay them a visit.

The several resolutions passed by this Grand Body, last session, instructing your Grand Scribe to carry out special duties, have been fully obeyed, and the greatest harmony and good feeling at present pervades every part of the jurisdiction.

In accordance with your resolution, I corresponded with the different subordinate Encampments by circular, enquiring how many copies of the New Constitution they would require; at

the same time enclosing each a copy, offering them at the nominal price of \$4.50 per 100 copies, but up to the present time have only received some three or four orders. I also instructed the D. D. G. P.'s to have each of their Encampments send in their By-Laws for confirmation by this Grand Encampment, but this has also resulted in absolute failure, as only four Encampments have responded to the request.

I also had 350 copies of the Journal of Proceedings printed and distributed in the usual way, as well as sent to our sister jurisdictions throughout the country, receiving in return Journals from the various State Grand Encampments; and many of the Grand Lodges.

Our membership now amounts to 1905, being an increase of 167 over our report of last year, and although no returns for the last term have been received from Victoria Encampment, No. 25, Port Hope, I have reckoned their membership in, as given in their previous report.

(3) STATE OF THE ORDER.—Three new Encampments have received dispensations during recess, and are progressing favorably, viz .:- Cannington, No. 35, Cannington, 12th January 1877; Royal Encampment, No. 36. Hamilton, 5th February 1877; and Dresden Encampment, No. 37, Dresden, 22nd March 1877. I was present and assisted at the institution of the two latter; and their prospects for future usefulness, and good membership, I consider second to none. No doubt two or three other Encampments would have been organized, only for the severe pressure in the money market, and consequent severe strain upon every description of business. The splendid crops and present appearance of revival in trade will have its effect upon the Order the coming year. . I have just received a petition from Montreal, Encampment No. 1, Province of Quebec, asking this Grand Encampment to admit them into this jurisdiction as a subordinate Encampment, which is herewith submitted for your action.

STATISTICS.—Nothing has given me more trouble than the difficulty experienced in getting the Scribes of the different Subordinates, to make out their returns correctly It is a moral e

impossibility to make my Annual Report to the G.L.U.S., tally from year to year, or to give reliable statistical information, when a number of the subordinates make out their returns in a slap-dash style, paying no attention whatever to the printed instructions. If this Grand body would inflict a fine, or some penalty on every Encampment sending in a bungling return, it would have a beneficial effect. They would then be referred to some efficient Committee for examination, before sending out, or some means would be adopted that would lead to efficiency and correctness. Another cause for complaint, is the dilatory manner in which they are sent in Every Encampment has its officers installed not later than the second week in January and July, and the returns should be mailed at once, so that they could be in the Grand Scribe's hands by the 20th at the farthest. But instead, last term, some of them did not come in till February and March, and one Encampment not at all, and the present term some of them not until the latter end of the 4th week in July, giving me only a few hours before the Grand Encampment meets, to balance the books, write, and get my report printed. The Return from Hebron, No. 17, for this term was by mistake sent to Belleville, and was not received when the books were closed. The certificates from Representatives have come in a little better this year, but a marked improvement could still be made.

The total revenue reported (one or two Encampments did'nt have any) amounts to \$6,542.54, an increase of \$105,80 over last year. 226 have been initiated, 36 admitted by card, 23 have died. The dues to this Right Worthy Grand Body, amounts to \$905.00, an increase of \$80.00 over last year. The following is the abstract of semi-annual Returns:—

FINANCE.—The financial standing of our Grand Encampment is good, our expenses having been considerably reduced by the decrease in representation, and our business steadily increasing. There will be no difficulty in the way of our procuring at once, a suitable Charter for Subordinates. All outstanding accounts have been paid, including Representative tax to G. L. U. S., for 1877; also, the salary of the Grand Scribe to the 30th of June, 1877. The only liability at present standing against us, is the loan of \$200.00, kindly granted by the R. W. Grand Lodge, in 1869, the first year of our existence, and for which the Grand Secretary only holds my individual note. We have a balance of cash in Treasury, and supplies, as annexed statement:—

Grand Lodge of the United States met in its fifty-second annual communication, in the City of Philadelphia, on the 18th day of September, 1876, with a large attendance of Representatives and nearly all the Paut Grand Sires. The only bodies not represented were the Grand Lodges of Montana, Switzerland, and British Columbia. Of the 146 representatives present, 58 were from Grand Encampments.

