**The Creamery Business.**

Cannot Brighton Enter Into It?

Farmer is alive to the situation when he writes to the ADVERTISER as follows:

"As I always feel an interest in everything pertaining to the welfare of this progressive county of ours, and especially of the section in which I reside, I would urge upon the farmers the necessity of a radical change in their system of farming. Instead of following a system of selling of the productiveness of their farms in the shape of hay and oats at low prices; to get into the dairy business and pork raising. I think I see the dawn of a better day for the farmers of N. B., if they but get a proper conception of their opportunities.

"With St. John as a winter port of Canada, with fast lines of ocean steamers plying regularly from that port to the Mother Country and which will be followed by cold storage facilities at that port; with a refrigerator car service on our railroads and cold storage at our stations so that the products of our orchards, creameries, cheese factories and farms can reach the consumer in good condition and thereby command remunerative prices, our farms instead of becoming worn out and unproductive will be enriched and produce better crops.

"To my mind the Premier of our province, H. R. Emmerson, with his colleagues, are eminently worthy of the confidence and support of the farmers of New Brunswick, irrespective of their political stripe, whether they be Liberal or conservative, from the fact that he has given them a commissioner of agriculture, who can study the needs of the farmer and can be in closer touch with him. Then the farmers have their minister to represent their interest and to speak for them at the meetings of the Executive.

"The vigorous agricultural policy which the Government has inaugurated in the line of importation of thorough bred stock, seed wheat, bonusing of wheat mills, creameries and cheese factories, cannot fail to have a stimulating effect upon the development of our natural resources. We hope that our farmers will not lose sight of these things but in the coming election will roll up such a majority in their favor as shall secure to them a good working majority in the next Legislation.

"Now a word about creameries. The Government, as I before observed, grants a bonus to the establishment of creameries when they fulfil certain conditions. One of these creameries, and we believe the only one yet in our county is the Northampton. The company has now in successful operation several skimming stations and propose to establish four others in the coming season. The sites for all of these have not yet been located.

Why not the farmers of Brighton make application to the Company for a skimming station at Hartland; or what would be better still, form a joint stock company and run a creamery, with skimming stations throughout the surrounding country. It is feasible and practicable and would be a paying investment.

We understand that W. C. Raymond of the Northampton Creamery, on Thursday last, distributed \$375 in cash among a few of the farmers of Middle Simonds, who are patrons of their skimming station at that place, which amount we presume is considerably in excess of the amount raised by the farmers of that place in other years from the products of their dairies at this season of the year. This company intend, the coming summer, to ship the product of their creamery district to the English market, where there is an almost unlimited demand for the best products in that class.

This change in the methods of doing business has its advantages over the old in more than one direction. In the first place the farmer gets his cash each month, with which to pay his bills and effects a considerable saving in buying for cash.

The merchant in selling his goods gets his pay in cash, instead of waiting until fall and then being obliged to take all kinds of butter as regards color and strength, and that at a price which very often he does not realize when sold.

I have been told that of all farm produce handled by the merchant the one that is most unsatisfactory to handle, and with which he is generally stuck the most frequently is dairy butter. We understand that the Northampton Creamery people will meet and consult with the farmers regarding the establishment of a skimming station whenever they chose to call a meeting and give them due notice.

**The Opposition Ticket.**

At their convention at Woodstock on Thursday the Opposition nominated J. K. Fleming, J. T. A. Dibblee and Wilmot Hay as their candidates. All of these were Opposition candidates in the last election, with the exception of Mr. Dibblee, who got his election by the government vote. The trio are well-known to Carleton County voters. Mr. Dibblee led the polls in '95, by good good honest vote, but as Tim of Clovervale says "Twant no use to try to make a Grit out of a Tory."

**Government Convention.**

There will be a convention of the supporters of the Local Government in Cole's Hall, Woodstock, on Monday, February 6th, at 2 o'clock, p. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the pending election. All friends and supporters of the local government are requested to attend.

An Increase in the Revenue.

Sir,—I believe that it is generally considered that the amount of business transacted at the post office of any commercial community is a very reliable indication of the progress and prosperity of such community. In this light the following comparative statement of the business of the Hartland Post Office for the month of January in the years 1898 and 1899 will be interesting:

1898. Postage collected.....	\$88 48
As follows: Postal Cards,	\$6 21
1 c Stamps,	7 59
3 c " "	67 95
other " "	6 73

which would probably represent 2,350 forward and 350 drop, or a total of 2,700 letters.

1899. Postage collected.....	\$113 63
As follows: Postal Cards,	\$5 17
1 c Stamps,	15 35
2 c " "	76 80
other " "	16 34

In the amount "other stamps," is included 178 3 cts. stamps sold before the arrival of the official circular announcing the reduced rate. And the large amount of 1 c stamps sold was caused by insufficient supply of 2 c stamps in first and third weeks of month. Taking these things into consideration, we may fairly estimate that 4,200 forward and 350 drop, or a total of 4,550 letters were mailed at this office during the past month; thus showing a numerical gain of 1850 and a financial gain of \$25 18. From this amount, however, must be deducted \$5.00 of unusual denominations, sold to a collector and included under the head "other stamps."
