

Salts of Fishing Lines.

The Crown Lands Department of the province, in another column, has issued a notice for the sale of fishing lines (for cod fishing) only on a number of our rivers, some of which are excellent streams for salmon, while others are trout streams, exclusive- ly. There are twenty-two separate leases offered, three of which—on the Restigouche River—are for a period of five years, while all the others will be for a term of ten years. Nearly all are for North Shore waters. The sale is to take place on Wednesday, 11th May next, at the Crown Lands Office, Fredericton.

The Snow and the Railways.

The Glacier of last Saturday says:—"Great progress has been made in shovelling out the Northern & Western Railways from the blockade. The snow was drifted as badly as it could possibly be. The road has been shovelled to Cross Creek, and Bonshaw where one train stalled will be reached to-night. The regular train will reach Gibon for Bonshaw on Monday morning. The northern division of the road is being cleared and will be ready for traffic again soon."

The winter, which will hope, is about over, has been the most trying to the rail- ways ever known in Canada, although we believe some of the blockades might have been, at least partially, avoided. These blockades have cost a large amount of money to the management of the different lines and entailed great inconvenience to the travelling public. We have had the intercolonial blocked for a week at a time, while the Dalhousie and I. R. lines branches have been closed up. The Kent Northern, also, has been closed to traffic. The Chatham

Branch has been blocked at times for two or three days, although it has been better worked than any of the others, its impor- tant traffic justifying extra efforts to keep it running. The Northern & Western was blocked for several weeks against through traffic, although portions of each end have been worked. So far as the named roads are concerned, we believe that it could have been kept open if half the money spent in raising the blockade out had been invested beforehand in extra snow ploughs. As we have said, the winter has been a severe one on the railways, and it is to be hoped that the managers will not forget its lessons. In most cases, the men who have laid the practical work of clearing the roads to do, are competent and faithful, but they have been hampered by the want of facilities which produce and forethought on the part of the management would have furnished, and by which time and money might have been saved. It does not do to run rail- ways on the supposition that the best will always happen, and it is especially un- fortunate policy to have only two or three snowploughs when there may be work for six—or say nothing of the risk of having some of them disabled or broken up at times.