#### DECISIONS.

The Grand Sire Reported the following decisions during the vear :-

First.—It is improper for a Lodge to donate to an initiate a part of his initiation fee upon the ground that he had made a bargain with certain members of the Lodge before sending in his petition, that he should have part of his initiation fee back.

payment of dues and also for their reinstatement, repeals all former laws on that subject.

Third.—That an Indian presenting a regular card, having the pass-word, asses an examination, should be permitted to visit a Lodge; the fault is in the Lodge which initiated him.

Fourth.—That the several jurisdictions of the several States have the right to determine whether the dead can be buried by a committee of the Lodge or by the whole Lodge.

Fifth.—That the Lodge cannot, in a body as a Lodge, attend the funeral of a deceased "Ancient Odd Fellow," and conduct the services according to the ritual of the Order.

Sixth.—It is not illegal that members of a Lodge, by appointment of the N. G., shall, when the Lodge is opened under the head of "the good of the Order," deliver addresses or read essays on Odd Fellowship.

Seventh. - That the seal of a Lodge should only be used in transacting the legitimate business of the Lodge.

Funds of Lodges may be legitimately appropriated for the support of libraries. p. p. 6985 and 7054.

#### CHANGE OF NAME.

First.—Repeal Article I, Section I.

Second. - Substitute for Article I, Section I, the following:-

"Article I. Section I.—This Lodge shall be known by the name, style and title of the 'Supreme Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd-Fellows.'"

Third.—That the word "Supreme" shall be substituted for the word "Grand," in each and every subsequent article and section of the Constitution, where the same refers to the name of this Grand Lodge.

This was signed by one hundred of the representatives, and we have confident hopes that at the coming session it will be adopted.

CENTENNIAL.

The year 1876 being the Centennial of American Independence, and the Grand Lodge meeting in the city of Philadelphia, a locality rich in reminiscences of the early days of the

American people, it was no more than natural that the Session should be largely tiuctured with a flavor of Americanism, and that the true cosmopolitan character of Odd-fellowship should be rather overshadowed by the jubilant patriotism of our brethren south of the border. Parades, speeches and celebrations formed a marked feature of our last Session. Full reports of these were published at the time, and do not call for further reference here.

To the R. W. Grand Encampment of Ontario, I. O. O. F .:

Your Representatives to the R. W. Grand Lodge of the United States respectfully Report:

That they attended the Annual Session of the G. L. U. S., at the City of Baltimore, commencing September 17th, 1877.

### DECISIONS OF THE M. W. GRAND SIRE.

The following decisions, made during the past year by the M. W. Grand Sire, were duly approved:

Question. Is it right for the Grand Representative to give the A. T. P. W. to the Grand Lodge or Encampment, the same as he would the permanent P. W. during the exemplification of the unwritten work?

No. 1. Answer. No; the A. T. P. W. should be communicated by the Grand Representative to the M. W. Grand Master or Grand Patriarch of the jurisdiction, who will communicate it to the Grand Secretary or Grand Scribe, and cause it to be communicated to the D. D. Grand Masters and such other installing officers as he may find it necessary to appoint to assist him in the discharge of his official duties.

Question. Is it compulsory on the N. G. of a Degree of Rebekah Lodge to communicate the A. P. W. to one of its members who is divorced from her husband, whether he is still in good standing or has been expelled from the Order?

No. 2. Answer. If a member (Daughter of Rebekah), upon her own libel (of complaint) against the husband, has obtained a divorce, she would be entitled, under Section 509 "D," White's Digest, to the A. P. W; and the entitled, under Section 509 "D," White's Digest, to the A. P. W; and the Sh. G. of Degree of Rebekah Lodge would be the proper officer to communicate the same. But if the decree of divorce was made upon the husband's libel (or complaint) against the wife, the A. P. W. should be withheld until the Lodge should be satisfied that she had not been guilty of any immoral conduct. The busband's standing in his Lodge does not affect her standing in the Rebekah Digest.

Question. Are Lodges in this (New Jersey) jurisdiction required to submit their By-Laws, or amendments thereto, to our R. W. Grand Lodge and have them approved before they can have force and effect?

No. 3. Answer. The above question is entirely within the control of State Grand Lodges, and with which the Grand Lodge of the United States should not interfere, unless upon appeal in the usual manner. Vol. 8, page 6618, Journal G. L. U. S.

Question. Can an Indian with a withdrawal card be a petitioner for and become a charter member of a new Lodge?

No. 4. Answer. No, he cannot be either; the action of the Grand Lodge of the United States, session 1876, page 6977, decided "That no Lodge can lawfully permit an Indian to visit it under any circumstances whatever," which renders him also incompetent as a petitioner for a new Lodge.

No. 5. A brother of an extinct Subordinate Lodge, holding a certificate or card such as are described and provided for in Section 225 and 226, White's date of its issue; and the N. G's of Subordinate Lodges, when officially card, upon being satisfied of the identity of the individual, should communicate the A. T. P. W. to the brother holding such certificate or card. Section 1518 and 1519, White's Digest.

No. 6. The status of a brother holding a dismissal certificate is specifically defined in the third resolution as reported under Section 316, White's Digest, and if he wants to renew his membership, he must pursue the same course as

that prescribed for Ancient Odd-Fellows in Section 64, or as an applicant or petitioner for a charter for a new Lodge, as provided for in Section 316 "B," White's Digest.

### NEW LEGISLATION.

Legislation was had on various subjects, among which were the following:

The Judiciary Committee, to whom the following inquiry, emanating from the Grand Encampment of Massachusetts, was referred, namely:

"Can a Patriarch wear the prescribed street uniform at a funeral?" beg leave to report that this Grand Lodge has prescribed the regalia to be worn by brothers of the Order when attending the funeral of a deceased brother. (See Section 1698, Digest.) But the regularly-prescribed regalia of the Order may be worn instead of or in connection with the funeral regalia, as Subordinate Grand Jurisdictions may determine. (See Sections 666, 667, 1640, Digest.) The street uniform is one to be worn on public occasions (see Section 1670, Supp'l Digest), and a funeral, we infer from what we think is a fair construction of Section 1656, Digest, is such a public occasion as is contemplated by Section 1670.

We therefore answer that the question of whether the prescribed street uniform can be worn at a funeral is a matter of local regulation. It can be worn if the State Grand Jurisdiction shall so determine.

Where a Visiting Card has been granted, the dues being paid in advance, if By-Laws are amended or changed and the dues are increased thereby, the holder of Card must be governed by such By-Law and pay the increased dues.

An Encampment may not impose a tax upon its members to support Odd-Fellows' libraries.

The following report was made by the Special Committee appointed at the Session of 1876 to prepare and present a Code of Forms for Processions, Dedicatory and Funeral Exercises, which were considered seriatim, and, together with the resolutions accompanying, were adopted:

The Special Committee appointed in conformity with the resolutions of Rep. Given, of the District of Columbia, page 7005 of the Journal, Session 1876, of this R. W. Grand Body, would respectfully report:

That they have carefully considered the subject referred to them, and believing it to be highly necessary, and indeed very essential, to produce uniformity, and also to correct the singular anomaly and evident inconsistancy at present existing and operated by our "Rock of Forms" for processions, and

relating to recognition of title and assignment of position according to rank, etc., beg leave to submit herewith an amended form for processions, etc., and would sak for the same, together with the following resolutions, the favorable consideration of this R. W. Grand Body,

Resolved. That the Grand Corresponding and Recording Secretary be and he is hereby requested to compile and publish (under the supervision of the Committee on Supplies), in one volume, 18mo, with proper title, the Amended Forms for Public and Funeral Processions, Dedicating Malls, and Laying Corwith such other forms or parts of from so to inconsistent therewith, as may have been prescribed by this R. ### REGALIA.

That the regalia to be worn by all brothers of the Order, when attending the funeral of a deceased brother, shall be as follows:

First. A black crape rosette, having a center of the color of the highest degree to which the bearer may have attained to be worn on the left breast; above it a sprig of evergreen, and below it (if the wearer be an Elective or Past Officer), the jewel or jewels which, as such, he may be entitled to wear.

Second. That the ordinary mourning badge to be worn by brothers in memory of a deceased brother be a strip of black crape passed through one button-hole only of the left lapel of the coat, and tied with a narrow ribbon of the color of the highest degree to which the bearer may have attained.

[Nore.—The several State Grand Lodges and Grand Encampments may, at their discretion, permit the usual regalis of the Order to be worn at funerals, either in connection with or as a substitute for the simple regalia above described.]

On such occasions, the Marshal shall wear a black scarf and bear a baton bound with black crape.

The Outside Guardian shall bear a red wand bound with black crape.

The Scene Supporters shall bear white wands, bound with black crape. The Inside Guardian shall bear the regalia and insignia indicating the rank in the Order of the deceased brother.

The Supporters of the Vice Grand shall bear their wands of office, bound 305 with black crape. The Chaplain shall wear a white scarf.

That, if at the time of his death, the deceased brother was a member of an Encampment, the Encampment may attend the funeral in a body, in order similar to that prescribed for Lodges, and shall take the position in line designated; but in all cases the funeral ceremonies shall be conducted by the Subordinate Lodge, except that if the brother was a past or present elective officer of a Grand Lodge or Encampment, then the ceremonies may be conducted by such Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment.

### FUNERAL SERVICE.

We are assembled, my brethren, to render the last office which the living may minister to the dead.

Man is born to die. The coffin, the grave, the sepulchre, speak to us in language that cannot be misunderstood, however unheeded it may be, of "man's later end."

Youth, in its harmlessness and comparative innovency, and manhood, with its wonted vigor and pride of strength, are not more exempt than decrepid and tottering age from the fixed law of being, which dedicated all that is mortal to decay and death. This truth is inscribed in the great volume of nature upon its exempt.

The beautiful and the sublime which the handiwork of the Creator displays on our every side, fearfully associate the unerring certainty of the end of all things, amid the vividness of the moral which they are ever suggesting to the contemplative mind. Day after day we are called upon to follow our fellow-creatures to that bourne from whence no traveller returns, but from the house of mourning we go forth again to mingle in the crowded world, heedless perhaps of the precarious tenure of life and the certainty of that end to which allesh is rapidly tending. He who gives the vigor of body, without warning paralyzes the stout heart and strikes down the athletic frame. The living of to-day become the dead of the morrow. Men appear upon and disappear from the stage of life as wave meets wave and parts upon the troubled waters. "In the midst of life we are in death." He whose lips now echo these tones of solemn warning, in turn will be stilled in the cold and cheerless house of the dead, and in the Providence of God none may escape. Let us then so far improve the lesson as to be prepared for that change which leads to life eternal.

### PRAYER.

Our Father and our God, who art the resurrection and the life, in whom whoseover believeth, shall live though he die, and whosever liveth and believeth in Thee shall not die, hear, we beseeth Thee, the voice of Thy creatures here assembled, and turn not away from our supplication.

We humbly beseech Thee so to imbue us with a conviction of our entire helplessness and dependence upon Thee, that we may be brought to meditate upon the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death. In the dispensation of Thy Providence, Thou has summoned from amongst us our brother, and we, the surviving monuments of Thy mercy, are gathered together to commit his remains to the earth.

The Legislative Committee reported the following resolutions. which were adopted, to take effect January 1, 1878:

Resolved. That a member of a Subordinate Lodge or Encampment, who is in arrears for weekly or funeral dues more than thirteen weeks, is not entitle to the term password or to vote in the Lodge or Encampment, but is a contributing member until suspended, dropped or expelled in accordance with the requirements of the Constitution, and as such is entitled to visit his own Lodge or Eccampment. He cannot, however, become entitled to benefits until he shall have paid up in full all dues and fines (weekly and funeral) that have accrued against him up to the date of payment, if the By-laws of the Lodge or Encampment shall so provide; nor then until the expiration of such time thereafter as may also by the laws be provided as a penalty.

Resolved. That a Lodge or Encampment cannot refuse to receive in full or in part the dues of a member prior to his suspension, and no member can be suspended or dropped from membership in the Order for non-payment of dues unless at the time of his suspension he shall be indebted to the Lodge or En-

Resolved, That when any member of a Lodge or Encampment shall neglect or refuse to pay the dues fixed by the laws, for the space of one year, the Sec-cretary or Scribe shall report the same to the Noble Grand or Chief Patriarch, therapon be suspended, he having been first notified of the action that would be taken, a record of which shall be made upon the minutes. The mere fact of a member being over twelve months in arrears does not constitute him a suspended or dropped member. To render him such the Lodge or Encampment must formally declare him to be suspended.

Resolved, That all previous legislation inconsistent with the foregoing resolutions, be, and is hereby, repealed.

Article XVIII of the By-Laws of the G.L.U.S. was amended to read as follows:

Each Grand Encampment shall be furnished in the same manner; and shall be furnished with a copy of the proceedings. The Grand Corresponding and Recording Secretary shall see that this law is carried into effect as early a date as possible after the close of the annual sessions of this Grand Lodge. a date as possible after the close of the annual sessions of this Grand Lodge.

The following resolution, having for its object the incorporation of a Funeral Benefit system for the Patriarchal Order, was adopted, and Rep. Robbe, of Georgia, Brother Sanders, P. G. Sire of New York, and Rep. Cleaver, of New Jersey, appointed as the committee:—

Resolved. That a committee be appointed to take into consideration the propriety of adding to the Encampment branch of the Order, a funeral benefit feature, not to exceed two thousand dollars, to be previded for by stipulated assessments, from time to time, upon such members as would avail themselves of such provisions, and that the Grand Recording and Corresponding Secretary issue notices of deaths, and calls for assessments when needed in the treasury, and pay the same to the Grand Treasurer, who shall pay all death benefits, upon an order from the Grand Sire, attested by the Grand Recording and Corresponding Secretary, or to report some other appropriate plan for the purpose of carrying out the above suggestions, at the session of 1878.

The subject of a "Uniform Street Dress" for the Patriarchal Order, other than the "Encampment Uniform" heretofore prescribed, also the following:—

Resolved. That the regalia of a member of the Patriarchal Order may, in lieu of that heretofore prescribed, be a pointed Baldric of purple velvet, of the style and dimensions as prescribed in the street uniform of the Patriarchal Order—

were referred to a special committee, consisting of Reps. Shaffner, of Kentucky, Ticknor, of Illinois, Given, of the District of Columbia, Kidder, of New Hampshire, and Johnson, of Rhode Island, to report upon at the next session.

A resolution was adopted authorizing the M.W. Grand Sire, or (in case of his inability) the R.W. Deputy Grand Sire, to visit Australia for the purpose of instructing the Order in that distant jurisdiction and performing such other duties in connection therewith as the interests of the Fraternity may require, and the sum of one thousand dollars was appropriated to defray the expenses of said officer.

# FEE FOR RE-INSTATEMENT OF DROPPED PATRIARCHS.

The following Report was adopted:-

The Judiciary Committee, to whom was referred the resolution of the Grand Encampment of Kentucky, presented by Grand Representative Dowden, of that jurisdiction, requesting this Grand Lodge to "define the fee for the re-instatement of a dropped Patriarch," beg leave to report:-

That the subject is fully provided for in Section 1687 A, of White's Digest, and that the fee provided for therein for the re-instatement of a Patriarch dropped or suspended for non-payment of dues, after one year from the date of suspension, is the total amount fixed in the By-Laws of the Encampment of which he was a member for the Patriarchal, Golden Rule and Royal Purple degrees, for a brother of his age, or such lesser sum as may be fixed by the By-Laws of the Encampment, not less than the amount of one year's dues charged members thereof.

### TACTICS OF UNIFORMED PATRIARCHS.

WHEREAS, This R. W. Grand Lodge has authorized the organization of Uniformed Patriarchs, and enacted certain laws for the government of such organizations,

And Whereas, It appears to be evident that the number thus uniformed will largely increase throughout the general jurisdiction—swelling in some localities to brigades; and whereas, the prominent feature of all ceremonies of the Order is uniformity, which is manifestly right and proper, therefore,

Resolved, That the subject of tactics be referred to a special committee of three, who shall prepare and submit to this R. W. Body, at its next session, a system of tactics and drill for the Uniformed Patriarchs of the Order.

The Chair appointed Reps. Hotchkiss, of Wisconsin, Munson, of Connecticut, and Crane, of New Jersey, as the Committee.

### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS OF THE CONSTITUTION.

The following proposed amendments to the Constitution were disposed of as follows:—

1st. The proposal to constitute Past Grand Sires full members of the G. L. U. S. was lost on a vote of 34 yeas to 98 nays.

2nd. The proposal to make Past Grand Sires Grand Representatives from the Order at large was indefinitely postponed.

3rd. The consideration of the proposal "That this Grand Lodge shall meet biennially on the third Monday of September" was postponed.

4th. The next amendment, as follows, was considered and adopted on a vote of 129 yeas:

Amend Article XVII so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE XVII.—The officers and Grand Representatives (except such officers as receive stated silaries) attending any session of this Grand Lodge, shall be entitled to receive a compensation for their services as may be voted by this Grand Lodge, not exceeding five dollars per day for each day of the session at which they may be present, and milesge not exceeding eight cents per mile for each mile of actual and necessary travel by the shortest traveled route from their residences to the place of meeting of this Grand Lodge, provided that no compensation shall be allowed (except per diem to any officer or Grand Representative who comes from a jurisdiction beyond the limits of the North American continent.

3rd. Rep. Spear, of Maryland, Isid on the table the following amendment to the Constitution:—

Amend the second section of the ninth article of the constitution so that it shall read as follows:

SECTION 2.—Every State, District or Territorial Grand Lodge, or Grand Reampment, having under its jurisdiction one thousand or less members, in good standing, shall be entitled to one vote in the Grand Lodge; every State, District, or Territorial Grand Lodge, or Grand Encampment, having under its jurisdiction over one thousand members in good standing, shall be entitled to two votes. But no State, District or Territorial Grand Lodge, or Grand Representative; provided, however, that every Grand Lodge and Grand Encampment shall be entitled to as many Grand Representatives as it may have votes, on assuming the payment of the mileage and per diem of the additional Grand Representative.

4th. Rep. Thompson, of Missouri, laid on the table the following amendments to the constitution:

Amend Article I by striking out Section 1 and insert as follows:

"Section 1. This Lodge shall be known by the name, style and title of the Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd-Fellows.

Amend Section 4 of Article XVI by striking out all after the words "Grand Lodge" in the seventh line of said section and insert as follows: "That the necessities of a State, District or Territorial Grand Jurisdiction require it, a resolution may be passed by a vote of three-fourths of the representatives present at any meeting, granting to the particular State, District or Territorial Grand Jurisdiction, applying therefor the right to re-admit to membership within its jurisdiction, upon such conditions as this Grand Lodge may prescribe, suppended members of the Order residing in the same, who may have been suspended for non-payment of dues, and who have not been under suspension for less than three years; and also the right to admit members of defunct Lodges not able to get a card, it being distinctly understood that so soon as the necessity requiring it shall have passed away this privilege shall be yielded up by the jurisdiction receiving it."

Amend Article KVII, by striking out all after the words "Grand Lodge."

### SPECIAL NOTICE TO SCRIBES.

The certificates of the Past Chief Patriarchs and Representatives to Grand Encampment should be forwarded to the Grand Scribe immediately after the Installation of Officers.

Past Chief Patriarchs and Representatives shall be furnished with a duplicate Certificate by the Scribe, in order to avoid any possible inconvenience arising out of the miscarriage of the original. Especially should this be the case when Past Chief Patriarchs present themselves for admission to the Grand Encampment some time after they have passed the chairs.

The per Capita Tax is twenty-five cents for each member

upon the roll at the last stated meeting in the term.

Charge Books cannot be delivered except upon the special order of an Encampment, signed by the Chief Patriarch and Scribe, and attested by the Seal, and the old Charge Books must in all cases be returned to the Grand Scribe.

When old Charge Books cannot be returned by the hands of a Patriarch, they should be sealed up and sent by express.

The Money must accompany all orders for supplies of all kinds, and all orders must be signed by the Scribe and attested by the seal of the Encampment.

Post Office money orders are recommended as a safe mode of transmitting money.
